MARTHA BUMPAS GAYLORD, creating the role of Margaret Malone, portrayed last season the heroine of "Tea and Sympathy" in Theatre Three's critical and box-office success. Her sensitive (and considerable) talents had previously been applauded in Theatre Three's production of "All the Way Home". In private life the wife of Dr. Robert Gaylord, the actress is well known for her seven year tenure in the Margo Jones acting company. In addition to her innumerable stage credits she has also appeared on national radio and television dramas.

JOAN PRATHER, creating the role of <u>Amy Malone</u>, is a regular performer on the popular television show, "Sump'n Else". A student at Highland Park High School, Miss Prather has inherited the talents of her mother, Lillian Prather, who was a member of Margo Jones' acting company.
