

Assassins is based on an idea by Charles Gilbert, Jr. Playwrights Horizons, Inc. in New York City produced Assassins off-Broadway in 1990. First Broadway production, 2004 at Roundabout Theatre Company, Todd Haimes, Artistic Director.

Stephen Sondheim

Stephen Sondheim wrote the music and lyrics for Bounce (2003), Passion (1994), Assassins (1991), Into the Woods (1987), Sunday in the Park with George (1984), Merrily We Roll Along (1981), Sweeney Todd (1979), Pacific Overtures (1976), The Frogs (1974), A Little Night Music (1973), Follies (1971, revised in London, 1987), Company (1970), Anyone Can Whistle (1964), and A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum (1962), as well as lyrics for West Side Story (1957), Gypsy (1959), Do I Hear A Waltz? (1965), and additional lyrics for Candide (1973). Side by Side by Sondheim (1976), Marry Me A Little (1981), You're Gonna Love Tomorrow (1983), and Putting It Together (1992) are anthologies of his work as a composer and lyricist.

For films, he composed the scores of Stavisky (1974) and Reds (1981) and songs for Dick Tracy (1990), for which he won an Academy Award. He also wrote songs for the television production Evening Primrose (1966), co-authored the film The Last of Sheila (1973) and the play Getting Away With Murder (1996), and provided incidental music for the plays The Girls of Summer (1956), Invitation to a March (1961), and Twigs (1971).

He won Tony Awards for Best Score for a Musical for Passion, Into the Woods, Sweeney Todd, A Little Night Music, Follies, and Company. All of these shows won the New York Drama Critics Circle Award, as did Pacific Overtures and Sunday in the Park with George, the latter also receiving the Pulitzer Prize for Drama (1985).

Mr. Sondheim was born in 1930 and raised in New York City. He graduated from Williams College, winning the Hutchinson Prize for Music Composition, after which he studied theory and composition with Milton Babbitt. He is on the Council of the Dramatists Guild, the national association of playwrights, composers, and lyricists, having served as its president from 1973 to 1981, and in 1983 was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Letters. In 1990 he was appointed the first Visiting Professor of Contemporary Theatre at Oxford University and in 1993 was a recipient of the Kennedy Center Honors.

John Weidman

John Weidman wrote the new book for the 2011 revival of Anything Goes. He wrote the book for Pacific Overtures (Tony nominations, Best Book and Best Musical), score by Stephen Sondheim, produced and directed on Broadway by Harold Prince. He coauthored, with Timothy Crouse, the new book for Lincoln Center Theater's revival of Cole Porter's Anything Goes (Tony Award, Best Musical Revival; Olivier Award, Best Musical Production). He wrote the book for Assassins, score by Stephen Sondheim, directed off-Broadway by Jerry Zaks and in London's West End (Drama Critics Award for Best Musical) by Sam Mendes; Happiness, score by Scott Frankel and Michael Korie, directed and choreographed by Susan Stroman; and Take Flight. He wrote the book for Big (Tony nomination, Best Book), score by Richard Maltby, Jr. and David Shire, directed on Broadway by Mike Ockrent, and co-created with choreographer/director Susan Stroman the musical Contact (Tony nomination, Best Book; Tony Award, Best Musical). Bounce/ Road Show, score by Stephen Sondheim, direction by Harold Prince, premiered at the Goodman Theatre in Chicago. He is currently completing a screen adaptation of *Contact* for Miramax. Since 1986, he has written for Sesame Street, receiving more than a dozen Emmy Awards for Outstanding Writing for a Children's Program. From 1999 to 2009 he served as president of the Dramatists Guild of America.

Bruce Richard Coleman DIRECTOR » Mr. Coleman continues his duties as Artist in Resident at Theatre Three. Associated with the theatre since his internship in 1985 - 86, Bruce has directed many shows on the Norma Young Arena Stage and in Theatre Too. Some of his recent favorites include City of Angels, Bloody Bloody Andrew Jackson, Superior Donuts, Wild Oats, [title of show], and The LaVidas' Landlord. Bruce directs for other area theatres as well! Favorite projects include Kiss of the Spiderwoman, The Temperamentals, Equus, The History Boys, Asher Texas '82 and Bent for Uptown Players and The Secret Garden, Into The Woods and Dracula for ICT

Vonda K. Bowling MUSICAL **DIRECTOR** » Ms. Bowling has been a musical resource for T₃ since 2008 and this will be her thirteenth production. Past shows include: City of Angels, Crazy for You, A Catered Affair, The Drowsy Chaperone, Blankity-Blank, Songs From an Unmade Bed, I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change (x2), A Dog's Life (Column Award Nomination), The Light in the Piazza, Lost in the Stars (DFW Theater Critics Forum Award), The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee, and Another Night Before Christmas. Vonda is the co-founder of Dallas Young artists and is the Middle and Upper School Choir Director at Greenhill School. She lives in Rowlett with husband Jeffrey and their two sons, Harrison and Mason.

Amanda West LIGHTING DESIGN » Ms. West is a graduate of Texas Wesleyan University in Fort Worth. She has designed for Theatre Three since 2008 including the recent productions of Enron, Bengal Tiger at the Baghdad Zoo, The Farnsworth Invention, The Roads to Home and The Drowsy Chaperone. Other recent work includes Uptown Players' productions of Songs for a New World, The Divine Sister, and The Temperamentals. She also works as the Production Manager at the AT&T Performing Arts Center and as a pyrotechnician for Pyrotex.

Richard Frohlich SOUND DESIGN » Mr. Frohlich, a T3 veteran, returns as our sound designer, making this his 30th show since 2006. His artistic skill and expertise have been rewarded as a 3-time Column Award winner in 2006, 2007 and 2011. Rich has designed sound for more than 50 productions at over a dozen area theaters since 2005, and he is a vocational video producer, founder of the award-winning Texas Radio Theatre Company. Since 2001, he has written and produced over 60 modern audio plays. Rich makes his home in Arlington with his wife Shanna and three children.

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
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
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
