Alan Ayckbourn

PLAYWRIGHT

Ayckbourn is the most popular and prolific of contemporary English playwrights. Using his position as artistic director of the Stephen Joseph Theatre in Scarborough (a theatre-in-the-round he has headed since 1972) as a launching pad, Ayckbourn has written and produced an astounding seventy full-length plays, most of which have had subsequent productions in London's West End. Ayckbourn had an early career as an actor and stage manager: in 1959 he played Stanley in The Birthday Party in a production directed by its author, Harold Pinter. During that early theatre career he started writing for BBC Television, but quickly focused exclusively on theatre, becoming both a playwright and director. He continues to direct not only his own plays, but works by other playwrights produced at the Stephen Joseph Theatre, as well as directing assignments for the National Theatre of London. The facility of his comedy and his inventiveness were quickly recognized as major gifts. But because he concentrated on lifestyles of the British suburban middle class, some critics were initially dismissive of his plays. Eventually, they heaped awards on his plays including "best play" awards in '73, '74, '77, '87, '89, and '90. He holds three honorary degrees of Doctor of Letters, and a Knighthood. Though he suffered a stroke in 2006, his recovery has been sufficient to see him return to work to premiere his 70th play at the Stephen Joseph Theatre. Although he retired from his artistic director post, he continues to direct premieres and revivals of his work at that theatre. His plays are staples of regional theatres across America.

ARTISTIC STAFF

Jac Alder DIRECTOR » Mr. Alder serves Theatre Three as Executive Producer-Director. He is a co-founder (in 1961) of Theatre Three, following the leadership of his late wife, Norma Young. Jac most recently designed and directed *Lost in the Stars, The Royal Family,* and *Amy's View.* His other duties include heading the administrative and financial team of the theatre, selecting repertoire, and working in the community and in Texas for the promotion of the Arts.

In this latter capacity, he serves on the board of Texas Non-Profit Theatres and was a founding and continuing member of the Advisory Board of the Arts Magnet High School, is on the KERA Advisory Board, and, through the Dallas Area Cultural Advocacy Coalition, is a member of the Advisory Committee for Dallas Arts Advocacy Day - August 20, 2009. He is supported in the mission of Theatre Three by many artists, a hard-working and dedicated staff, and the energies of the theatre's generous and inventive Board of Directors. His thanks to all, and to all Theatre Three's playgoers, he extends his usual admonition: "Enjoy yourselves!"

Jeffrey Schmidt SET DESIGN » Mr. Schmidt last designed the set for Echo Theatre's End Days, and the horses masks for Uptown Players' Equus. He is co-founder of the recently formed The Drama Club. a theatre company with a strong emphasis on ensemble and design. He directed/ designed/wrote The Old Woman in the Wood, inspired by a Grimm's fairy tale, and directed/co-designed/adapted Strindberg's The Ghost Sonata for The Drama Club. Other direct/design credits include Talley's Folly for Theatre Three as well as Tennessee Williams' Vieux Carre, Ben Elton's Popcorn and Sor Juana De La Cruz's Trysts in Toledo. Recent scenic design credits include Bedroom Farce. The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee and Six Dance Lessons in Six Weeks for Theatre Three and Cinderella for St. John's Episcopal School. He was the artistic director of MoonWater Theater Company for three years. Jeffrey recently appeared onstage in: Twelfth Night as Duke Orsino and Romeo and *Juliet* as Tybalt with the Trinity Shakespeare Festival, and in the worldwide reading of the Laramie Project: Ten Years Later with the Dallas Theater Center, featuring Betty Buckley. He will be directing and designing Second Thought Theatre's production of Lobster Alice in April.

David Gibson LIGHTING DESIGN » Mr. Gibson earned his BFA in technology and design at Texas State University. He most recently was the light designer for Texas State University's mainstage production of The Caucasian Chalk Circle, for which he won 2nd place as Best Light Designer at the American **College Theatre Festival** in April; prior to that, he did the light design for Company, The Musical, and while at Richland College in Richardson, did the light design for One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest, David's talent also includes stage management: at Texas State, he stage managed A Chorus Line, and House of



Several Stories, and assistant stage managed Much Ado About Nothing. At Richland College, he stage managed Seussical, The Musical. In May 2004 he was given an International Thespian Honor Award. For the last four years. he has worked as a professional stage hand and electrician at the Eisemann Center in Richardson, and Bass Hall in Austin. David is currently on our staff as a Class A Intern for the 2009-10 season.

B.J. Cleveland TREVOR » Mr. Cleveland, recently appeared on our stage as "Chip", the memorable boy scout in The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee: and in the hit Midlife! The Crisis Musical, hosted Uptown Players' Broadway Our Way, and played the role of Elwood P. Dowd in Harvey for Theatre Arlington. He has over 350 roles to his credit as actor, director, and choreographer in national, international and regional tours, and was a household name for many years as the daily host of BI & The Super Ones. BI appeared on the NBC series, The Facts of Life, as host of the Discovery Channel's Route 66, and in Robert Altman's film Streamers. He received the lifetime achievement award from the Live Theatre League of Tarrant County, worked for Theatre Arlington for 27 years, and was a resident actor/director with Casa Mañana. BJ, Artistic Director of Texas Creative Arts Academy, is also an adjunct theatre arts professor at



the University of Texas-Arlington.

Linus Craig NICK » Mr. Craig returns to us, being remembered for his roles in Gross Indecency. The Trials of Oscar Wilde (Ensemble), and Amphitryon (Sosia). Linus recently received his MFA from the University of Houston where he studied with Edward Albee and Lanford Wilson. His favorite roles include Orlando in As You Like It, Eli in Spitfire Grill, Wooly Mammoth in The Skin of Our Teeth, Frederick in Noises Off, Oates in Code of the Woosters, Balthazar in Measure for Measure, Smokey in Damn Yankees, and Rosse in Macbeth. Theatrical venues include Capital City Playhouse, and Austin Shakespeare, Austin; and Stage West, Fort Worth Shakespeare, and Jubilee Theatre, Ft. Worth. Directing credits include Benefactors, A.Lie of the Mind, The Real Thing, Greater Tuna, and A Tale of Two Cities.

She most recently performed in WaterTower Theatre's Laughter on the 23rd Floor and some of her favorite roles include St. Monica and Mother Teresa in The Last Days of Judas Iscariot at Risk Theater Initiative, and the various



characters she portrayed in her one-woman show entitled *Francine's Mitzvah's*, which she wrote and directed. Ginger's talent has been honored with a Leon Rabin award for Best Supporting Actress. She is represented by the Kim Dawson Agency.

He was awarded the Dallas Theatre Critics' Forum Award for Taking Steps and Dear Liar, both at Theatre Three, and Southern Baptist Sissies at Uptown Players.

Stephen Bergman

PLAYWRIGHT

Mr. Bergman is both a doctor on the Harvard medical faculty (30 years) and a playwright and novelist under the pen-name "Samuel Shem". Plays: *Room for One Woman* and *Napoleon's Dinner* produced off-off Broadway, were selected for <u>The Best Short Plays of the Year</u> anthology; *The Life at Ground Zero* (Blackburn Theatre, Gloucester), and *Courtenay's Gym* (The Boston Shakespeare Company). Novels have sold over two million copies in 50 countries and include: <u>The House of God, Fine</u>, and <u>Mount Misery</u>. Shem has been honored as one of the Boston Public Library's "Literary Lights," as one of "Boston's Best Authors," as a speaker at the Hemingway Centennial Celebration at the JFK library, and with the Vanderbilt University Medal of Merit. He has given the commencement address, "How to Stay Human in Medicine", at over 50 medical schools.
