



DI AV WRICHT

Growing up in Jackson, Mississippi, Henley watched her mother perform at local theaters, and decided she too wanted to act. Acting brought her to Dallas; she enrolled at Southern Methodist University, majored in theatre, and learned a lot about playwriting through her acting experience. In 1972-73 she performed at Theatre Three, earning her Equity card, Graduating in 1974, she moved to Los Angeles to pursue her acting career. However, she turned to writing as another creative endeavor.

Henley wrote **Crimes of the Heart** in three months. Inspired by Chekhov's *Three Sisters*, the play centers on the MaGrath sisters as they reunite to cope with a family crisis. It was an immediate success, winning the 1981 Pulitzer, the New York Drama Critics Circle Best American Play of 1980-1981, the George Oppenheimer/Newsday Playwriting Award, and a Tony nomination for best play. A 1982 Time Magazine article quotes Henley as explaining she writes "almost for pure sanity's sake. I'm like a child when I write, taking chances, never thinking in terms of logic or reviews. I just go with what I'm feeling."

ARTISTIC STAFF

Terry Dobson DIRECTOR » Mr. Dobson has been a member of Theatre Three's artistic staff since May 1980. He currently serves as the theatre's musical director and company manager. Terry directed (and accompanied) the longest-running stage production in Dallas theater history—Theatre Three's production of I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change. He also directed and accompanied many of the critically acclaimed Theatre Too productions. Myths & Hymns, First Lady Suite, Grateful: The Songs of John Bucchino, Elegies: A Song Cycle and last season's The Big Bang are among his favorites. Terry has performed with The Dallas Theater Center, Casa Mañana, Lyric Stage, Flower Mound Performing Arts Theater, and Theater Arlington. Awards include a Leon Rabin Award for Outstanding Musical Direction for Jon & Jen and many Column Awards. Theatre Three appearances include Sylvia, Nice People Dancing to Good Country Music, Beyond Therapy, Death Defying Acts, God's Man in Texas, Dirty Blonde, and last season's Glorious! My

Own Private Divawon a DFW Theatre Critics Forum Awards for Best New Play of 2006 and a Column Award for Outstanding New Work by a Local Playwright. Terry recently became a homeowner and spends most of his free time working on his condo and taking care of his new dog, Cooper. Bruce Coleman SET DESIGN » Mr. Coleman has been associated with Theatre Three since 1985, mostly as a Director/Costume Designer. His one previous set design for this theatre was The Triumph of Love. Other area set designs include Dracula, Picnic, The Secret Garden, and The Pirates of Penzance (ICT MainStage), Romeo & Juliet, A Midsummer Night's Dream, Comedy of Errors (Fort Worth Shakespeare in the Park), and about one million black and white shows for Kurt and Barb at Pegasus Theatre. Mr. Coleman has won the Leon Rabin award for Set Design four times for Amahl and The Night Visitors (Deep Ellum Opera), Sunday in the Park with George (Plano Rep), Sight Unseen (New Theatre Company), and Thrill Me (Uptown Players). Mr. Coleman received recognition for his set work





And the World Goes 'Round, A Grand Night for Singing, Central Park West, Nice People Dancing to Good Country Music, Once on This Island, The Boyfriend, Company, Drood!, Wholley Moliere, Personals, Lies and Legends: The Musical Stories of Harry Chapin, The Triumph of Love, Rise and Shine, Mack & Mabel, and most recently, The Goodbye Girl. As a costume designer, some of his favorite assignments include June Moon, The Women, Into the Woods, Threepenny Opera, The Miser, Major Barbara, and Pygmalion. Most recently, Bruce directed and designed Dracula for ICT Mainstage, designed the costumes for The Ladies of the Camelias for Echo Theatre, and directed Tick, Tick, ... Boom! for Uptown Players. An eleventime winner of the prestigious Leon Rabin Award, Bruce has also been recognized by the Dallas Critics Forum Awards, The Dallas Observer's "Best Of" issue, and the Column Awards for his contribution to local theatre. In his spare time, Bruce dances with Momentum Dance in Irving under the direction of Jaquelyn Ralls Forcher. David Walsh SET DESIGN » Mr. Walsh, our Technical Director, is a new addition to the staff at Theatre Three. He recently moved back to Dallas from Amarillo, where he was the Assistant Technical Director and Scenic Designer/Artist for Amarillo Little Theatre (ALT). David was on the design team responsible for the designand execution of more than 80 productions in his eightyears with ALT. Along with his design responsibilities, he also appeared in a number of productions: Gross Indecency (Oscar Wilde), Big River (King), A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum (Miles Gloriosus), and The Lonesome West (Valene). One, New Curtains for Macbeth, was produced in 2003 by the Lyric Stage Company of Boston, and was named a finalist at the International Playwriting Festival in the UK. His current project, a musical about a young singer who develops vocal hysteria when her mother dies, is a collaboration with his New York-based singer/songwriter son Noam Weinstein. From 1973 to 1983, Weinstein taught at Harvard University, where he co-founded Harvard's Writing Center. Since 1983, he has been a member of the English Department at Bentley College in Waltham, Massachusetts. In 2001, the National Council of Teachers of English published his **Writing at** the Threshold, a book on writing instruction at the high school and college levels that has remained an NCTE bestseller. This spring, he is on tour with his first trade book, Grammar for the Soul, which addresses the unusual question, "How does a person's grammar affect his well-being?" As part of that tour, in fact, he is giving talks at several bookstores in the Dallas/Fort Worth area.

Arnold is one of our Class A, year-long interns. His prior work at Theatre Three includes Production Assistant in Popcorn, My Own Private Diva, and Season's Greetings. He also served as lighting designer for Theatre Three's production of Season's Greetings. Mr. Arnold received training at Emporia State University in Kansas, where he did lighting design for Proof and Time for Ives. He has also done work in Lawrence, Kansas; the Astor's Beechwood Theatre, Newport, Rhode Island; and Maine State Music Theatre, Brunswick, Maine. He resides in Dallas, Texas.


