

Marc Camoletti PLAYWRIGHT

Marc Camoletti authored more than 40 plays and became a Chevalier de la Légion d'Honneur in France. Boeing-Boeing, his first major international success, opened in Paris in 1960, where it subsequently ran for 19 years. It went on to run for seven years and 2,000 performances in its debut London production. It became the Guinness Book of Records' most performed French play worldwide. The Paramount film starred Jerry Lewis, Tony Curtis and Thelma Ritter. A later play, Don't Dress for Dinner, also ran for seven years in London's West End. A French citizen, born in Geneva, and an acclaimed artist and associate of the Societe Nationale des Beaux Arts, Marc Camoletti's theatre career launched with three plays running simultaneously in Paris. His work continues to flourish in numerous languages and some 55 countries. He died in 2003.

Robin Hawdon ADAPTOR

Robin Hawdon started his career as an actor, appearing in London's West End in productions with John Gielgud, Ralph Richardson, Sheila Hancock, and Kenneth Williams. In 1982, he decided to focus on writing and directing. His plays include The Mating Game, The Old Devils (an adaptation of Kingsley Amis' novel), Revenge, Birthday Suite, Don't Rock the Boat, and God and Stephen Hawking. His novels include A Rustle in the Grass and The Journey.

ARTISTIC STAFF

John McLean DIRECTOR » In 2003 here at Theatre Three, Mr. McLean directed the American premiere of Fabrice Rozier's play Transatlantic Liaison, a French play based on the love letters from Simone De Beauvoir and Nelson Algren. He subsequently took this play and the original Dallas actors to New York's famous off-Broadway theater,

The Clurman on 42nd Street. The play received warm critical praise, notably from the New York Times, which labeled it "excellent", and had great success with the public as well. We welcome him again to Theatre Three, as director of the production of Don't Dress for Dinner.

Some 36 years ago, John directed The Madwoman of Chaillot, the first theatrical presentation in what was then an empty meeting space here in the Quadrangle, for the Dallas Community Theaters combined production. The show was a hit with both critics and the audience, and most importantly, perhaps, helped to inspire Jac and Norma to build Theatre Three in the same location. Due to this fact, he says (only partially joking) he considers himself the Godfather of Theatre Three!

A former Dallasite, John now lives in Paris, France where he is busy pursuing his varied careers in acting and directing. He has continued his theater studies by working with Leonid Keifitz, the noted Russian director of the Vakhtangov School in Moscow, Jack Waltzer, the New York acting teacher and coach, and he is a member of the Jack Garfein Studio in Paris. Current projects include acting a leading role in a new French feature film entitled "The Game of Clouds and Rain", to be shot this autumn, and producing and directing in Paris, a French version of Mario Diament's Blind Date. Dallas audiences will remember this fascinating and intelligent play which was directed by Jac Alder in 2007. Jac Alder SET DESIGN » Mr. Alder continues designing for both Theatre Three and Theatre Too. Set designing for last season includes Mack, & Mabel, The Goodbye Girl, and the revival of All About Bette: An Evening with Bette Davis. His design work this season includes The Big Bang, Defiance, and Season's Greetings. Jac's long service in design to Theatre Three follows his education as an architect, a profession he practiced in Dallas following

He is the designer of the unique performing space of Theatre Three and consults frequently with theatre groups adapting or building new spaces for drama. An original founder of Theatre Three (with his late wife, Norma Young), Jac continues in his role as Executive Producer-Director of Theatre Three. David Walsh SET DESIGN » Mr. Walsh joined our staff in 2007 as Technical Director. David's set designs have been seen in Pygmalion, Blind Date, Season's Greetings, The LaVida's Landlord, Mid-Life! The Crisis Musical, and A Dog's Life last season; and in House & Garden. Look What's Happened to Pixie DeCosta, The Light in the Piazza, and I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change in this current season. Prior to this, he lived in Amarillo, TX, where he was the Assistant Technical Director and Scenic Designer/Artist for Amarillo Little Theatre (ALT). David was on the design team responsible for the design and execution of more than 80 productions in his eight years with ALT. David resides in Dallas and has three children. Sara. Nicholas, and Emma who are all busy in college. Bruce R. Coleman COSTUME DESIGN »Mr. Coleman makes Theatre

Three his theatrical home. where he has worked on and offsince 1985. Past favorite T3 costume designs include Trysts in Toledo, Look What's Happened to Pixie DeCosta, Pygmalion, The Boyfriend, The Women, The Miser, Three Penney Opera, June Moon, and Into the Woods (Critics Forum Award). Other area designs include Richard the Third (Kitchen Dog Theatre - Critics Forum Award), Dracula (Irving Community Theatre Mainstage - Column Award), Bollywood Midsummer's Night Dream (Junior Players Guild), and six years worth of The Bard at Fort Worth Shakespeare in the Park. An eleven-time winner of The Leon Rabin Award, Mr. Coleman has been recognized by The Dallas Critics Forum, The Dallas Observer's 'Best Of ...' issue, and The Column Awards. Amanda West LIGHTING DESIGN » Ms. Westholds a BFA in theatre from Texas Wesleyan University and returns to assist us in lighting design, having previously designed lights for Trysts in Toledo. However, her work is well known in area theatres including: WaterTower Theatre, Dallas; Duncanville Community Theatre: Circle Theatre, Fire Station Theatre, Jubilee Theatre, Santa Fe Train Station, W. E. Scott Theatre, Stage West, and the Tarrant County Col-

lege NE and SE campuses, all in Ft. Worth; Artisan Center Theatre, Hurst; Lyric Stage, Irving; and Plano Repertory Theatre and Rover Dramawerks, Plano. Amanda also designed lighting for the 2008 Leon Rabin Awards for the Dallas Theatre League. In addition to her expertise in lighting design, she frequently designs scenery and sound. Amanda resides in Dallas with her husband, Michael.

Kimberly Condict SUZETTE » Ms. Condict makes her debut with Theatre Three. She received her BA from the University of Oklahoma and theatrical training from the National Theater Conservatory (summer intensive session), Denver, CO. Kimberly has performed in Wonder of the World in Carpenter Square, Oklahoma City; in My Fair Lady in Town Hall Arts, Denver; and locally, she has performed at the Dallas Children's Theater (DCT) in their productions as Garland in Lilly's Purple Plastic Purse, generic TV actress in Eat: It's Not About Food, and Cat with a Fiddle in Goodnight Moon. Her TV and film experience include voice over work for Funimation. and The Gadarene Swine, an independent film. Kimberly teaches at the DCT and enjoys tae bo.

Mr. Pannek returns to our stage, having appeared as Gunney Sergeant in Defiance earlier this season. His theatre experience includes playing Major Ketchum in The Oldest Living Graduate and Olin in LuAnn Hampton Laverty Oberlander, both at Contemporary Theatre of Dallas; Jim in Nice People Dancing to Good Country Music and Jim in Smoldering Embers at The Bath House Cultural Center: and Bram Stoker in Dracula at Pocket Sandwich Theater. His TV & film experience include various episodes of Prison Break and Friday Night Lights.
