A couple of months ago I had asked Jac Alder, 'Hey! Who's directing *House* and *Garden*?' He looked at me for a full five seconds, and then he said 'Um....You are.'

Here are the reasons I didn't completely freak out. It's all about trust.

I) I trust myself. Anybody that knows me knows I am constantly working on multiple projects at the same time. I do this because I have artistic needs. Like paying my rent. So directing what amounts to two full length productions simultaneously? A walk in the park...

2) I trust Jac. He is my mentor. He usually knows how to match up a director with a piece of literature. And he thought I could do this. Cool.

3) ALAN AYCKBOURN IS THE SMARTEST AND FUNNIEST PLAY-WRIGHT IN THE ENTIRE HISTORY OF MANKIND! There. I said it. Look, the man is the master of 'the premise' - you know, 'three couples + three kitchens + three separate Christmas A Word about the Playwright Sir Alan Ayckbe

Alan Ayckbourn was born in London in 1939 and has worked in theatre all his life. Before establishing himself as a writer and director, Alan worked in roles as various as stage manager, sound technician, lighting technician, scene painter, prop maker and actor. He always claims that most of these talents he developed with the help of Stephen Joseph, his mentor and founder of the Theatre in Scarborough who first encouraged him to write. One of Alan's greatest achievements has been the establishment of a permanent home for the company of which he has been artistic director since 1972 – the Stephen Joseph Theatre. This splendid twoauditoria arts complex opened in 1996.

Probably one of the nation's most performed living playwrights, Alan Ayckbourn has written 72 plays, almost all receiving their first performance in Scarborough. Among his successes are plays such as: How The Other Half Loves, Absurd Person Singular, The Norman Conquests, Bedroom Farce, Just Between Ourselves, A Chorus of Disapproval, Woman in Mind, A Small Family Business and Comic Potential. More than 25 have



Eves = Absurd Person Singular - that sort of thing. So I figure he has this whole 'being in two places at one time' concept down cold. And if you are going to trust anybody to do their homework and get the mechanics of a tricky conceit like this worked out, it's going to be Ayckbourn. I knew I could trust this whole schlemeil to work. And it does. Thank God.

I hope you enjoy this experience as much as this outrageously talented cast and I have. We have laughed ourselves silly working on these very smart plays. I think you'll have a great time with either or BOTH productions! Trust me.

been produced in the West End or at the National Theatre since his first hit, *Relatively Speaking*, opened at the Duke of York's Theatre in 1967.

His plays have been translated into 35 languages, have won numerous national and international awards and are performed on stage and television throughout the world. They have been filmed in English and French, the most recent, *Coeurs*, Alain Resnais' adaptation of *Private Fears in Public Places* winning that great film director the Silver Lion Award at the 2007 Venice Film Festival. Alan's book, *The Crafty Art of Playmaking*, published by Faber in 2002 has, to date, been published in Germany, Spain, Sweden and the US.

The holder of a number of honorary degrees, he is also the recipient of a Montblanc de la Culture Award for Europe and a Sunday Times Award for Literary Excellence. A Fellow of the RSA, he was appointed a CBE in 1987 and in 1997, was knighted for services to the theatre.

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



Mr. Coleman has been associated with Theatre Three since his directing internship in 1985. As a director, his past T3 assignments include Lies and Legends, The Musical Stories of Harry Chapin; Drood!, Nice People Dancing to Good Country Music, A Grand Night for Singing, Once on this Island, The Tale of the Allergist's Wife, Mack and Mabel, The Goodbye Girl, The LaVidas' Landlord, and the recent hit, A Dog's Life. Favorite area directing projects include Bent, Thrill Me, The Who's Tommy, The Lilfe, and Tick, Tick... Boom! for Uptown Players, Dallas: and the Secret Garden and Dracula for ICT Mainstage, Irving. An eleven time winner of the Leon Rabin Award, Bruce has also been recognized by The Dallas Critics Forum Awards. The Dallas Observer 'Best Of...' Issue and the Column Awards for his contribution to area theatre. This fall. Theatre Too will be home to the world premiere production of Bruce's play Look What's Happened to Pixie DeCosta!!!, a loving tribute to Grand Guignol,

Film Noir and bad 'B' movies.

David Walsh SET DESIGN WITH CONCEPT BY IAC ALDER »Mr. Walsh joined our staff in 2007 as Technical Director, is a man of many talents, and worked with Jac Alder in bringing these sets into existence.
