

**THE PHOENIX CAMPAIGN** 

We didn't stay closed for long once we'd devised a plan B, the major part of which was appealing to our playgoers for financial support, an appeal we named "The Phoenix Fund". See elsewhere in this playbill for those who've already donated this season.

A couple of seasons ago a transformer blew out the power to the Quadrangle and adjacent blocks - it happened when we were about four-fifths of the way through a performance, and I had to send the audience home without seeing the end of the play. (Luckily, our emergency lighting gave everyone a safe exit from the stage house.)

Since that scary afternoon, I've had a recurring nightmare that The Phoenix Fund fails to meet its goal. In this bad dream, the power is turned off for lack of payment, and I have to send the audience away forever. I'd like to ditch that recurring nightmare in favor of my dream: I want there to forever be an audience and players gathered here for mutual enlightenment and pleasure. Your gift to Theatre Three keeps my nightmare just an aberration—replacing it with my dream.

# George Bernard Shaw

Shaw was born in Dublin, the son of a civil servant. His education was irregular, due to his dislike of any organized training. After working in an estate agent's office for a while, he moved to London as a young man (1876), where he established himself as a leading music and theatre critic in the eighties and nineties. He became a prominent member of the Fabian Society, for which he composed many pamphlets. He began his literary career as a novelist; as a fervent advocate of the new theatre of Ibsen (The Quintessence of Ibsenism, 1891) he decided to write plays in order to illustrate his criticism of the English stage. His earliest dramas were called appropriately Plays Pleasant and Unpleasant (1898). Among these, Widower's Houses and Mrs. Warren's Profession savagely attack social hypocrisy, while in plays such as Arms and the Man and The Man of Destiny the criticism is less

fierce. Shaw's radical rationalism, his utter disregard of conventions, his keen dialectic interest, and verbal wit often turn the stage into a forum of ideas. Nowhere are these ideas more openly displayed than in the famous discourses on the Life Force in Don Juan in Hell, the third act of the dramatization of woman's love chase of man. Man and Superman (1903).

Alexander Melville Bell, educator of the deaf and inventor of Bell's Visible Speech, is considered by some the model for Shaw's Professor Higgins. Bell, like Higgins, was close to an Eliza; his wife was named Eliza Grace Bell. His famous son was Alexander Graham Bell, inventor of the telephone.

Of local interest, Shaw permitted the long-gone Dallas Little Theatre to produce the world premiere of his one act play, The Village Wooing in a now torn-down facility on Maple Avenue. Theatre Three has previously produced many of Shaw's best-known works including Don Juan in Hell, Misalliance, Man and Superman, Arms and the Man, Mrs. Warren's Profession, The Devil's Disciple, Major Barbara and now Pygmalion. Shaw, as a character, appeared in the Sondheim musical The Frogs and in the play based on his correspondence with Mrs. Patrick Campbell (who originated the role of Liza in Pygmalion), called Dear Liar.

Players, and Close Ties for the Contemporary Theatre of Dallas. A ten-time winner of the Leon Rabin Award, Bruce has also been recognized by the Dallas Critics Forum Awards, The Dallas Observer 'Best Of...' issue, and The Column Awards for his contribution to local theatre.

DESIGN FOR THE MEN Mr. Robinson's previous assignments at Theatre Three include Metamor phoses, The Imaginary Invalid, I'll Leave It to You, Children of Eden, The Mousetrap, The Musical of Musicals (The Musical!). The Full Monty, Vieux Carre, Glorious!, Democracy, Talking Pictures, The Odd Couple, Caroline, or Change, and Mack & Mabel. He has designed many shows for Water-Tower Theatre, Uptown Players, CrossRoads Theatre, Plano Repertory Theatre, Garland Civic Theatre, Garland Summer Musicals, Lyric Stage, Contemporary Theatre of Dallas, Kauffman Civic Theatre, and Coppell Community Theatre. He has also designed for many of our local colleges and universities: University of North Texas Opera Theatre, Texas Christian University Opera Studio, University of Texas at Dallas, Brookhaven College, and

Richland College. Michael's awards include "Best Costume Shop" (Dallas Observer 2000), "Best Costumes" for Old Settler (Dallas/Fort Worth Critics Forum Award 2003), the Leon Rabin Award for Best Costumes for 42nd Street (2003), and the Column Awards for Best Costume in a Play or Musical (2001, 2002, and 2005).

David Walsh SET DESIGN Mr. Walsh, our Technical Director, is a new addition to the staff at Theatre Three. He recently moved back to Dallas from Amarillo, where he was the Assistant Technical Director and Scenic Designer/Artist for Amarillo Little Theatre (ALT), He was on the design team responsible for the design and execution of more than 80 productions in his eight years with ALT. Along with his design responsibilities, he also appeared in a number of produc tions: Gross Indecency (Oscar Wilde), Big River (King), A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum (Miles Gloriosus), and The Lonesome West (Valene). David has three children, Sara, Nicholas and Emma, who are all busy in college.

Neil Robert Ingles LIGHTING

DESIGN Mr. Ingles' previous Theatre Three lighting design assignments include The Mousetrap, The Musical of Musicals (The Musical!), The Full Monty, for which he was nominated for a 2006 Column Award, and Caroline, or Change. Other lighting design credits include Le Petit Theatre du Vieux Carre's The Importance of Being Earnest and A Streetcar Named Desire; Southern Repertory Theater's The Little Foxes, and Delta Festival Ballet's The Nutcracker. He is the production manager of the New Orleans Ballet Association (this season's presentations included American Ballet Theatre, Savion Glover, and Houston Ballet). He is the technical director of Tulane Little Lyric Theatre, a summer education program at Tulane University. Neil is also a graphic designer and technical writer. "God save the Mahalia Jackson Theater."

Richard Frolich SOUND DESIGN
Mr. Frolich received his training
at Western Connecticut State
University, Danbury, Connecticut. Having debuted with us in
the 2006 presentation of The
Mousetrap, he has since designed
All About Bette, The True Story of
the Incarceration of Little Egypt,
The Odd Couple, Talking Pictures,

Democracy, and Popcom. Richard has worked with other Metroplex theaters: Echo Theater, Irving Community Theater Mainstage, Palace Arts Center, Grapevine, Texas; Texas Radio Theatre Company, Arlington, Texas; and Uptown Players. His work has been recognized with a 2002 Ogle Award, a 2004 Mark Time Award, and a 2006 Column Award for our production of The Full Monty. Richard makes his home in Arlington, Texas with his wife and three children.

Emily Gray DIALECT COACH Ms. Gray just played the role of Scout in Popcorn for Theatre Three and formerly served as dialect coach for Theatre Three's production of Shaw's The Devil's Disciple. She served four years as the Co-Artistic Director of the esteemed Classical Acting Company here in Dallas. She has also appeared locally for Echo Theatre, The Dallas Children's Theatre and Second Thought Theatre. Off Broadway in New York, she played roles in numerous classics from Shakespeare to Noel Coward. Emily adds to her busy career doing Audio Book narrations as well as voice-overs for radio and television commercials. Born in England, her training

was both at The University of Warwick and the Drama Studio, London. She is represented by The Campbell Agency.

# Sir Alan Ayckbourn

PLAYWRIGHT

Ayckbourn is the most popular and prolific of contemporary English playwrights. Using his position as artistic director of the Stephen Joseph Theatre in Scarborough (a theatre-inthe-round he has headed since 1972) as a launching pad. Ayckbourn has written and produced an astounding seventy full-length plays, most of which have had subsequent productions in London's West End (the equivalent of Broadway). Ayckbourn had an early career as an actor and stage manager: in 1959 he played Stanley in *The Birthday* Party in a production directed by its author, Harold Pinter. During that early theatre career he started writing for BBC Television, but quickly focused exclusively on theatre, becoming both a playwright and director. He continues to direct not only his own plays, but works by other playwrights produced at the Stephen Joseph Theatre, as well as


directing assignments for the National Theatre of London. The facility of his comedy and his inventiveness were quickly recognized as major gifts. But because he concentrated on lifestyles of the British suburban middle class. some critics were initially dismissive of his plays. Long accustomed to the Noel Coward style comedies with naughty behavior and quips from the upper strata of British society, those dismissive critics had to recalculate their notions of the importance of Ayckbourn's observations and when they did, they heaped awards on his plays including "best play" awards in '73, '74, '77, '87, '89, and '90. He holds three honorary degrees of Doctor of Letters, and a Knighthood. Though he suffered a stroke in 2006, his recovery has been sufficient to see him return to work to premiere his 70th play at the Stephen Joseph Theatre on 17 October 2006. This June he announced he would retire as artistic director of that theatre in 2008, but will continue to direct premieres and revivals of his work at that theatre. His plays are staples of regional theatres across America. Theatre Three has produced Relatively Speaking, How the Other Half Loves, Absurd Person Singular, Bedroom Farce, Taking Steps, A Woman in Mind, A Small Family Business, Dreams from a Summer House, Comic Potential and now, for the second time, Season's Greetings.
