

In 1929, the divorced lady pianist at the picture show is about to lose her fob: the talkies are coming. And she's about to lose her teen-aged son: he's falling for his father's empty promises. Harrison, Texas, like the whole country, is dealing with the uncertainty the depression is thrusting upon it. So how is it that this lady lives a life of hope? Despite her underdog circumstances, or perhaps because of them, she musters the resolve, even dares to hope for the kind of love and appreciation everyone needs to find in tough times.

The Odd Couple by Neil Simon

Caroline, Or Change by Tony Kushner and Jeanine Tesori May 31 — July 1 Exciting, complex, sometimes surreal and always theatrical, this musical story enters the world of a black maid working for a well-to-do Louisiana family. On the national stage, the era of civil rights is playing out: Dr. King, freedom rides, Supreme Court debates, and church bombings. But underdog Caroline is playing out the right and wrong of all that in the laundry room of the nice people for whom she works. The young son of the family, estranged from his new stepmother, relies on her. Can Caroline square her dreams with the boy's as her own life changes with the times? A superb musical score floods the stage with all the passion of those momentous times in this great new musical.

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

EXCERPTS OF AN INTERVIEW WITH HORTON FOOTE

in a 2006 interview with *The Daily Gazette*'s Jack Rightmyer, Horton Foote talks about his hometown, writing for film and television, and one of his favorite projects, adapting *To Kill A Mockingbird* for the screen...

"Those were exciting years to be involved in television," said Foote. "There was little money to be made. When I wrote the teleplay for *The Trip to Bountiful* I made less than \$5,000, but actors, writers and producers had a lot of freedom."In those early days of television shows were produced much like the theatre. "Many shows were live," he said, "and they were produced in a small studio. We could take chances and experiment. Lillian Gish told me early television was like the early days of film," said Foote, when the technology to edit film came along and television moved to the coast.

Although he admits to being a creature of the theatre, he does acknowledge that writing screenplays has brought him much success. "I prefer to adapt my own plays to film," he said, "but I have adapted the work of others. I'll do that if the story connects with me. When you adapt another work you have to get into someone else's skin and that's not always very easy."

The book To Kill A Mockingbird by Harper Lee was something he desperately wanted to adapt. "From the moment I read the book I felt that Harper Lee's town was just like my town," he said. "I knew these characters." He also knew at the time the movie was going to be something special. "We had a very creative team from the director Robert Mulligan to the producer Alan Pakula and especially Gregory Peck," said Foote. "Everyone who worked on that film felt it was important. It wasn't just a movie."

Since that movie came out Harper Lee has given only a handful of interviews, but she has always praised Horton Foote's adaptation. "She and I hit it off right away in our first meeting," said Foote, "and we've become close friends through the years."Harper Lee had complete faith in him to write the screenplay. "After the first meeting she said, 'Go home and write the screenplay."According to Foote, Harper Lee was an observer but not involved in the making of the film, and when it was made she spoke very favorably of it. "And there's absolutely no truth that Truman Capote helped her write that book," laughed Horton Foote. "Harper Lee is the soul of integrity."

Although he has lived most of his life in New York City he still finds the setting for his stories to be the fictional town of Harrison, Texas, which closely resembles his hometown of Wharton. "I don't sentimentalize where I grew up," said Foote, "but it's a landscape I know filled with people I know." Horton Foote learned many years ago how to live modestly as a writer. "Success is never about how much money you make," he said. "I've never gotten involved with an expensive or Hollywood lifestyle." He also considers himself to be very lucky to have had a blessed marriage of over 60 years to a woman who encouraged him to take risks with his writing even when he could have taken on a project that would have paid much more money. "Writing doesn't always make you rich in money earned," said Foote, "but you can become rich in many other ways."

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Kerry Cole (Director)



Last season Kerry directed Theatre Three's top seller, *The Mousetrap*. She has also written and directed two productions for Theatre Three's young-audiences outreach program, and she appeared onstage at Theatre Three two seasons ago in *Medicine*, *Man*. Her directing credits in the Metroplex include Circle Theatre, WaterTower Theatre, Contemporary Theatre of Dallas, Shakespeare Dallas, Richardson Theatre Center, Garland Civic Theatre, and Irving Community Theatre. She has also directed at several regional theatres in Virginia, New Mexico, and Hawaii. A few of the shows she has directed include *The Dinner Party*, *Turn of the Screw*, *Broadway Bound*, *Someone Who'll Watch Over Me*, *Psychopathia Sexualis*, *Cripple of Inishmaan*, *Much Ado About Nothing*, *Damn Yankees*, *Ten Little Indians*, *A Doll's House*, and *Barefoot in the Park*. Kerry teaches theatre at Richland College and the University of North Texas. For Mom.

Jac Alder (Co-Set Designer)



Co-founder of Theatre Three with his wife, Norma Young. Alder has, since the theatre's beginnings, served in many capacities. Trained at Oklahoma University as an architect, he has served the theatre (and this production) as designer; has appeared in many roles in comedies, dramas, and musicals; has functioned as producer putting together the creative teams associated with each production; has adapted and translated classics; has accompanied musicals as a pianist; has staged and/or choreographed major productions in every season since the theatre's founding in 1961 and currently oversees the theatre's administrative and marketing staff as well as the production staff.

Barbara Murrell (Co-Set Designer)



Ms. Murrell has been a Master Scenic Artist and Muralist working in the Dallas area for the last 35 years. She has painted on everything from church pageants to operas, from local theatre to Broadway. Designing and painting stage scenery was an idea planted in her from an early age, having grown up in Dallas and seeing the artistry of Peter Wolf, who designed sets for Dallas Summer Musicals and various other shows. She began working in his studio in 1975. As an apprentice, she studied under some of the best Scenic Artists and Designers of the time learning the fine art of trompe l'oeil and stage design. Some of her painting credits include the Broadway revival of The King and I, with Yul Brynner, The Wiz, Broadway road shows including, On the Twentieth Century with Imogene Coco, The Unsinkable Molly Brown, West Side Story, Annie, and many more. Notable Opera painting credits include Peter Grimmes, Billy Budd, Hansel and Gretel, The Magic Flute, Boris Godunov, Das Rheingold, and Eugene Lee's design of Girl of the Golden West, and many others. Previous Theatre Three credits include Metamorphoses, Candide, Taking Steps, The Musical of Musicals (The Musical!), and many others.

Richard Frohlich (Sound Design)

Previous Theatre Three assignments include *Democracy*, *Glorious!*, *Vieux Carre*, *The Full Monty*, *The Mousetrap* and *The Musical of Musicals (The Musical!)*. Richard has recorded and produced over 60 audio plays with the award-winning Texas Radio Theatre Company, produced CDs for many area storytellers and designed sound for ICT Mainstage, The Pocket Sandwich Theatre, Slappy's Puppet Playhouse and *Bonnie Parker On-Stage* at the John Houseman Theatre Centre, New York. He produces a modern audio theater program that airs Sundays on KNTU-FM in Denton, Texas.


Michael Robinson (Costume Design)

Michael's previous assignments at Theatre Three include Metamorphoses, The Imaginary Invalid, I'll Leave It to You, Children of Eden, The Mousetrap, The Musical of Musicals (The Musical!), The Full Monty, Vieux Carre, Glorious!, and Democracy. He has designed many shows for WaterTower Theatre, Uptown Players, CrossRoads Theatre, Plano Repertory Theatre, Garland Civic Theatre, Garland Summer Musicals, Lyric Stage, Contemporary Theatre of Dallas, Kauffman Civic Theatre, and Coppell Community Theatre. He has also designed for many of our local colleges and universities: University of North Texas Opera Theatre, Texas Christian University Opera Studio, University of Texas at Dallas, Brookhaven College, and Richland College. His awards include "Best Costume Shop" (Dallas Observer 2000), "Best Costumes" for Old Settler (Dallas-Fort Worth Critcs Forum Award 2003), the Leon Rabin Award for Best Costumes for 42nd Street (2003), and the Column Awards for Best Costume in a Play or Musical (2001, 2002, and 2005 for Theatre Three's Metamorphoses).

Tristan Decker (Lighting Design)

Tristan most recently designed Theatre Three's production of *Vieux Carré and A Christmas Memory.* He is the resident Set & Lighting Designer for the University of Dallas. He has designed for the Dallas Theater Center, Shakespeare Dallas, Undermain Theater, Kitchen Dog Theater, Our Endeavors Theater Collective, Texas Women's University Fashion Department, and many others. He is a two time recipient of the DFW Theater Critics Forum Award and a two time Leon Rabin nominee. He has upcoming designs for Texas Christian University and Shakespeare Dallas. He is also a Corporate Lighting Technician for AV Technical Support of San Antonio.


Horton Foote (Playwright)



Foote worked sporadically through the 1960s and '70s, and, in 1983, he re-teamed with To Kill a Mockingbird actor Robert Duvall for the affecting drama Tender Mercies. Not only was the film a critical success, but it also earned Academy Awards for both its star and screenwriter. The Trip to Bountiful was adapted for the screen two years later, and found actress Geraldine Page cast in the role of an aging mother desperate to revisit the town where she grew up Many of the writer's plays were adapted to the screen throughout the 1980s, and, in 1992, Foote adapted John Steinbeck's Of Mice and Men for stars Gary Sinise and John Malkovich. As the '90s progressed, Foote worked frequently in television on such efforts as Lily Dale (1996), Old Man (1997), and Alone (also 1997). In 1999, Foote wrote an account of life in Texas, called Farewell: A Memoir of a Texas Childhood. He created the fictional town of Harrison, TX, which he used as the locale for many of his plays. The first two installments of his autobiography, Farewell, and Beginnings, were published in 1999 and 2001, respectively. Foote was honored with the William Inge Award for Lifetime Achievement in the American Theatre in 1989, a Gold Medal for Drama from the Academy of Arts and Letters in 1998, the Writer's Guild of America's Lifetime Achievement award in 1999, and the PEN American Center's Master American Dramatist Award in 2000.



John Victor Allen (Gerard Anderson)



John is making his Theatre Three debut in *Talking Pictures*. 


Derik Webb (Willis)

Terry has been a member of Theatre Three's Artistic Staff since May 1980. He currently serves as Theatre Three's Musical Director and Company Manager. Terry directed (and accompanied) the longest running stage production in Dalias theater history — Theatre Three's production of I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change. He also directed and accompanied many of the critically acclaimed Theatre Too productions. Myths & Hymns, First Lady Suite, Grateful: The Songs of John Bucchino, Elegies: A Song Cycle and the recent Only Heaven are among his favorites. Terry has performed with the Dallas Theater Center, Casa Manana, Lyric Stage, FMPAT, and Theatre Arlington. Terry won a Leon Rabin Award — Outstanding Musical Direction — for his work on the musical Jon & Jen and is the recipient of numerous "Column Awards". As an actor, Terry has appeared in Theatre Three productions of Sylvia, Nice People Dancing to Good Country Music, Beyond Therapy, Death Defying Acts, God's Man in Texas, Dirty Blonde, and Glorious! His autobiographical play, My Own Private Diva, recently won a DFW Theatre Critics Forum Awards for Best New Play.

Kelly Smith has been a designer in the Dallas area for several years. She is currently pursuing a Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree in Theatre Arts Production and Design at the University of Texas at Arlington. Other Theatre Three productions she has designed include A Christmas Memory, My Own Private Diva, and assisted in the design of The Devil's Disciple. Other lighting designs include Theatre Quorum's Honour at Water-Tower Theatre and UTA's production of The Golem. She served as Assistant Lighting Designer for HudyBurly, an Off-Broadway production in New York City, as well as acting as assistant designer for productions in the Dallas area such as Classical Acting Company's Cherry Orchard and Contemporary Theatre's Visiting Mr. Green.
