

The Full Monty by David Yazbek and Terrence McNally July 20 — August 20 The industrial North of England was the setting for the 1997 Oscar Award-winning movie. In this bril-liant, funny and touching American musical version, the setting is shifted to America's rust belt where former steel workers feel their manhood crumbling in the face of their continued unemployment. Love lives are crumbling too, as wives and girlfriends turn their attention to other models of virility. Watching this heroic band of underdogs fight to win back their word (and their women) will have you cheering even as their even online solution astourde word even as their eye-popping solution astounds you.

Vieux Carré by Tennessee Williams

September 14 — October 15

Few playwrights wrote with as much compassion for the underdog as Tennessee Williams. Here America's greatest mid-century playwright shows his dramatic genius portraying a cavalcade of ambitious artists (and their delusional landlady) struggling to succeed in New Orleans' fabled French Quarter. Filled with Williams' passionately poetic language, his youthful high spirits, and his wry wit, this is one of the great coming-of-age dramas in which Williams uses his own life as a palette for this colorful, afmospheric, and vivid work.

Glorious! by Peter Quilter

November 9 — December 10

American Florence Foster Jenkins seems hard to think of as an underdog. She was astonishingly rich with incredibly loyal friends. But she dreamed of being acclaimed as the world's finest "pure coloratura". Alas, she lacked any talent whatsoever and was totally untrained; a fatal combination that caused those who heard her to explode in laughter and label her "hog calleratura" and the "diva of din". Inspired by her riotous recordings of the '50's, British playwright Peter Quilter hilariously recounts her life and her fabled assault on Mozart in Carnegie Hall.

Democracy by Michael Frayn When an underdog political candidate unexpectedly won a popular election in West Germany in 1969, he was not only confronted with skeptics, but he also realized that it was increasingly difficult to identify friends from foes in his half of divided Germany. Charismatic Willy Brandt knew that intrigue, duplicity, conniving, and spying were all clearly going on within his most intimate inner circle. But toward what end? For what cause? And most importantly, by whom? Is this how democracy works?

Talking Pictures by Horton Foote February 22 — March 2 In 1929, the divorced lady pianist at the picture show is about to lose her job: the talkies are coming. And she's about to lose her teen-aged son: he's falling for his father's empty promises. Harrison, Texas, like the whole country, is dealing with the uncertainty the depression is thrusting upon it. So February 22 — March 25 how is it that this lady lives a life of hope? Despite her underdog circumstances, or perhaps because of them, she musters the resolve, even dares to hope for the kind of love and appreciation everyone needs to find in tough times.

The Odd Couple by Neil Simon Two mid-life New Yorkers (as mismatched in roommate life as they had been in their marriages) inspired Neil Simon to create America's favorite theatre couple. His play inspired a great television show. What's easy to forget, because of the beloved TV series about the underdogs, is just how excruciatingly funny and on-target the original play is and how fresh its situation and one-liner's are for any generation of actors to get to perform. And for audiences to rediscover!

Caroline, Or Change by Tony Kushner and Jeanine Tesori May 31 — July 1 Exciting, complex, sometimes surreal and always theatrical, this musical story enters the world of a black maid working for a well-to-do Louisiana family. On the national stage, the era of civil rights is playing out: Dr. King, freedom rides, Supreme Court debates, and church bombings. But underdog Caroline is playing out the right and wrong of all that in the laundry room of the nice people she works for. The young son of the family, estranged from his new stepmother, relies on her. Can Caroline square her dreams with the boy's as her own life changes with the times? A superb musical score floods the stane with all the passion of those momentous times in this great new musical floods the stage with all the passion of those momentous times in this great new musical.



Michael Robinson (Costume Design)

Michael's previous assignments at Theatre Three include Metamorphoses, The Imaginary Invalid, I'll Leave It to You, Children of Eden, The Mousetrap, The Musical of Musicals (The Musical!). He has designed many shows for WaterTower Theatre, Uptown Players, Cross-Roads Theatre, Plano Repertory Theatre, Garland Civic Theatre, Garland Summer Musicals, Lyric Stage, Contemporary Theatre of Dallas, Kauffman Civic Theatre, and Coppell Community Theatre. He has also designed for many of our local colleges and universities: University of North Texas Opera Theatre, Texas Christian University Opera Studio, University of Texas at Dallas, Brookhaven College, and Richland College. His awards inlcude "Best Costume Shop" (Dallas Observer 2000), "Best Costumes" for Old Settler (Dallas-Fort Worth Critcs Forum Award 2003), the Leon Rabin Award for Best Costumes for 42nd Street (2003), and the Column Awards for Best Costume in a Play or Musical (2001, 2002, and 2005 for Theatre Three's Metamorphoses).

Neil Robert Ingles (Lighting Design)

Neil's previous **Theatre** Three assignments include *The Mousetrap*. Lighting design credits include *The Importance* of *Being Earnest* at Le Petit Théâtre du Vieux Carre and *The Little Foxes* at Southern Repertory Theatre. He was the stage manager and assistant technical director for the Tennessee Williams Literary Fair & Theatre Festival at Le Petit Théâtre du Vieux Carre and assistant technical director and master electrician for Delta Festival Ballet's *The Nutcracker*. He was also the studio manager and assistant lighting director at WLAE-TV Ch. 32 PBS New Orleans. In addition to his convention, special event and concert work, Neil briefly managed a small nightclub in Mid-City New Orleans.

Terrence McNally (Book)

Terrence McNally won his fourth Tony Award for Best Book of a Musical for Ragtime (music and lyrics by Stephen Flaherty and Lynn Ahrens). McNally won the Tony in 1996 for his play *Master Class*, in which Zoe Caldwell created the role of Maria Callas; the 1995 Tony, Drama Desk and Outer Critics Circle Awards for Best Play as well as the New York Drama Critics Circle Award for Best American Play for *Love! Valour! Compassion!*; and the 1993 Tony for his book of the musical *Kiss of the Spider Woman* (music and lyrics by John Kander and Fred Ebb). His other plays include *Corpus Christi; A Perfect Ganesh; Lips Together, Teeth Apart; The Lisbon Traviata;* and *It's Only a Play*, all of which began at the Manhattan Theatre Club. He has been a member of the Dramatists Guild since 1970.

David Yazbek (Music and Lyrics)

David Yazbek is currently on Broadway with Dirty Rotten Scoundrels as composer and lyricist. His album The Laughing Man won the 1997 N.A.I.R.D. Award for Best Pop Album. Other albums include TOCK and the upcoming Damascus! He won the Drama Desk Award for his work in The Full Monty. For theatre he has composed original music for Boy's Life at LCT; Mojo, Atlantic Theatre; The Pope's Nose, Promenade Theatre and many others. Yazbek has done a lot of scriptwriting for TV, including a brief, Emmy Award-winning stint with "Late Night with David Letterman" and the co-creation of the groundbreaking yet cloying "Puzzle Place" for PBS. He's composed scores for a wide range of films and shows for HBO, NBC, Fox, and Nickelodeon and is responsible for the unrelenting theme song to "Where In the World Is Carmen Sandiego."

Lynn Ambrose (Jeannette Burmeister)



Lynn Ambrose is making her Theatre Three debut a year after coming out of retirement in Uptown Players' A Man of No Importance. Since moving from New York fifteen years ago to raise her wonderful son, Jimmy, she has spent most of her time casting commercials, industrials and film in the Dallas area. Lynn also teaches voice to private students and musical theatre at KD Conservatory of the Southwest. Favorite shows she has musical directed are Godspell, Les Miserables, The Music Man, I Do, I Do, and Irene, from the Granbury Opera House to off-off Broadway to the Trinity River Arts Center to the Highland Park Middle School. Michael Serrecchia (Director & Choreographer)



Michael Serrecchia (Director) is very proud to be directing The Full Monty. He has studied at The Harkness Ballet, received vocal training from Sylvia Syrlia of the MET and Keith Davis. and acting training from Mary Tarsai and Fred Kareman of Stanford Meisner. Michael spent 18 years performing on Broadway, including being a part of the original cast of A Chorus Line. The Rothchilds, The Selling of the President, Lady Audley's Secret, Seesaw, and Sing Happy! He performed in the international tour of Chita Plus Two and the national tours of Hello. Dolly!, Two by Two, and Rudy Gulianni Building Sustaining Communities. His previous roles at Theatre Three/Theatre Too include A Class Act (director/choreographer), Seven Keys to Baldpate (director), You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown (choreographer), I'll Leave It to You (director), Songs of the Redhead: The Music of Danny Kaye (director), Beguiled Again (actor), and Grateful: The Songs of John Bucchino (actor). Other area performances include Some Enchanted Evening (director/choreographer) at PRT, "the Reverend Mr. Septimus Chrisparkle" in Drood at WaterTower, and "Old Man Strong/Hot Blades Harry" in Urinetown. On screen, Michael has appeared in the movies Jeremy and Annie and television appearances on As the World Turns, All My Children, Another World, and 60 Minutes with Dan Rather. Michael has won the New York Drama Desk Award (ACL), New York Theatre World Award (ACL), Special Tony Award Recognition (ACL), the MAC Award for Chita Plus Two, the People's Choice Column Award for "Best Director of a Musical" (Pageant) and a Column Award for "Best Director of a Musical" and "Best Choreography" for A Class Act. According to Michael, "I was so excited about being a part of this project for so many reasons. I love Theatre Three and everyone here, I love this company and crew, I love this score but I especially love this story and its central theme. The Full Monty shows us that dignity can be found in strange places." Michael currently heads up the Musical Theatre Degree Program at KD Actors Conservatory in Dallas.

Jac Alder (Set Design)



"I hugely enjoyed this show in New York and before that as a British film. Ex-Texan Terrence McNally's book for the musical struck me as really smart, and the score by David Yazbek knocked me out as did the terrific sets by John Arnone. The evening was great fun and the Broadway production impressively entertaining and expert. But honestly I didn't think of it as a potential Theatre Three production. It wasn't the "adult" nature of the fun that held me back, nor concerns about talent available here to play out the play's wonderfully rich characters. (Dallas abounds in more theatre talent these days than you can imagine -- you should attend auditions sometime and be amazed!) What mostly held me back was the need for the show to flow fluidly from one setting to the next, and the huge challenges that presents in our modified arena performing space. But Terry Dobson, my friend and the theatre's musical director, kept pressing me to select the show (which he'd not seen but heard and got all excited by the muscular, jazzy score and the on-target lyrics). Finally I sat down and started drawing, figuring out how we could shift all the elements we'd need to (and where they'd store when out of use.) Then the idea came of framing the locales with rusting steel girders that staved in place throughout the show while other scenic elements (including that troublesome car) came and went. Suddenly, The Full Monty seemed possible at Theatre Three. Making the decision absolutely solid was Barbara Murrell, master scenic painter, who joined the staff this summer. Add her extraordinary painting talents to the building, engineering, and structural capabilities of Jeff Schmidt and the superb energy of a new set of interns, and it not only seemed possible, it seemed NECESSARY to start the Mainstage season with this rousing beginning. Everyone -- HAVE FUN!

Richard Frohlich (Sound Design)

Previous Theatre Three assignments include *The Mousetrap* and *The Musical of Musicals (The Musical!)* Richard has recorded and produced over 60 audio plays with the award-winning Texas Radio Theatre Company, produced CDs for many area storytellers and designed sound for ICT Mainstage, The Pocket Sandwich Theatre, Slappy's Puppet Playhouse and *Bonnie Parker On-Stage* at the John Houseman Theatre Centre, New York. He produces a modern audio theater program that airs Sundays on KNTU-FM in Denton, Texas.

Lee Irving (Teddy Slaughter/Ensemble)



Eleanor T. Threatt (The Wise One)



On the Twentieth Century with Imogene Coco, The Unsinkable Molly Brown, West Side Story, Annie, and many more. Notable Opera painting credits include Peter Grimmes, Billy Budd, Hansel and Gretel, The Magic Flute, Boris Godunov, Das Rheingold, and Eugene Lee's design of Girl of the Golden West, and many others. Previous Theatre Three credits include, Metamorphoses, Candide, Taking Steps, The Musical of Musicals, and many others. Films, TV, billboards, and murals were a natural progression as a free-lance artist of large scale works. One of the first to plant her feet in the field of outdoor mural painting downtown, she painted the side of a building as early as 1978 across from the Quadrangle, which still remains in public view. In 1989, KERATV produced a short documentary of her mural painting on the side of El Centro Community College on Main St. in downtown Dallas, commissioned by Coors Distributing of Golden, CO. The mural measures 55' H X 35' W and begins at 20' off the ground. For the past 4 years, Ms. Murrell has been teaching Drawing, and Beginning and Advanced Oil Painting at The Creative Arts Center of Dallas, The Craft Guild of Dallas, and at the Dallas Arboretum.

David Opper (Lighting Design)

David began his professional theatre career at Theatre Three thirty plus years ago as the resident scenic, lighting, and sound designer, hall swabiter, and bathroom scourer. 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
