Sir Alan Ayckbourn

Avckbourn is the most popular and prolific of contemporary English playwrights. Using his position as artistic director of the Stephen Joseph Theatre in Scarborough (a theatre-inthe-round he has headed since 1972) as a launching pad, Ayckbourn has written and produced an astounding seventy full-length plays, most of which have had subsequent productions in London's West End (the equivalent of Broadway). Ayckbourn had an early career as an actor and stage manager: in 1959 he played Stanley in *The Birthday* Party in a production directed by its author, Harold Pinter. During that early theatre career he started writing for BBC Television, but quickly focused exclusively on theatre, becoming both a playwright and director. He continues to direct not only his own plays, but works by other playwrights produced at the Stephen Joseph Theatre, as well as

In June 2007 he announced he would retire as artistic director of that theatre in 2008, but will continue to direct premieres and revivals of his work at that theatre. His plays are staples of regional theatres across America. Theatre Three has produced House & Garden, Relatively Speaking, How the Other Half Loves, Absurd Person Singular, Bedroom Farce, Taking Steps, A Woman in Mind, A Small Family Business, Dreams from a Summer House, Comic Potential and now, for the third time,

Season's Greetings.

Kerry Cole DIRECTOR » Last season, Ms. Cole directed Theatre Three's production of Whodunnit. Her previous directing assignments at Theatre Three include The Mousetrap and Talking Pictures. She has also written and directed two productions for Theatre Three's young-audiences outreach program, and she appeared on stage in Theatre Three's Medicine, Man and House & Garden. Her directing credits in the Metroplex include Circle Theatre, WaterTower Theatre, Contemporary Theatre of Dallas, Dallas Shakespeare Festival, Richardson Theatre Center, Garland Civic Theatre, and Irving Community Theatre Mainstage. Kerry has also directed at several regional theatres in Virginia, New Mexico, and Hawaii. A few of the shows she has directed include The Dinner Party, Turn of the Screw, Broadway Bound, Someone Who'll Watch Over Me. Psychopathia Sexualis. Cripple of Inishmaan, Much Ado About Nothing, Damn Yankees, Ten Little Indians, A Doll's House, and Barefoot in the Park. Kerry teaches theatre at Richland College and the University of North Texas.

Tac Alder SET DESIGN » Mr. Alder continues designing for both Theatre Three and Theatre Too. Set designing for last season includes Mack & Mabel, The Goodbye Girl, and the revival of All About Bette: An Evening with Bette Davis. His design work this season includes The Big Bang and Defiance. Jac's long service in design to Theatre Three follows his education as an architect, a profession he practiced in Dallas following his discharge from his military service of '58 and '59. He is the designer of the unique performing space of Theatre Three and consults frequently with theatre groups adapting or building new spaces for drama. An original founder of Theatre Three (with his

late wife, Norma Young), Alder continues in his role as Executive Producer-Director of Theatre Three. David Walsh SET DESIGN » Mr. Walsh joined our staff in 2007 as Technical Director. David's set designs have been seen in Pygmalion, A Dog's Life, House, and Defiance on our Mainstage, and in Blind Date, Season's Greetings, The LaVidas' Landlord, Mid-Life! The Crisis Musical, and Garden in Theatre Too. Prior to this. he lived in Amarillo, TX. where he was the Assistant Technical Director and Scenic Designer/Artist for Amarillo Little Theatre (ALT). David was on the design team responsible for the design and execution of more than 80 productions in his eight years with ALT. David resides in Dallas and has three children, Sara, Nicholas, and Emma, who are all busy in college. Paul Arnold LIGHTING **DESIGNER** » Mr. Arnold returns to use his technological expertise in lighting design with us again. His prior work has been in Theatre Too in The LaVidas' Landlord, Season's Greetings, Mid-Life! The Crisis Musical, Garden, and Look What's Happened to Pixie DeCosta. He filled assignments as Master Electrician for I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change in Theatre Too and on our Mainstage for Crimes of the Heart and Whodunnit. Paul received training at Emporia State University in Kansas, where he did lighting design for Proof and Time for Ives. He has also done work in Lawrence, Kansas; the Astor's Beechwood Theatre. Newport, Rhode Island: and Maine State Music Theatre, Brunswick, Maine. Paul has completed a year with us as a Class A Intern and resides in Dallas. Mark C. Guerra costume **DESIGN** » Mark's other costume designs at Theatre Three include House and Garden, A Dog's Life, and The Goodbye Girl (with Bruce R. Coleman), The Big Bang, Frozen, A Christmas to Forget/A Christmas Memory, and Only Heaven.

Mark's costumes have also been seen at Richardson Theatre Center and Risk Theatre Initiative. He is currently costuming Seussical, Jr. for Imagination Players and Twelve Angry Jurors for the Greenhill School, Mark has also been onstage at Theatre Three in A Dog's Life, Mack & Mabel, and The Full Monty. Mark is the Intern Supervisor at Theatre Three. He graduated with a BA in theatre performance/theater design from the University of Texas-Pan American in Edinburg, Texas.

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
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
