



Anthony Shaffer

PLAYWRIGHT

The twin brother of equally celebrated playwright, Peter Shaffer, Anthony Shaffer's name, despite his other achievements, inevitably evokes his famously twisty, two-hander, *Sleuth* (1970), triumphant on Broadway as well as in London, and in 1972 turned into a successful film, from his own screenplay.

A former barrister, Cambridge-educated Shaffer also wrote screen-plays for Hitchcock's return to England, *Frenzy* (1972), for the very unsettling horror piece, *The Wicker Man* (1973), and the Agatha Christie adaptations, enjoyably star-studded *Death on the Nile* (1978), *Evil Under the Sun* (1981), and *Appointment with Death* (1988). He and his brother wrote novels together under the name Peter Anthony. Anthony Schaffer died on November 6, 2001 at the age of seventy-five.

ARTISTIC STAFF

Kerry Cole DIRECTOR » This past Christmas, Ms. Cole directed Theatre Three's smash hit production of Season's Greetings. Her previous directing assignments at Theatre Three include Talking Pictures and The Mousetrap. She has also written and directed two productions for Theatre Three's young-audiences outreach program, and she appeared on stage, three seasons ago, at Theatre Three in Medicine, Man. Her directing credits in the Metroplex include Circle Theatre, WaterTower Theatre, Contemporary Theatre of Dallas, Dallas Shakespeare Festival, Richardson Theatre Center, Garland Civic Theatre, and Irving Community Theatre Mainstage. Kerry has also directed at several regional theatres in Virginia, New Mexico, and Hawaii. A few of the shows she has directed include The Dinner Party, Turn of the Screw, Broadway Bound, Someone Who'll Watch Over Me, Psychopathia Sexualis, Cripple of Inishmaan, Much Ado About Nothing, Damn Yankees, Ten Little Indians, A Doll's House, and

Barefoot in the Park. Kerry teaches theatre at Richland College and the University of North Texas.

Jac Alder SET DESIGN » Mr. Alder continues designing for both Theatre Three and Theatre Too. Set designing for this season includes Mack & Mabel, The Goodbye Girl, and the revival of All About Bette: An Evening with Bette Davis. He co-designed with David Walsh on productions of Pygmalion and Season's Greetings. Jac's long service in design to Theatre Three follows his education as an architect, a profession he practiced in Dallas following his discharge from his military service of '58 and '59. He is the designer of the unique performing space of Theatre Three and consults frequently with theatre groups adapting or building new spaces for drama. An original founder of Theatre Three (with his late wife, Norma Young), Alder continues in his role as Executive Producer-Director of Theatre Three.

The Phoenix Fund is perfectly named. A mythic bird rising from the ashes is the perfect symbol for this fund which put us on our feet again after a 1991 financial stumble—well, no, not a stumble ... more like a plummet from the Empire State Building—which caused the shut down of the theatre.

We didn't stay closed for long once we'd devised a plan B, the major part of which was appealing to our playgoers for financial support, an appeal we named "**The Phoenix Fund**." See elsewhere in this playbill for those who've already donated this season.

A couple of seasons ago a transformer blew out the power to the Quadrangle and adjacent blocks—it happened when we were about four-fifths of the way through a performance, and I had to send the audience home without seeing the end of the play. (Luckily, our emergency lighting gave everyone a safe exit from the stage house.)

Since that scary afternoon, I've had a recurring nightmare that **The Phoenix Fund** fails to meet its goal. In this bad dream, the power is turned off for lack of payment, and I have to send the audience away forever. I'd like to ditch that recurring nightmare in favor of my dream: I want there to *forever* be an audience and players gathered here for mutual enlightenment and pleasure. Your gift to Theatre Three keeps my nightmare just an aberration—replacing it with my dream.


