



From the Director

"HUZZAH, BITCHAZZ!!!"

Escapism. It's how we seek relief from the unpleasant aspects of our realities. We distract ourselves with a variety of entertainments, or dissolve into fantasy.

We all have our "thing" that we want to disappear into. In just the last hour, the things I've personally wanted to escape from include my phone, my laundry, the voice inside my head that tells me I'm never good enough, my deadline for these directors notes, and motherhood.

Oops.

I wasn't supposed to admit that last one.

Moms are supposed to be unicorn creatures who are somehow impervious to basic truthful human responses to stressors.

Well, I've never met a unicorn. Instead, I've met legions of warriors goddesses who somehow make it to the end of each day and generally don't give themselves credit for the heroic feats accomplished when doing something as basic as a grocery store run for a gallon of milk.

I'd be lying if I didn't admit the desire for escape from the overwhelming responsibility of being the mother of my children sometimes. But my daily daydreams of disappearing to Mexico are nothing unique to parenthood. I've been honing the craft of escapism since my own early childhood. So have you. Every time we colored, played "make-believe", watched cartoons, savored ice-cream, or engaged in the millions of other little self-motivated activities that comprise the day of a child, we disappeared into a world of our own making where the rules of reality don't apply.

We start to lose that ability as we get older. We never fully lift up and out of our cares and

responsibilities anymore. They naturally press down on us as we become the Adults in our given situations. The older we get, the more complicated and inescapable reality tends to become. No matter what song we play, how many donuts we eat, what yoga pose we hold, or which series we binge watch, reality creeps into our pleasures, invading our daydreams, and smashing through our stolen moments of freedom.

It's such a bummer.

A rare few of us have the courage to eschew escape. They nest down into reality, stare it in the face, and wrap their hands around it. With a fierce strength of spirit, they mold it into something bigger than themselves. Then they offer it to the world.

When they do, we get the opportunity to see our own realities reflected in someone else's specifics. We're able to process our own "stuff" by looking into that mirror. Most importantly, a voice is given to all of us who silently struggle with the circumstances of our realities....and maybe that makes it all a little easier to navigate. Even if just for a moment.

Jessica Cavanagh is one of those lion-hearted beings who took her reality and made a gift of it. I remain, as ever, in awe of this complex, funny, challenging friend that life has given me, and I'm so grateful that our roads converged all those years ago. The journey of "Self-Injurious Behavior" has been something I have never wanted or needed to escape from. The joy and honor it has been to be trusted with this story from private readings to this fully-staged workshop here at Theatre Three is felt on a profound level. I spend a lot of time shaking my head and wondering how I got so lucky.

Thank you so much for attempting to escape your reality with us tonight.

NOTES

17 years of my life. 17 years of literal blood, sweat, and tears have gone into my time of working with children on the autism spectrum. People often ask me about my job, and I liken it to Godzilla doing the ballet. Shockingly beautiful, but such a force to be reckoned with. Emotionally and physically traumatic, yet the most fulfilling existence I could ever hope to imagine. I've learned that these children can take a piece of your heart, tear it into two, and then hand it back to you even more whole, tender, and filled with love than it was before. They have taught me time and time again the true meaning of love, and the gut wrenching meaning of grief. As a therapist, two things have been crucial to my success, patience and empathy. For the entire family. Standing in a mother's home, holding her hands while crying together about the hardships of her child will make you stare in the face of true empathy. I have always been acutely aware that I was the one who got to go home at the end of the day/ night. I would get to escape, but they didn't have that same luxury. I got to go home and sit quietly, process my feelings and grief, make peace and move on for the next day. Parents do not typically get this option, this moment to heal. The late nights I would spend with Elijah himself, just so Jessica could get a moment of normalcy in her life. So she could take care of herself, and her needs foronce. She deserved that. But those moments were fleeting, and so many parents don't ever get that option for a variety of reasons. The parents have been my heroes in this world. The ache and hurt on their faces is what motivates me to try my hardest to help their child and family in any way possible. To me, teamwork is key in this field. It truly takes a whole village, and I couldn't be more grateful and proud to have been part of so many villages in my career! I would urge you to be aware, and have compassion. Autism is everywhere. It is beautiful and it is brutal.


HARMONY
