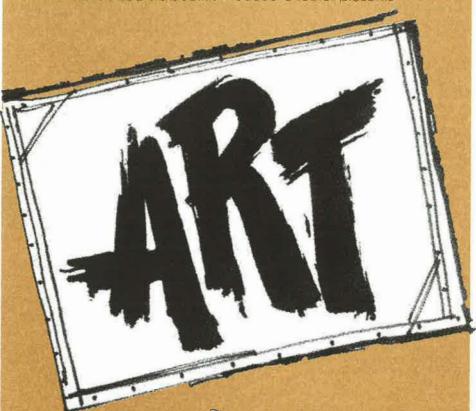

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BIOS



TERRY DOBSON (Director) Terry recently celebrated his twentieth anniversary as a member of Theatre Three's artistic staff. Besides directing, he is also an actor, Theatre Three's musical director, and company manager. Terry directed and accompanied Theatre Three's current smash hit musical revue *I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change!*. Terry has also performed with the Dallas Theater Center, Casa Manana, Lyric Stage, and Theatre Arlington. Since 1991, he has been the musical director of the Turtle Creek Chorale's small group ensemble, ENCORE!. This past summer, Terry traveled to London to musically direct and accompany *The Stuff of Drama* by Niki Flacks at The Actor's

Centre in the West End. In September, Terry orchestrated and arranged the Noel Coward songs for Don Snell's one-man show, A *Private Spirit*, which is currently running at the Tiffany Theatre in Hollywood.

JAC ALDER (Marc) moves from his role as director (he directed this season's How the Other Half Loves, The Happy Time, and Saturday Night) and his role as administrator (he is the theatre's Executive Producer-Director) to perform in Art. Since 1961 when, with his late wife Norma Young, he cofounded Theatre Three, he has appeared in scores of shows including Old Wicked Songs two seasons ago; a performance he cites as his favorite acting experience for Theatre Three. A musician and singer (of sorts) he has appeared in many musicals (including some he devised) including Rise and Shine, Clap Yo' Hands, Jeepers Creepers Here's Harry, Porter Please, The Fantasticks, and Candide. Classic roles include assignments in Shaw, Shakespeare, Moliere, and Goldoni. He has also performed in the works of modern masters including Eugene O'Neill and Tennessee Williams as well as in many of the contemporary American and European works premiered in Dallas by Theatre Three. He has taught acting on many campuses as a guest teacher and for six years was Director of Drama at the University of Texas at Arlington. He dedicates his performance in Art to the memory of his aunt, Ione Brinkman Metzger.

KYLE McCLARAN (Yvan) appeared earlier this season as Uncle Louis Bonnard in *The Happy Time*. Last season he joined the company as Undershaft in *Major Barbara*, a follow-up to his astonishing debut as Napoleon in *Animal Farm*. Last summer he played Falstaff for the Dallas Shakespeare in the Park's production of *The Merry Wives of Windsor*. Last season he played in *The Seagull* for The Dallas Theater Center. For other companies he appeared in *The Mystery of Irma Vep*, *The Lion in Winter*, and *Richard III*. His 27 year career in Dallas has included many directing and designing assignments in addition to his extensive acting credits. Those varied assignments have brought him awards and citations including "Best Actor, *The Dallas Times Herald*, "Best Director, *The Dallas Observer*", and "Most Innovative Director, *The Dallas Morning News*."

JEFFREY SCHMIDT (Serge) appeared earlier this season at Theatre Three in *The Happy Time*. In prior seasons he performed at Theatre Three in *As Bees in Honey Drown, Triumph of Love*, and *The Threepenny Opera*. He is the Company Co-ordinator for MoonWater Theatre in Fort Worth where he recently directed *Sex, Drugs, Ruck and Roll*. In May, he will direct for their new play festival, M.A.N.I.F.E.S.T.O. about the death penalty. He is currently working on the independent film, *Str8 Up*. Other important theatre companies in the metroplex for whom he has appeared include Stage West (Allied Theatre), Fort Worth Shakespeare in the Park, Undermain Theatre, Echo Theatre, Ground Zero Theatre Company, and the Dallas Theater Center.

ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT, YASMINA REZA

Born May 1, 1959 to a Hungarian mother and an Iranian Jew, Yasmina Reza grew up in France. She began her career as an actress, performing in both new plays and classical works such as Moliere and Mariyanx. Her writing career began in 1987 with Conversations After a Burial. For this work, she was rewarded with the Moliere Award for Best Author, SACD New Talent Award, and the Johnson Foundation Award. Her next work would be a translation of Kafkais Metamorphosis, which won her a nomination for the Moliere Award for Best Translation. Her next two plays were critical and financial successes throughout Europe. Winter Crossing won the 1990 Moliere Award for Best Fringe Production and The Unexpected Man was a touring success in France, Scandinavia, and Germany. Her greatest success, Art, premiered in 1995. Its French production won the Moliere Award for Best Play, Best Production, and Best Author. It has been translated into twenty languages and produced worldwide, including at least four different productions on Broadway. In London, its original production won the 1996/1997 Olivier Award and the Evening Standard Award, still plays at the Wyndham's Theatre, using sixteen different casts to continue the run of the show. Previous London cast members include George Wendt, Judd Hirsch, and Patrick Duffy. Since Art's incredible success, London theatres have revived her previous and new works. Last year, the Royal Shakespeare Company produced The Unexpected Man, directed by Matthew Warchus and starring Eileen Atkins and Michael Gammon and the Almedia Theatre is staging Conversations After a Burial. Her most recent work, Trois Versions de la Vie, which translates as Life X 3, was produced at the Royal National Theatre earlier this season. Her screenwriting credits include See You Tomorrow and her first novel, Hammerklavier, has received incredible critical reviews in France. At age 41, Yasmina Reza is enjoying a fruitful and innovative writing career.

ABOUT THE TRANSLATOR, CHRISTOPHER HAMPTON

Christopher Hampton is well known in Great Britain for his translation for his translations of several classic works. His theater credits include When Did You Last See My Mother (Royal Court Theatre and Cornedy Theatre), Total Eclipse (Royal Court, Lyric Hammersmith, BBC TV), Uncle Vanya (Royal Court), The Philanthropist, (Royal Court, Mayfair and Wyndhamis Theatre), Hedda Gabler (Stratford Ontario Festival, revived at the Royal National Theatre), Savages (Royal Court and Mayfair Theatre), Tales from the Vienna Woods (Royal National Theatre), Tales from Hollywood (Mark Taper Forum and Royal National Theatre), Tartuffe (Royal Shakespeare Company), Les Liaisons Dangereuses (Royal Shakespeare Company, Broadway), Faith, Hope, and Charity (Lyric Theatre, Hammersmith), White Chameleon (Royal National Theatre), Sunset Boulevard (West End and Broadway), and Alice's Adventures Under Ground (Royal National Theatre). Television creditis include Able's Will, The History Man, Hotel du Lac, The Ginger Tree and Tales from Hollywood (British Broadcasting Company). Film credits include A Doll's House, Tales from the Vienna Woods, The Honorary Consul, The Good Father, Dangerous Liasions, Mary Reilly, and Total Eclipse. He directed his own screenplays, Carrington, The Secret Agent, and recently The Moon and Sixpence. Last year, he translated Yasmina Reza's The Unexpected Man for the Royal Shakespeare Company's production.

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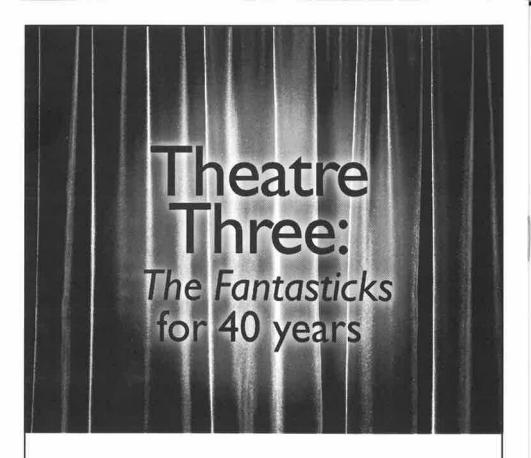
