

Jeffrey Schmidt (director)

Jeffrey directed A Christmas Memory for Theatre Three last year for The Appetizer Attraction Series. His area directing credits include Manifesto 2001 & 2002 at MoonWater Theater Company, Sex Drugs, and Rock and Roll at MoonWater Theatre Company, Bridge to China Basin at the Out of the Loop Festival, Craving Gravy at Ground Zero Theater Company. Jeffrey was previously seen on Theatre Three's stage as Posiedon and others in Metamorphoses. His other roles include Michael in Rounding Third, Simon Able in Sly Fox, Nick in Over the River and Through the Woods, Serge in Art, Desmond Bonnard in The Happy Time, Evan Wyler in As Bees in Honey Drown, Dimas in Triumph of Love, and Bob in ThreePenny Opera. Other theater roles include Pandeus Clavercourse in Dainty Shapes and Hairy Apes for Our Endeavors Theatre Collective, Stephen Belber in The Laramie Project at WaterTower, John Everett Millais in The Countess at Circle Theatre, Felice in Out Cry at Moon-Water Theater Company, Ross Gardnier in Visiting Mr. Green, George in I Hear the Thunder Rolling, I, Dick Wilkins/Debtor in A Chnstmas Carol at Dallas Theater Center, and Quentin in the world premiere of Erik Ehn's adaptation of The Sound and The Fury at Undermain Theater. His film and television appearances include Riley in Indefinitely, Walker, Texas Ranger, Interstate, and Mannlich in Nosphonatu. He was the artistic director of MoonWater Theater Company for three years. He is currently the host of the T.V. show, Your House and Home, and can be seen in Debbie Does Dallas at Kitchen Dog Theater.

Russell Dver (lighting design)

Recent Dallas credits include Classical Acting Company's The Cherry Orchard, Plano Rep's Underpants, Kitchen Dog Theater's Jesus Hopped the A-Train, and Theatre Three's producions of Dear Liar, Merrily We Roll Along, Old Wicked Songs, and Noel Coward: A Talent to Amuse in Theatre Too! Russell holds a BFA in lighting design from the College of Santa Fe and has designed several shows in Santa Fe, New York City, and the Dallas area.

Truman Capote (author, A Christmas Memory)

Capote was born in 1924 in New Orleans to Archulus Person, a salesman who couldn't keep a job and Lille Mae Faulk, 16 year-old beauty queen. His parents divorced when he was four years old and Capote was sent to live in Monroeville, Alabama with family, include a favorite relative, Sook. Harper Lee was one of his closest friends, and the character of Dill in her masterpiece, To Kill a Mockingbird, is based on him. After his mother remarried a wealthy New York businessman, Capote went to New York and adopted his stepfather's last name. His formal education came to an end at age of 17, but he immediately found work at New Yorker magazine. With his lyrical style, his earliest works such as Other Voices, Other Rooms, A Tree of Night, and The Grass Harp were considered some of his best. In 1958, his novel about a precious girl named Holly Golightly, Breakfast at Tiffany's, was a sensational success and made into an even more successful movie in 1961. He left New York for six years to research and write about a murder of a family in Holcomb, Kansas. The result was In Cold Blood, a nonfiction novel the examined the lives of the victims and the murderers. Capote introduced tender memories from his Southern childhood in A Christmas Memory (1958) and A Thanksgiving Visitor (1968). Both stories were made into television specials. Known for his flamboyant style on the New York social scene, Capote loved to write about his famous friends, His friends were not amused. His tell-all novel, Answered Prayers was not published until after his death in 1987. his death in 1987.

A Recipe for Your Own Christmas Memory!

Mississippi Fruitcake

1 lb of candied cherries

1 lb of candied pineapple 1 lb of pecans, shelled

1 lb of almonds, shelled

1 lb of walnuts, shelled

1 lb of pitted dates

4 lbs of seedless raisins

1 lb of currants berry jelly ½ lb of white figs

Citron, to taste Orange and lemon rind, grated Flour, to dredge

1 lb of butter 1 lb of sugar

1 dozen eggs, beaten

1 lb of flour

8 oz of plum or berry jelly 1 tablespoon of cinna-

1 tablespoon of plum or

1/2 teaspoon of allspice ½ teaspoon of nutmed

1 cup of wine or brandy

Haive cherries; slice pineapple thin. Add broken or halved nuts. Mix all fruits and nuts. Dredge well with flour. Cream butter and Sugar; add eggs. Add flour and jelly, then spices mixed in wine. With hands, mix thin batter into floured fruit and nuts. Put in cake pans; bake at least I hour moderate oven (350° F). Cakes are done when inserted cake tester or wire comes out clean. Pour wine over hot cakes; cool and wrap. Makes 15 pounds. --Huntsville Heritage Cookbook, Junior League of Huntsville, AL

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
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Beginning with the 1996-1997 season, all memorial gifts, unless otherwise designated, are placed in the theatre's new permanent building endowment fund.

Justin A. P. Jones (Cain/Japheth)





Mandy Nguyen (Aysha)




Michele Rene (Storyteller)

From Stephen Schwartz (Composer and lyricist)

The book of Genesis has fascinated and inspired dramatists for centuries, from the medieval mystery plays to such modern American theatre writers as Arthur Miller and Richard Rodgers. Still, when John Caird and I began work on Children of Eden, it was with a certain amount of trepidation. After all, this was the Bible we were dealing with. Who were we to be putting our own interpretation on these sacred stories, or worse vet, adding characters and incidents? How would audiences react to a vision of Noah, Eve. Cain, and especially God Himself that did not exactly jibe with what they had heard in Sunday school? It was while in the throes of these concerns that I came across, as part of my research for this project, a surprising discovery. Contrary to my previous belief. I learned that the Book of Genesis was not a spontaneous account that first appeared complete and original in the Old Testament. It was rather a highly edited version of ancient Hebrew tribal beliefs and stories which had been handed down orally from generation to generation. Many elements were changed, omitted, or embroidered upon over time. Indeed, in the early chapters of the Old Testament itself. often two contrary versions are presented: Were Adam and Eve created simultaneously, as in Genesis I:27, or Adam first, as in II:22? Did the Flood last forty days, as in VII:12, or 150, as in VII:24? I came across other sources, in a book of Hebrew myths compiled by Robert Graves, and even whole unfamiliar Books of the Bible, edited out of the Old Testament but collected as The Forgotten Books of Eden, translated from ancient Egyptian and published by World Bible Publishers. This version was so radical that it included twin sisters for Cain and Abel! Finally, I read (and highly recommend) a book called *Memories & Visions* of Paradise by Richard Heinberg, which examines the stories of the Lost Eden and the Flood in many cultures and convincingly advances the argument, in highly scientific and rational language, that these events actually happened historically, though not precisely as described in Genesis. After all these readings and more, many of which inspired and influenced our own interpretation, John and I feel more comfortable about playing slightly loose with these Bible tales. We hope our audiences come to our view of these wonderful stories with the same spirit of adventure, awe, and delight as we present them to you.

John Caird (Book)

Honorary Associate Director of the Royal Shakespeare Company, where he directed over 20 productions. Recent productions include *The Seagull, Of the Wells, Stanley*, and *Peter Pan* at the Royal National Theatre, *Stanley* at the Circle in the Square on Broadway, both parts of *Henry IV* for BBC television, and *Jane Eyre* at the Royal Alexandra Theatre in Toronto. John wrote and directed *The Siegfried & Roy Show* at the Mirage in Las Vegas and with Stephen Schwartz, *Children of Eden*. He has Tony Awards for *Les Miserables* and *Nicholas Nickleby*.
