

Terry Dobson (Musical Director)

Terry Dobson has been a member of Theatre Three's Artistic Staff since May 1980. He currently serves as Theatre Three's Musical Director and Company Manager. He has been a musical director for over 100 musicals, including last season's Putting It Together. His most recent directing assignment for Theatre Three was the first show of the 2005-2006 Appetizer Attraction Series, Elegies: A Song Cycle. Terry directed (and accompanied) Theatre Three's record-breaking smash hit musical revue, I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change! and all of last season's Appetizer Attractions Series productions, Myths & Hymns, Don Juan in Hell, and First Lady Suite. He directed the first show of The Spotlight Series in Theatre Too!, Grateful: The Songs of John Bucchino, the fourth show of the Mainstage Season, You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown, and the sixth show of the Mainstage Series, Medicine, Man. Terry has performed with The Dallas Theater Center, Casa Manana, Lyric Stage, and Theatre Arlington. Terry orchestrated and arranged the music for Don Snell's tribute to Noel Coward, A Private Spirit, which has been produced in Hollywood, Las Vegas, Dallas, and Phoenix. He traveled to London in 2000 to accompany The Stuff of Drama by Niki Flacks. Terry won a Leon Rabin Award — Outstanding Musical Direction — for his work on the musical, Jon & Jen and is the recipient of numerous "Column Awards". As an actor, Terry has appeared in Theatre Three productions of Sylvia, Nice People Dancing to Good Country Music, Beyond Therapy, Death Defying Acts, God's Man in Texas and the Mae West comedy, Dirty Blonde.

Alder, Theatre Three's Executive Producer-Director, just directed his own translation of The Imaginary Invalid and, in addition to performing in A Talent to Amuse, has designed both its environment and the set for I'll Leave It to You.

Connie was seen last season at Theatre Three as "Lee" in The Tale of the Allergist's Wife on the mainstage followed by Grateful: The Songs of John Bucchino which kicked off the Spotlight Series downstairs. She was then spotted briefly in *Pro Bono Publico*, a new play by Peter Morris for the Dallas Theater Center's Fresh Ink Series. She has played Carnegie Hall, Town Hall, New York City Opera, national and international tours; starred as "Mama" to 19 year-old Ben, a freshman premed student at NYU, and performing partner/ loving wife to Theatre Three Board Chair Emeritus, the late Lloyd W. Kitchens, Jr., M.D., and graced the stages of many other New York, regional, and local theatres...loving every minute of it! Megan Elizabeth Kelly



Megan Elizabeth Kelly was last seen in Theatre Three's production of You're a Good Man Charlie Brown (Lucy) and Batboy (Shelley). She holds a Bachelors of Music degree from Oklahoma City University. In NY, Megan was featured as Ishmael in Cameron Macintosh's Moby Dick:the Musical! and can be heard on the cast recording. Locally, Megan has worked with Contemporary Theatre of Dallas in Rocky Horror Show and Baby (Lizzie), Casa Manana in You're A Good Man Charlie Brown (Sally), ICT in Secret Garden (Martha), and FMPAT in Grease (Frenchy) and Once Upon A Mattress (Winnifred). All my love to Stephen.

Violet Coward was a curious woman.

When she heard that a famous clairvoyant, Anna Eva Fay, was coming to town, she had to go. Ms. Fay asked each individual to write down a question on a sheet of paper. Mrs. Coward, a devoted mother concerned about her young son's acting career, wrote, "Do you advise me to keep my son Noel Coward on the stage? Violet Coward". After answering a few questions, Ms. Fay suddenly called out, "Mrs. Coward, Mrs. Coward! You ask me about your son. Keep him where he is, he has great talent and will have a wonderful career!" Maybe Ms. Fay was just lucky, but Mrs. Coward always knew her son was spectacular.

Noel Pierce Coward was not born into the wealthiest of families. His mother was from a family of some prominence, but his father was a piano salesman who didn't really sell much and lacked ambition. For the most part, the Cowards lived in genteel poverty, with Mrs. Coward making some extraordinary sacrifices for her son. From an early age, Coward was an entertainer and by the age of 12, he was making his London debut in *The Goldfish*. He was thrilled with the opportunity to work with his stage idol, Charles Hawtrey, in several shows. It was during these childhood shows that he met Esme Wynne, a fellow actor who would inspire Coward and introduce him to the works of literary greats such as George Bernard Shaw. Together he and Wynne would form a strong partnership that would only end with Wynne's marriage. Even while working in the theatre as a teenager, Coward was socially ambitious and charming, winning the attention of Philip Streatfield and Mrs. Astley Cooper. At Mrs. Cooper's stately country home. Coward had an opportunity to observe the routines of the wealthy and the servants who accommodated their every wish. These experiences would allow him to move through society with greater ease and also inspired future plays.

By the time Coward was in his late teens, he was writing plays very quickly, but he had not been produced in London. At the suggestion of Gilbert Miller, a Broadway producer, he wrote *l'll Leave It to You*. Although the reviews were generally wonderful, the show only played for thirty-seven performances. For Coward, it was a milestone show. It marked the end of her professional relationship with Wynne (she played Faith Crombie) and the beginning of his extraordinary relationship with the press. The press called him "an amazing youth" and "an infant prodigy". Coward learned to feed the press with comments like, "The success of it all has been a bit dazzling. This may be an age of youth, but it does not always happen that young people get their chance of success. I have been exceptionally lucky; I made up my mind I would have one of my plays produced in London by the time I was twenty, and I hope soon to be my own manager as well."

Like so many other artists, this "bright young thing" would not become an overnight success with *I'll Leave It to You*. This show simply established him as a playwright with a significant future. He would become a skilled entertainer who would delight audiences with plays like *The Vortex*, *Hay Fever*, *Design for Living*, and *Private Lives*. He would write songs generations would sing with enthusiasm and joy. Of course, Anna Eva Fay and Mrs. Coward knew that years before the world did.



Michael Robinson (Costume Design)



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

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




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Announcing Theatre Three's 2005-2006 Mainstage Season
