

Michael Serrecchia is remembered by Theatre Three audiences for his direction of the award winning production of A Class Act and Seven Keys to Baldpate. Also as Michael in Beguiled Again and Grateful, the Songs of John Bucchino. Michael also choreographed You're a Good Man Charlie Brown last season.

Dallas area credits include, Director and Choreographer for: Plano Rep; Some Enchanted Evening for Crossroads Theatre; Steel Magnolias, Genderella, and Pageant, which won Column Awards for Best Musical and Best Director of a Musical, for WaterTower Theatre, and the role of The Reverend Mr. Septimus Chrisparkle in Drood.



As an Adjunct Professor of Musical Theatre at UNT Michael Serrecchia directed and choreographed A Little Night Music for the first co-production of the Dance, Theatre, and Opera Departments.

Michael now owns M2 GALLERIES in NYC, Chicago, and Dallas and heads up the Musical Theatre degree program at KD Studio right here in Dallas.

Terry Dobson (Musical Director)

May 2005 was Terry's 25th anniversary at Theatre Three. He currently serves as Theatre Three's Company Manager and Musical Director. He most recently served as musical director for Merrily We Roll Along and last season's finale, Putting It Together. He has directed numerous hits including I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change, Myths and Hymns, First Lady Suite, and recently You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown. As an actor, Terry has appeared in Theatre Three productions of Sylvia, Nice People Dancing to Good Country Music, Beyond Therapy, Death Defying Acts, God's Man in Texas, and last season's Dirty Blonde.

Don Alan Croll



Don Alan Croll, a native of Buffalo, New York, has exceptional theatrical as well as cantorial credentials. He began his acting career as the Baby Bear in Mrs. Robinson's first-grade class production of *The Three Bears*. From there, his career skyrocketed! After graduating with honors from the Ithaca College Theatre Department in New York, he appeared in the 1971 Broadway revival of On the Town with Bernadette Peters and toured in Man of La Mancha playing the Barber to such Don Quixotes as Allan Jones, John Raitt, and Howard Keel. He starred in the award-wining Off-Broadway Yiddish musical The Golden Land. He was seen in L.A. area productions of Big River and Funny Girl, the latter with Pia Zadora and Kaye Ballard. He appeared in the record-breaking San Diego premiere of I'm Not Rappaport playing 81-year-old Nat Moyer for which he was nominated for Best Actor in a Play by the San Diego Theatre Critics Circle. Don presented his one-manshow about the life of Danny Kaye, Songs of the Redhead for an unprecedented three years in a row at the University of Judaism in Los Angeles for the Performing Arts program. His television credits include appearances on General Hospital, Nine to Five with Sally Struthers, the Movie of the Week, Donor with Melissa Gilbert and Reasonable Doubts with Marlee Matlin.

Don has performed in cabaret from New York City's Bushes to Los Angeles' The Gardenia Supper Club. He has also concertized around the country and in Israel as well. In 2002 he sang at the Kennedy Center's July 4th concert, "Let Freedom Sing."

Don is an invested cantor. He graduated from the Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion School of Sacred Music in 1978. He spent ten years as the full-time cantor and music director of Temple Beth Torah in Upper Nyack, New York. He has appeared numerous times as a guest soloist with Kol Echad, the premiere Jewish chorale in Southern California, the Turtle Creek Chorale in Dallas, and the New Mexico Symphony. He is a member of the Cantor's Assembly and a past board member of the American Conference of Cantors. Don is entering his tenth year of service with Temple Shalom in Dallas. He was honored two years ago for his twenty-five years in the cantorate with honorary doctorate in music from Hebrew Union College.

A Note From Don Alan Croll

To try to duplicate the performance style of Danny Kaye would be an insult to his memory. Rather, I'd like to try to bring to mind the memory each of you have of this unique performer. Danny Kaye recorded a lot of memorable songs during his career — forgive me if I don't sing your favorite. For most of Kaye's success, his wife, Sylvia Fine, shares the credit. Few collaborators worked so well together. In all his work, new or old, he never forgot how he got where he got. He used to say, "Sylvia has a 'fine' head on my shoulders." I am pleased to tell you that I have received special permission from their daughter, Dena, to perform three songs composed by Sylvia Fine, and for this I am very grateful.

I hope you enjoy the evening.

"The best things happen when you're dancing..."

Danny Kaye was a character or perhaps better said, many characters. His talent for loosing himself in an array of costumes, faces, and personalities brought him from the public schools of Brooklyn, to the Borscht Circuit – the summer camps of the Catskill Mountains, to television and film, and all over the world performing in variety shows for children and military troops. Paired with his wife, the levelheaded Sylvia Fine, who wrote much of his material, he was unstoppable as a force in comedy and philanthropy. His audiences were always rolling in their seats and often throwing money at his benefiting charities, primarily UNICEF.

He was a man of many hats with split-second costume changes for countless characters, but also fulfilling roles far removed from acting. He held every commercial pilot license, flying himself to many of the stops on his world tours, could imitate almost any language, was a master chef, and even conducted symphonies relying on his ability to soak in a score despite an inability to read music. His tour of symphony orchestras, raising money for musician maintenance funds and pension plans, took him to New York, Los Angeles, London, Toronto, Tel Aviv, Stockholm, and even to Dallas.

Danny Kaye brought laughter into the average American home with Lucille Ball in *The Danny Kaye Show*, considered one of the best television shows of its time, and the CBS special, *An Hour With Danny Kaye*. He lit up the silver screen in movies such as *Hans Christian Andersen*, *The Court Jester, White Christmas, The Madwoman of Chaillot*, and many, many others. His costars include Katherine Hepburn, Louis Armstrong, and Gene Kelly. The world was in love with this redhead for his comedy, generosity, lunacy, and his immense talent.







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T.J. Walsh (Director)



T.J. Walsh has directed plays from California to New York to Texas. He has a Ph.D. in Theatre History and Criticism and an M.F.A in playwriting from the University of Texas at Austin. Among his areas of research interest are Classical Greece and Ancient Rome. He is very happy to be directing at Theatre Three again. He teaches at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, Texas.

Jac Alder (Set Design)

Alder, trained as a architect, designed Theatre Three's performing spaces and many of the productions' sets including *Metamor-phoses*. The idiosyncratic Bruce Goff was his primary professor at the University of Oklahoma. Following his military service in the early '60s, Alder worked in Dallas for George L. Dahl (during the day while working nights and weekends for Theatre Three). Some of architecture's greatest practitioners have provided him with philosophies he finds useful, not only in design, but in all aspects of theatre as well. Examples: "The most important material in any building — even including aluminum — is the human being," (Richard Neutra in a lecture for Alcoa). "God is in the details," (Meis van der Rohn). "Form follows function." (Frank Lloyd Wright), and the wonderful corralary, "Form follows feminine," (Oscar Neimeyer). And finally, "Sometimes I don't know what the hell I'm doing.," (Philip Johnson).

Tristan Decker (Lighting Design)

Tristan has designed for Our Endeavors Theatre Collective, Undermain Theatre, Kitchen Dog, Ewert and Co., Matrice Enterprises, Cara Mia Theatre Company and has current designs at Classical Acting Company and the Shakespeare Festival of Dallas soon. He is wrapping up his sixth year as the resident Set and Lighting Designer/Technical Director for the University of Dallas. He has received the DFW Theater Critics Forum Award and has been nominated for both the Leon Rabin Awards and the Column Awards. He also performs regularly with the Actor's Company Murder Mysteries. Previous Theatre Three lighting design work includes *Putting It Together*.

Michael Robinson (Costume Design)

Although this is Michael's first design credit for Theatre Three, he is no stranger to Metroplex theatre. He has designed many shows for the WaterTower Theatre, Uptown Players, CrossRoads Theatre, Plano Repertory Theatre, Garland Civic Theatre, Garland Summer Musicals, Lyric Stage, Contemporary Theatre of Dallas, Kaufman Civic Theatre, and Coppell Community Theatre. He has also designed for many of our local colleges and universities: University of North Texas Opera Theatre, Texas Christian University Opera Studio, University of Texas at Dallas, Brookhaven College, and Richland College. His awards include "Best Costume Shop" (Dallas Oberserver 2000), "Best Costumes" for Old Settler (Dallas-Fort Worth Critics Forum Award 2003), the Leon Rabin Award for Best Costumes for (42nd Street 2003), and the Column Awards for Best Costume in a Play or Musical (2001, 2002).

Mary Zimmerman (Broadway director/adapter)

Mary Zimmerman is the 1998 recipient of a MacArthur Fellowship, the 2002 Tony Award for best director, and 10 Joseph Jefferson Awards, including ones for "Best Production" and "Best Direction." She is a member of the Lookingglass Theatre Company of Chicago, an Artistic Associate of the Goodman and Seattle Repertory Theatres, and a Professor of Performance Studies at Northwestem University. Works which she has adapted and directed include Silk (Goodman), The Notebooks of Leonardo da Vinci (Goodman, BAM, Seattle Rep), The Odyssey (Lookingglass, Goodman, McCarter, Seattle Rep), Arabian Nights (Lookingglass, MTC, BAM), Journey To The West (Goodman, Huntington, Berkeley Rep), Metamorphoses (Lookingglass, Seattle Rep, Berkeley Rep, Mark Taper Forum, Second Stage), Secret in the Wings, S/M (Lookingglass), Eleven Rooms of Proust (Lookingglass, About Face). Ms. Zimmerman has also directed Pericles (The Shakespeare Theatre, Washington, D.C.) Measure for Measure, Henry VIII (NYSF), A Midsummer Night's Dream (Huntington), All's Well That Ends Well and Seneca's Trojan Women (Goodman). In 2002 she created a new opera with Philip Glass called Galileo Galilei which played at the Goodman Theatre, the Barbican in London, and the Brooklyn Academy of Music. Her recent Lookingglass production, The Secret in the Wings based on fairy tales is currently on tour to Berkeley, Seattle, and Princeton.

Jennifer Engler (Nursemaid and others, choreography)

Jennifer is honored to be working on her first production at Theatre Three. She currently teaches acting and movement at TCU in Fort Worth. Jennifer has worked as an actor, director, and choreographer for regional and professional theatres in Minneapolis, Detroit, Kansas City, and Chicago. Most recently you may have seen her choreography in Over the Tavern at Circle Theatre or in Baby at Casa Manana. Some of her favorite acting roles include Anna in Baltimore Waltz, Nora in A Doll's House, and Bananas in The House of Blue Leaves.



David Fluitt (Erysichthon and others)

David Fluitt is excited to be involved in *Metamorphoses*, his first show at Theatre Three. Most recently he played the role of Dr. Bruce Flaherty in Firestarter Productions' *Blue/Orange* by Joe Penhall. Other credits include Young Man in Neil LaBute's *bash:* three plays produced at the Lab Theatre Austin, Larry in *Closer* by Patrick Marber, and A in *Crave* by Sarah Kane both produced by Firestarter Productions. David graduated from Texas Christian University with a B.F.A. in Theatre Performance.



Summer Hagen (Aphrodite and others)

Summer is making her debut at Theatre Three with this production of *Metamorphoses*. She earned her B.A. at Hamline University in St. Paul, Minnesota. Her previous theatre credits include the Maid in *Boston Marriage* at Guthrie Lab, Kitty Bennet in *Pride and Prejudice*, Charlotte in *Night of the Iguana*, Marigold in *A Christmas Carol* at the Guthrie Theater, and Elizabeth in *Fair Game* at Eye of the Storm.



Joel McDonald was last seen as the second Venticello in Amadeus at Plano Repertory Theatre, and Mike Hogan in Circle Theatre's A Moon for the Misbegotten. He is very grateful to Theatre Three for giving him his break in Dallas proper. Joel received his B.F.A. from Sam Houston State University, where his stage credits include Alan Strang in Equus and a one-man production of Eric Bogosian's Pounding Nails. When Ovid wrote *Metamorphoses* during the first century, he relied on his audience's familiarity with the gods and goddesses that the Romans worshipped. These deities did not remain in their heavenly kingdoms, aloof from the mortal world. Instead, they inserted themselves into human lives, even becoming the source of human folly. Gods often represented certain attributes of human emotion (i.e. Aphrodite, the goddess of love) or the aspects of nature (i.e. Apollo, the sun god). Together, these gods became the cast of myths that explained human nature as well as unusual natural occurrences. These myths have themselves become immortal, often offering incredible insight into the nature of mankind to modern sociely.

Here's a brief look at a few of *Metamorpheses* gods:

Zeus: The supreme ruler of the gods, also called Lord of the Sky, Rain-god, and Cloud-gatherer. He is often pictured with a thunderbolt. Known for falling in love with many women and trying to hide his infidelity from his wife Hera.

Bacchus: A son of Zeus, known for his party-going ways, was the god of wine and agriculture. As jovial as he could be, he could also be cruel and brutal.

Hermes: Another son of Zeus. His mother was the daughter of Atlas. A graceful god, he is Zeus' messenger and is known as the shrewdest and most cunning god. He also is responsible for guiding souls to the underworld.

Aphrodite: She is known as the goddess of love and has been known to steal the wits of men with her beauty. She is lively and radiant, but she can quickly become jealous, making her volatile and malicious. Her husband is Hephaestus, a lame, ugly god whose even-tempered nature bored her. She prefers Ares, the god of war. While she is considered the goddess of love, her recklessness is more reflective of senseless yearning and lust.


Vertumnus: He is the god of seasons, change, gardens, and fruit trees. His name comes from the vertere meaning "changing" and he used his ability to change his form to woo Pomona.

Pomona: She is goddess of fruit trees and only married Vertumnus after he tricked her. She is often pictured with a pruning knife.

Apollo: Son of Zeus, he is the god of light and truth. He never lied. He was also called the sun-god. He plays a golden lyre and is considered a guide for men to make peace with the gods. His twin sister is Artemis, goddess of the hunt.

Eros: Also known as Cupid, he is the son of Aphrodite. He is the god of love, a blind-folded, sweet-faced youth who does Aprhodite's bidding. His realm is of lust, passion, and fertility. His name is the root word of erotic. He fell in love with Psyche, whose name means "soul."

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
