When Joseph Moncure March wrote *The Wild Party* in 1928, it was a powerful and even repulsive reflection of a society that was spinning out of control. This "Frankie and Johnny" style ballad evokes the complicated passion and cravings of a generation that often considered itself "lost".

America in the 1920's was suffering from an identity crisis. The somewhat young country had prospered because of rapid growth and industrial development. However, the Victorian era's ideas of modesty and decorum suddenly seemed restrictive. World War I, which was considered "the war to end all wars", introduced the United States to chemical warfare and its long-term effects on the soldiers. The war left a patriotic and idealistic generation politically disillusioned and hopeless. A new social dynamic was developing with innovative cultural influences from an emerging African-American culture and a second wave of immigrants that could be just as divisive and destructive as creative and exciting.

African-American culture developed rapidly during the 1920's. The Harlem Renaissance consisted of riveting music, incredible poetry and writing, and a new sense of pride among African-Americans. It was a sort of cultural emancipation. African-Americans were celebrating their heritage and enjoyed an incredible era of intellectual experimentation. The intoxicating rhythms of African-American music and language became the foundation of what would soon be called "The Jazz Age". However, many white American feared this African-American revolution and this fear inspired racist stereotypes, hatred, and the proliferation of groups like the Ku Klux Klan.

In the country known for being the "Melting Pot" of the world, immigrants were facing more challenges and new restrictions. Immigrants from Italy and Ireland arrived in America to find that they were resented and easily persecuted. Their homes were raided because the government mistakenly thought they were Communists. Immigrants were often blamed and punished for crimes they did not commit. Religious differences were another reason immigrants were persecuted. Many Americans did not think Catholicism was compatible with American democracy. Many more American resented immigrants because they added so much competition to the job market. With all of these fears swirling around, the United States government instituted a series of acts that would restrict immigration. The Immigration Act of 1921 only allowed 3% of a specific immigrant group living in the United States based on the 1910 census to enter the United States. In 1924, the act was revised and only allowed 2% of the immigrant population based on the 1890 census. Despite these laws, Americans were forced to redefine what being American actually meant.

The American public reacted to the cultural confusion by outlawing a vice they attributed to immigrants and African Americans: drinking alcohol. The Prohibition movement actually began in the 1890's, with Anti-Saloon League of America developing its influence by enlisting the support of churches, women's groups, and politicians. Alcohol was hated because it was considered immoral, a belief that mirrored the strict ideals of the American Victorian society. Alcohol took men away from their wives and saloons provided a cozy home for gambling and prostitution. The 18th Amendment that declared America dry became law on January 17, 1920. Soon after the amendment passed, the prohibition movement began to unravel. Disputes about how to educate the public and enforce the new laws divided the leadership of the Anti-Saloon League. Meanwhile, saloons and brewers organized themselves and were soon producing their products and selling it illegally. Speakeasies and other secret clubs developed and they were home to more crime than the saloons had ever been. Mobsters and gang wars soon became part of America's culture. The United States discovered that making alcohol illegal meant that its sale and distribution could not be controlled and regulated. On December 5, 1933, prohibition ended.

The Wild Party is very much a story of its time. While critics have debated its value as poetry, it cannot be denied that the poem evokes the chaos of the 1920's. Just as the United States struggled with its own identity, each character struggles to find their place in society. The stripper who sells sex, but yearns for love, the boxing champion who is living on yesterday's glory, and the vaudeville chorus girl who wants to step out of the chorus line and into the spotlight are desperate to be seen as individuals. Sometimes these characters get lost in all of the temptations, opportunities, and excitement of the 1920's.

Jac Alder (Director)



Jac co-founded Theatre Three in 1961 with his late wife Norma Young. He has served the theatre since then as director, actor, designer, composer/lyricist, administrator and chief worrier. Recent directing assignments include *The Hollow, Sly Fox*, and *Mrs. Warren's Profession.* Also in this season, he performed the role of The Devil in Shaw's *Don Juan in Hell* in Theatre Too's Appetizer Attraction Series. He came to the theatre career circuitously. His working career includes teaching baton twirling, serving an office in the U.S. Army, practicing architecture (following his architectural studies at The University of Oklahoma) and heading the drama department at The University of Texas at Arlington. He owes more debt than he can pay to the many theatre artists who have invested their artistic efforts in Theatre Three's forty-three year long effort to provide quality theatre to Dallas and its visitors.

Terry Dobson (Musical Director)

Terry Dobson recently celebrated his 23rd year as a member of Theatre Three's artistic staff where he serves as Company Manager and Musical Director. Earlier this season, he directed *Myths and Hymns* and *Don Juan in Hell* for the new Appetizer Attraction Series in Theatre Too! He just finished performing onstage as Jonathon in *Arsenic and Old Lace*. As a vocal arranger, Terry's work has been performed and recorded by the Turtle Creek Chorale and many other choruses around the counliry. Last year, the L.A. Gay Men's Chorus sang one of his arrangements in an episode of HBO's *Six Feet Under*. Terry is a Leon Rabin Award winner for Outstanding Musical Direction and has received six Column Awards for Stage and Musical Direction.

Jack H. Degelia (Choreographer)

A Dallas native, he has had a varied career in both theatre and television. As a director and choreographer, he won critical acclaim for his productions based on the original works of Bob Fosse, Gower Champion, Jerome Robbins, Michael Bennett, and Tommy Tune including Damn Yankees, Sweet Charity, Pippin, West Side Story, Fiddler on the Roof, Hello Dolly!, The King and I, and A Day in Hollywood! A Night in Ukraine (Leon Rabin nomination) to name a few. He was recognized by the Southern California Theatre Association with a nomination for Distinguished Contribution to Theatre. As an actor his New York and touring credits include major roles in A Chorus Line, Fiddler on the Roof, West Side Story, A Day in Hollywood! A Night in Ukraine, Children of A Lesser God, A Long Journey Into Night, Cabaret, and Falsettoland.

Jeff Crouse (Assistant Musical Director)

The Wild Party is Jeff's first mainstage show at Theatre Three. He played on 150 shows of I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change! during its Theatre Too! run. By day, he teaches music at The Winston School. By night, he plays piano and/or musical directs shows. Recent are credits include Opal, Kiss of the Spider Woman, Oliver!, and Funny Girl. He would like to thank Terry for asking him to play, this wonderful cast, and the theatre gods for letting him have time to do it!

Harland Wright (Director of Design)

Harland has worked at Theatre Three as the Director of Design for nearly 35 years. Beginning with *Thieves' Carnival* in 1967, his recent productions include *God's Man in Texas, The Unexpected Guest, Sideshow, and Blood Brothers.* He was also the set designer for Theatre Too's *I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change!* and several shows of 2002-2003's season. Mr. Wright's designs have been seen on national TV ads, film, and locally at Dallas Repertory Theatre, Lyric Stage, Ft. Worth Opera, Dallas Children's Theatre and Dallas Theatre Center Children's Theatre.

Juan DiNero (Set Design)

Juan is delighted to collaborate with Harland Wright on the set for *The Wild Party*. Carl Munoz (Lighting Design)


