#### ABOUT JOHN KANDER(the music) & FRANK EBB (the words)

This dynamic songwriting team has been together for nearly fifty years and is considered one of the most successful partnership of musical theatre. Together, they have created some of Broadway's most insightful and powerful music.

Composer John Kander was born in Kansas City, Missouri on March 18, 1927. As a sickly infant, he learned to create memories and impressions simply by listening to sounds associated with certain people and places. For him, sound was an instinctive way to learn about the world around him. For example, he remembers listening to Wagern's opera *Tristan and Isolde* after several piano lessons, and credits that musical experience for his love of Wagner. In New York, his career started as a substitute pianist for *West Side Story*. Then he was asked to play at the auditions for *Gypsy*. After auditions, he was asked to write some dance arrangements for *Gypsy*. He always remembers the people who gave him a chance when he was just starting his career and fondly recalls those "happy accidents" that helped build his remarkable career.

Although lyricist Fred Ebb, born April 8, 1935, did not grow up in a musical family enjoyed the advantage of growing up in New York City and seeing shows on Broadway. He was enchanted by the experience of live theatre, and clearly remembers being inspired by the Al Jolson musical, *Hold Onto Your Hats*. He loved how reality and illusion seem to blur together onstage. At first, Ebb was not sure how he could contribute to musical theatre. Ebb couldn't sing or play the piano, but he was very good at writing "little poems". He knew that he loved musical theatre much that he wanted to make it his life's work. When he discussed his dilemma with a friend, she set up a meeting with Phil Springer, a professional songwriter. Springer taught Ebb about songwriting, and it was during this time that Ebb wrote a song for Judy Garland. Ebb commented in a recent interview with David Thompson, "And it seems odd now, in light of my lifetime association with Liza Minnelli, that my first professional job was writing a song for her mother".

In 1963, Tommy Volando introduced Kander to Ebb and the song "A Coloring Book" was the first success they shared together. A young producer, Harold Prince noticed their growing talent and hired them to write Flora, The Red Menace. Besides introducing this creative team, the show also showcased Liza Minelli in her Broadway debut. Harold Prince again chose to hire them to write Cabaret, an incredible musical success that ran for 1,166 performances on Broadway in its premiere run. Its recent revival (still playing in New York and on tour) has now run longer than the initial production! Other theatrical collaborations include The Happy Time, Zorba, 70 Girls 70, Chicago, The Act, Woman of the Year, The Rink, The Kiss of the Spider Woman, and Steel Pier.

Individual songs for films have been successful as well. They wrote five songs for the film, Funny Lady, the sequel to Funny Girl. In 1976, they wrote New York, New York for a movie of the same title that was directed by Martin Scorsese and starred Liza Minelli and Robert DeNiro. In 1981, Mayor Koch declared the song the official song of New York City. Many awards have been showered on their work — Tonys, Oscars, and Grammys. In 1998, they were recognized as Kennedy Center Honorees.

Though both men grew up in an era when Broadway shows provided America with is popular music, writing popular hit songs have not ever been their aim. Kander and Ebb pursue complex and difficult social and political issues with penetrating intelligence. They have also written several songs about exploring the world, facing all of its challenges, and enjoying every moment of life. These songwriters write music to show the development of the human emotions of a person who exists on stage. In an interview with David Thompson, Kander remarked, "Our goal is to serve the story or the character. That's what we must do as songwriters. Our music must live within the world we create."

#### BIOGRAPHIES OF THE ACTORS

Patrick Amos (The Janitor) was last seen at Theatre Three as Bobby in The Boy Friend. His regional credits include Angels in America as Belize (for which he received the B. Iden Payne Award in Austin), The Piano Lesson for New Stage Theatre, Hair and Dracula, the Prince at Alliance Theatre, and Short Eves at the South Dallas Cultural Center. His films and television credits include Walker, Texas Ranger, 13 East, High Amgitions and Sons of Thunder as well as numerous voice-overs. "My growth and journey continues. Thank you, God."

Jamey Cheek (The Drug Dealer) is excited to be making his Theatre Three debut. He has spent the last three years working on a doctorate degree in counseling at Texas Tech, and plans to defend his final dissertation this summer. His previous theatre experience includes Closer Than Ever at Watertower Theatre, Most Happy Fella at Stage, and Mata Hari and Hair at Deep Ellum Opera Theater. Other favorite roles include Huck Finn in Big River and Danny Zuko in Grease. Thanks to S. and Diva for love and support.

Sergio Antonio Garcia (The Sailor) is making his Theatre Three debut. He received his Bachelors of Arts in Music/Voice from the University of North Texas, and he attended the American Musical Dramatic Academy in New York City. He has performed in operas, ballets, and musical theatre in New York, Italy, Las Vegas, and regionally in Texas. His favorite role was The Baker in Into the Woods at Richardson Children's Theatre, and he has appeared in Evita, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Coat, Best Little Whorehouse in Texas, and Texas! at Palo Duro. Mr. Garcia wants to thank Theatre Three for this great opportunity -- especially Bruce, Linda, and Terry. He would also like to thank his friends and family for their love and support, and thanks to God for all his blessings without which none of this would be possible.

Lisa-Gabrielle Greene (The Rich Lady) is thrilled to be back in Dallas! While on a three year sojourn in Indianapolis, Ms. Greene worked with the Phoenix Theatre and the Gregory Hancock Dance Theatre where she contributed to the development of La Casa Azul, a new musical based on the life of Mexican artist Frida Kahlo. Theatre Three audiences will remember Ms. Greene as the Princess Leonide in Triumph of Love, Belle in Dreams from a Summer House, Elvira in Blithe Spirit, and as a Dallas Critics Forum Award recipient for "Best Ensemble" in A Grand Night for Singing. Television audiences will recognize Ms. Greene from various roles on the PBS show, Wishbone. She sends out love and reverence to Norma and Jac: in 1988 their theatre produced The Fantasticks, where while playing Luisa, she met and fell in love with her husband, Chris Westfall.

Wilson King (The Bar Singer) is happy to return to Theatre Three after spending two and a half years in the hppiest place on earth where she performed in the Grand Opening of the Animal Kingdom at Walt Disney World. She went on to perform as a storyteller and Master of Ceremonies at the Animal Kingdom and the Magic Kingdom. Performing under the name of Natalie King, she appeared at Theatre Three in Rise & Shine, Once on This Island, and in A Grand Night for Singing which won "Best Ensemble" by the Dallas Critics Forum. Other credits include Godspell, Back to Bacharach, Hair, The Connection, and The Grass Harpt, and is the founder of Universal Connection. (continued)



from the desk of the executive producer-director, JAC ALDER

Dear Playgoer,

The World Goes 'Round is this phenomenal season's final show.

What a year it has been! It has been a year of change and growth here where we're celebrating the 40th anniversary of our beginnings in 1961.

Every show of the season was both a challenge for us and a growth experience. 
