



ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT

Alan Ayckbourn was born in London in 1939, but spent most of his childhood in Sussex. He began his stage career at the age of seventeen, acting and stage managing productions at repertory theatres in Worthing, Leatherhead, Oxford, and finally with Stephen Joseph's Studio Theatre in Scarborough. Between 1965 and 1969 he produced radio drama from the BBC Leeds' Studios and since 1969 has been Director of Productions at the Library Theatre, Scarborough.

His first play to be seen in London, "Mr. Whatnot," was presented at the Arts Theatre in 1964. Since then many of his plays have been successfully staged in the West End, including "Relatively Speaking" (1967), "How the Other Half Loves" (1970), "Time and Time Again" (1972), "Absurb Person Singular" (winner of the Evening Standard Award for Best Comedy, 1973), "The Norman Conquests" (winner of the Evening Standard and Plays and Players Awards for Best Play, 1974), "Absent Friends" (1975), "Confusions" (1976), "Just Between Outselves" (Winner of the Evening Standard Award For Best Play, 1977), "Bedroom Farce" (1977), "Ten Times Tables" (1978), and "Joking Apart" (1979).

"Bedroom Farce" was first produced at the Library Theatre in June, 1975 and subsequently at the National Theatre, London, in March, 1977. The play made its American debut in February, 1979 at the Eisenhower Theatre, Washington, D. C. and in March, 1979 opened on Broadway at the Brooks Atkinson Theatre.


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

*JENNY BOURGEOIS (Susannah), a native of Dallas, received her B.F.A. from Southern Methodist Universitu and her master's degree from North Texas State University. "Bedroom Farce" marks Miss Bourgeois' third production at Theatre Three and her first opportunity to appear on stage with former S.M.U. classmate Connie Nelson, Included among Miss Bourgeois' favorite Dallas roles are Masha in "The Seagull," Gwen in "Fifth of July" and Jenny Diver in "The Threepenny Opera."

*DWAIN FAIL (Malcolm) is making his Theatre Three debut in "Bedroom Farce." Mr. Fail recently completed the role of Grovsnere in Dallas Repertory Theatre's production of "Patience." His long list of stage credits include Paul in "Carnival," Norman in "The Norman Conquests," Tony in "Royal Family," Stanley in "Streetcar Named Desire," Sky in "Guys and Dolls," and Will in "A Crv of Players." In addition to his many theatre performances, Mr. Fail has been seen and heard in numerous television and radio commercials.

*HUGH FEAGIN (Ernest) was last featured at Theatre Three as Boris Trigorin in the spring production of Chekhov's "The Seagull." Since making his first Theatre Three appearance in 1963's "The Night of the Iguna," Mr. Feagin has accumulated a long list of credits including "After The Fall," "That Championship Season," "Twigs," "And Miss Reardon Drinks a Little." "The Skin of Our Teeth," "Hedda Gabler," among others. Mr. Feagin has also been seen in nine feature films, dinner theatre productions, and "Passage to India" on Broadway.

**LINDA HUMPHRIES (Kate) began her theatrical career touring with the U.S.O. at the age of two. Miss Humphries temporarily left the stage to enter the world of competitive figure skating. She was the winner of several national skating championships and emerged as a teaching professional. Her love for the theatre prevailed, however, and she eventually returned to the stage. Her recent credits in Houston and Dallas theatres have included Elvira in "Blithe Spirit," Anne Miller in "6 Rms Riv Vu," and Felicia Andrayson in "Finishing Touches."

**WILLIAM F. MARTIN (Trevor), originally from Omaha, Nebraska, is making his Theatre Three debut in "Bedroom Farce." Lured from folk singing into acting several years ago, Mr. Martin has been seen in numerous roles including Blake Barton in "Bells are Ringing," Perchik in "Fiddler on the Roof," Proteus in "Two Gentlemen of Verona," Cooper in "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof," and Feste in "Twelfth Night" at last summer's Fort Worth Shakespeare Festival.

**ROBERT BURTON MILLER (Nick) made his first stage appearance at the age of ten at the Mummer's Theatre in his hometown, Oklahoma City, More recently he originated the role of Richard in the Theatre Onstage production of "Katie, Inc." Other favorite roles include Cliff in "Look Back in Anger." Rob Mayo in "Beyond The Horizon" and Trofimov in "The Cherry Orchard." Mr. Miller maintains an active interest in politics having been influenced by his father who served as a campaign manager for a governor, a U.S. senator, and a state senator.

*CONNIE NELSON (Jan), long a favorite of Theatre Three audiences, most recently appeared on our stage in last summer's "Yip, Yip, Hooray." She also was a member of the Theatre Three touring company of "Yip, Yip, Hooray!" and "Porter, Please" this fall. A graduate of S.M.U., Miss Nelson worked as a "Havmaker" at Country Dinner Playhouse while earning her acting degree. Her other Theatre Three credits include Roxie Hart in "Chicago," Sister Rita in "The Runner Stumbles" and a principal performer in "Side by Side by Sondheim." She also has appeared in "SouthPacific" at the Dallas Summer Musicals and in "Fiddler on the Roof" which she toured with Herschel Bernardi.

*NORMA YOUNG (Delia) recently completed the role of Lady Jane Hunstanton in Theatre Three's production of Oscar Wilde's "A Woman of No Importance." Well-known in Dallas as the founder of Theatre Three. Miss Young is an accomplished actress and director. While serving as Theatre Three's Artistic Director from 1960 to 1976, Miss Young introduced Dallas audiences to such playwrights as Albee, Pinter, Genet and

roles of Irina Arkadina in "The Seagull," Miss Heneage in "The New York Idea," Leona in "Small Craft Warnings," and Beverly in "The Shadow Box." Miss Young, who is also active in television and film work, will be seen on February 10 in the CBS made-for-television movie "Crisis At Central High," starring Joanne Woodward and Charles Durning.

*LAURENCE O'DWYER (Director), an influential member of the Theatre Three family since 1962, has most recently been involved with the direction of the theatre's current children's production, "The Happy Prince," A graduate of Chicago's Goodman Theatre. Mr. O'Dwyer made a significant contribution to the opening of the '80-81 season with his stunning performance in "Strider." Among the memorable Theatre Three productions Mr. O'Dwver has directed in past seasons are "Chicago," "For Colored Girls Who Have Considered Suicide/When The Rainbow is Enuf," "Happy End," "The Seagull," "Ladies At the Alamo," and "The Robber Bridegroom." Mr. O'Dwyer took a two-year hiatus from his work at Theatre Three to serve as the Chairman of the Drama Department at Bennington College, Bennington, Vermont.

*CHARLES HOWARD (Set Designer, Stage Manager) joined the Theatre Three staff in 1975 as Associate Director and principal set designer. Among his recent credits in set design are "A Woman of No Importance," "Strider," "Yip, Yip, Hooray," "How I Got That Story," "The Taking Away of Little Willie," and "The New York Idea." A graduate of the University of Virginia with a master's degree in theatre, Mr. Howard taught drama at Mary Washington College in Virginia and at Memphis State University before coming to Theatre Three.

PATTY GREER MCGARITY (Costume Designer) began her association with Theatre Three in 1965 and has since designed the costumes for over a hundred productions. Educated at North Texas State UniverLAURENCE O'DWYER


sity, Mrs. McGarity has guest lectured at Bauder College and El Centro College. In 1972, she travelled to Vermont's Bennington College to serve as quest costumer for their production of "The School for Wives." Besides designing and supervising Theatre Three's costume crew, Mrs. McGarity manages the theatre's active costume rental service.

*SHARI MELDE (Lighting Designer), a native of Dallas, studied art at Trinity University and technical theatre at S.M.U. Her association with Theatre Three dates back to 1965 when she volunteered to assist in operating the lights for "Stop the World, I Want to Get Off!" Over the vears Miss Melde has become one of the theatre's most valued lighting designers. Her recent credits include "Present Laughter," "The Seagull," "For Colored Girls Who Have Considered Suicide/When The Rainbow is Enuf," "The New York Idea," "Chicago," "Strider," and "A Woman of No Importance."

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
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


The Fire Marshall prohibits smoking in the auditorium


The House Manager prohibits refreshments in the auditorium.
