DAVID BENN (Aaron) — A native of Oklahoma and a newcomer to the Theatre Three stage, David Benn received a B.A. in drama from Southeastern Oklahoma State University where he was named "Best Actor" during their 1976-77 season. He moved to Dallas three months ago following a three-year stint teaching drama in Tecumseh, Oklahoma.

ALAN DENNY (M.C.) — Another Oklahoma native. Alan Denny is also making his Theatre Three debut in "Chicago," He has appeared in the Houston stage production of "The Rocky Horror Show", in Dallas Repertory Theatre's "Shenandoah" and "Once Upon A Mattress" and in the Theatre Onstage production of "Godspell" as Judas.

VALERIE DOWD (June) - This is Valerie Dowd's first appearance at Theatre Three. She is currently a senior at North Texas State University where she is a speech and drama major. Ms. Dowd is also a cellist in the N.T.S.U. Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Anshel Brusilow.

JAMES DUFF (Fred Casely) — Although this is James Duff's first performance at Theatre Three. *Member, Actors' Equity Association

*B. FERGUSON (Mary Sunshine) — B. Ferguson was born in Rio de Janeiro and spent two years there before moving to the United States, B. studied acting and theatre management before beginning work at the Dallas Civic Opera in 1973. Previous productions at Theatre Three include "The Gingerbread Lady" and "The Misanthrope".

CONSTANCE HUTCHINSON (Hunyak) -Constance Hutchinson graduated cum laude from Texas Christian University with a degree in theatre arts. She has appeared in "Can-Can", "George M", and "Irene" at the Granbury Opera House and in "School For Scandal", "You Can't Take It With You" and "Cabaret" at the T.C.U. Theatre.

DAVID LEE KISTNER (Sergeant Fogarty) -David Lee Kistner is another Theatre Three newcomer. He has had principal roles in area productions of "Godspell" and "Charlie's Aunt"

*DAVID LAMOUREUX (Billy Flynn) - David Lamoureux made his Theatre Three debut in last season's successful finale, "Side by Side by Sondheim". The production enjoyed an extended run in Dallas before going on the road to the Victory Theatre in Dayton, Ohio where it broke all box office records during its three-night engagement. A graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Mr. Lamoureux has previously appeared as Bobby in "Company", Walter in "Generation", and Lt. Cable in "South Pacific".

BETH LITHERLAND (Velma Kelly) — A M.F.A. graduate of S.M.U., Beth Litherland is making her second appearance at Theatre Three. She was last seen in "Jumpers" as Dotty. Miss Litherland's numerous musical roles include Adeleide in "Guys and Dolls", Louise in "Gypsy", Jenny in "Three Penny Opera" and Marta in "Company". *DAVID MAY (Amos Hart) — David May holds a degree in theatre from Trinity University. He has appeared previously at Theatre Three, most recently as Billy Jester in "Little Mary Sunshine". Other stage credits include - Riff Raff in "The Rocky Horror Show", Cootie in "Moonchildren", and Adaurand Flip in "The Apple Tree".

*CONNIE NELSON (Roxie Hart) - During Theatre Three's '78-79 season, Connie Nelson was featured as Sister Rita in "The Runner Stumbles" and in "Side by Side by Sondheim". She also appeared last season in the off-Broadway production of "Kennedy's Children". A graduate of S.M.U., she has performed in the Dallas Summer Musical's "South Pacific" and toured with Herschel Bernardi in "Fiddler On The Roof".

DARLENE O'HARA (Liz) - A newcomer to Theatre Three, Darlene O'Hara has studied acting at S.M.U. Previous stage experience includes roles in "Godspell", "Blacknet" and "Funny Girl" at Dallas Repertory Theatre, "One Flew Over The Cuckoo's Nest" at N.T.S.U. and "Gypsy" at Mountainview College.

Although she plays a blonde in "Chicago", she is a red-head by choice. She is also the mother of teenage boys.

JOAN POWERS (Mona) — A singer, dancer, and choreographer. Joan Powers was formerly with the "Ballet Concerto" and the "Southwestern Ballet". She appeared in Casa Manana's "Anything Goes" and has been seen for the past three seasons at the Six Flags Southern Palace. She choreographed and performed in the 1979 "Miss Texas Pageant".

RICHARD ROBERTS (Band Leader, Judge) — Since returning to Dallas last fall, Richard Roberts has appeared as Nathan in Dallas Repertory Theatre's production of "Shenandoah" and as the minstrel in "Once Upon a Mattress", also at D.R.T. Other appearances include Jeffrey in "Godspell" at Theatre Onstage and Bob McCaffrey in "South Pacific" at Casa Manana. He also has several industrial films and commercials to his credit.

NANCY SHERRARD (Annie) - Nancy Sherrard's last role at Theatre Three was as Martine in "The Learned Ladies". Stage work during the past year includes a role in "Nightwatch" at the Frenchy McCormick Dinner Theatre and in "The Bedroom Star of Broadway", an original one woman show staged at the Will Rogers Auditorium. She has performed as a featured vocalist with Greg Wietzel and Friends and they are currently recording their debut album, "Old Hotel".







STEPHANIE STATESON (Go-To-Hell Kittu) -Stephanie Stateson has been performing since she was thirteen years old in non-professional and community theatres. She spent her past summer doing eight shows a day in the Ozark Mountains in "Dogpatch U.S.A." Her evenings during that summer were spent driving to Eurika Springs, Missouri, where she performed in "The Great Passion Play", an outdoor drama about the life of Christ.

STEVE TOMMEY (Harry, Court Clerk) — After spending five years as a mortgage banker, Steve Tommey decided to leave his 9-to-5 job and pursue a career in theatre. He has appeared in Dallas Repertory Theatre's "Funny Girl" and "Taming of the Shrew", in "The Fantasticks" at Addison Community Theatre, and in the movie "The Trial of Lee Harvey Oswald".

LARRY O'DWYER (Director) - Since his Theatre Three debut in 1962, Larry O'Dwyer has contributed his wealth of talents to a long list of productions. A graduate of Goodman Theatre in Chicago, O'Dwyer's most recent credits include the directing of "Ladies at the Alamo", "The Robber Bridgeroom" and "Happy End". Last season he was featured in three productions -"The Shadow Box", "The Miser" and "Jumpers". O'Dwyer, who spent two years as the Chairman of the Drama Department at Vermont's Bennington College, is currently serving as Theatre Three's Director of Conservatory. He has been responsible for coordinating Theatre Three's children's productions, which included last season's successful "Rumpelstiltskin".

LAURA CASH (Choreographer) — After a leave of absence from dancing to pursue the career of wife and mother. Laura Cash returned to S.M.U. to acquire her M.F.A. in dance. She has performed in and choreographed numerous revues for charity organizations, as well as instructed children

in school productions. A slightly divergent endeavor for her is directing and staging movement for a singer's night club act, "Chicago" is her first Theatre Three affiliation.

DEAN CROCKER (Musical Director) — Dean Crocker has served as the musical director and conductor for six productions at North Texas State University during the past three years and has also provided musical direction for the White Rock Kiwanis Club production of "Mame". During Casa Manana's 1979 season, Mr. Crocker served as rehearsal and performance pianist. He has earned his Master of Music degree from N.T.S.U. and has served for the past four years as a teaching fellow in electronic music, composition and orchestration.

BOB FOSSE (Co-Author) — Bob Fosse, who coauthored as well as directed and choreographed the Broadway production of "Chicago", was the first director in history to win the Oscar, Tony and Emmy Awards in a single year. It was 1973 and the prizes were for the film version of "Cabaret", the Broadway musical "Pippin" and Liza Minnelli's television special "Liza with a Z". He won his first Tony Award as choreographer for "Pajama Game" and had won seven more up to 1978, when "Dancin'" became his crowning achievement as a choreographer and director. Other Broadway credits include "Sweet Charity", "Pippin" and "Damn Yankees".

JOHN KANDER (Composer) and FRED EBB (Co-author and Lyricist) — John Kander and

Fred Ebb first combined their efforts as song writers, creating the hit single, "My Coloring Book" followed by "I Don't Care Much", both written for Barbra Streisand. Their Broadway collaboration began in 1965 with "Flora, the Red Menace". It began a long association between the pair and show's star, Liza Minnelli, for whom they wrote the television special, "Liz with a Z". winner of several Emmies. All the movies that Miss Minnelli made in the 1970's had scores by the pair. These included "Lucky Lady", "Cabaret", "A Matter of Time" and "New York, New York". They have also authored several television specials, including: "Three For The Girls" (1973), starring Carrol O'Connor: "Ole Blue Eyes Is Back" (1974), starring Frank Sinatra; and "Gypsy In My Soul" (1976), starring Shirley MacLaine.

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

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
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
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THEATRE THREE'S 1979-80 SEASON
