
Notes From The Director

The subject of "Company" is marriage. Our unmarried hero, Bobby, is attractive, smart and charming. All his friends are married and they dote on him. The question for Bobby is: will the devotion of five individual couples supply the missing ingredient in his life?

This is a play that takes place in Bobby's mind. The scenes with the various couples aren't necessarily as they **were**, but how he recollects them. He's a voyeur of life, not a participant. In the end, he begins the task of being alive without the necessity of clinging to these "good and crazy people - my married friends". Courage, Bobby — we all go through it! It's only tougher when you are bad at fooling yourself, but still it's possible. The one woman in your future will make you happy and unhappy. And you, like the husbands tell us early in the show, will be "Sorry-Grateful". But that's what it's all about, isn't it?
