ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT

By the mid-1920's Noel Coward had established himself as the most versatile and most sophisticated theatre craftsman of the post World War I generation. With seemingly equal ease he wrote plays and acted in them, wrote musicals and sang and danced in them — and directed them. In the 1930's, he began producing his own shows and those of others.

Born in 1899 in Teddington, England, Coward had a private education and entered a drama school as a child, making his professional stage debut at the age of ten in a company that included another child player with whom he formed a lifelong friendship, Gertrude Lawrence. He wrote two of his outstanding entertainments — "Private Lives" and "Tonight at 8:30" — as vehicles for their appearances together at the height of their careers more than twenty years later.





In the years following his first successes Coward added another superlative to his string of "most versatile" and "most sophisticated", by becoming also one of the most prolific theatre men of his generation. During his career he turned out thirty-one successful plays, eleven musicals, a handful of movies, two novels, nine other books and numerous short stories, while continuing also to act.

The original production of "Present Laughter" toured the English provinces, as one of three plays collectively known as "Play Parade", before opening at the Haymarket Theatre, London, on April 29, 1943 with Mr. Coward in the role of Garry Essendine. The play's title is taken from the Clown's Song in Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night" — 'Present mirth hath present laughter!'. Mr. Coward has said "Present Laughter" was written "to brighten the darker days of World War II."





BRIAN HINSON (Roland Maule) became an experienced snake handler in a recent production of "Holy




