STREAMS TO RIVER . . . (Notes from the producer on The Second Stage Festival)

...Thirty months ago I sat beside a sharp, cheerful stranger on a plane from Dallas to Austin. We found a common enthusiasm: he had been a college bandmaster and I had been OU's rah-rah trumpet player. Later that day we found ourselves on the same platform speaking on arts in education.

... Last spring I read a flyer from an out-oftown theatre extolling the virtues of a new script being produced. It had a good title, But I knew other theatres wouldn't be producing it unless it had some success in a subsequent New York production. How did the netion of "sloppy seconds" slop over into the world of play selection?

... In a handsome office two Dallas men, one a long-established businessman, the other new to town, talked about how to participate in the city's most significant cultural life.

... In the heat of the Chicago summer Charles Howard (a staff director here) visits with artistic and literary directors and pretends he's on vacation. In the cold of Chicago's November, I confer with ninety-seven artistic directors attending The League of Resident Theatre conference.

These and other streams have flowed to the river of effort that has created this festival, a new feature of Theatre Three's season. The stranger beside me on the plane was Dr. Bryce Jordan, president of The University of Texas at Dallas. We've been seeking good ways to work together. The festival is a joint venture. The company went into rehearsal residence on the handsome campus, scenery was built in the UTD shop, previews were arranged, the playwrights coming to see their shows here have dates to speak to students and faculty. And there's the significant contribution Michael Gillespie, the university's drama department chief, has made by directing THE TAKING AWAY OF LITTLE WILLE.

Norma Young, this theatre's founder, served as the literary director for the festival. She read the many scripts we solicited from other theatres and from literary agents.

The new corporate help came from The Celanese Chemical Co., Inc. Their underwriting of The Second Stage Festival made it possible. And their enthusiasm has made it especially fun.

The bridge over this river is girded by the support of playgoers. What do you think of this view from the bridge? Down here in the warm, rushing water, it's exhilarating!

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



Tom Griffin is a resident actor with Adrian Hall's Trinity Square Repertory Company in Providence, Rhode Island. He spent several years doing what he describes as "a Jack Londonesque variety of jobs" before joining United States Senator Claiborne Pell in 1972 as a media consultant. Following Pell's re-election, Griffin was hired by a Rhode Island advertising firm

In August, 1973, his story "Flies, Snakes, Fat Benny", appeared in PLAYBOY Magazine and subsequently won a PLAYBOY Editorial Award. Griffin's prior plays include "Workers", "The Malicious Machinations of Master Makeit", and "Will the Gentlemen in Cabin Six Please Rise to the Occasion", all of which have received professional productions.

"The Taking Away of Little Willie" premiered in March of 1979 as part of the Mark Taper Forum's Playworks Festival. It has recently earned Mr. Griffin a nomination from the Los Angeles Drama Critics Circle for Outstanding Achievement in Playwrighting.

ROBERT DRACUP (Jack) was one of Theatre Three's original founders in 1961 along with Founding Director Norma Young, the late Ester Ragland and Jac Alder. He served the theatre then as a leading actor as well as technical director and set designer. In the theatre's initial season he played in "The Lady's Not for Burning", "Home of the Brave" and the title role in Molnar's "Liliom". Later performances included leading roles in "Mrs. McThing", "Look Back in Anger" and "Julius Caesar". This festival marks his return to the stage after serving as technical director and designer in Dallas' busy film industry for more than a decade.

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*JAMES DUFF (Willie) is featured for the third time this season at Theatre Three, having appeared as Fred/the Hungarian Mindreader in "Chicago" and the father in the Children's Series production of "Hansel & Grethel". Other local credits include Sam in Dallas Repertory Theatre's production of "Shenandoah" and John in Theatre Onstage's "Lion in Winter". Duff's next project will be the role of Treplev in Theatre Three's production of "The Seagull" this April.

*ERIN JEANNE EVANS (Janet) makes her fourth appearance on Theatre Three's stage in "The Taking Away of Little Willie". She was seen previously as Felicity in last season's "The Shadow Box", as Violet in "Small Craft Warnings", and as a replacement for Norma Young this season in "The New York Idea". Her varied career has included performances at Philadelphia's Playhouse in the Park in "Happy Birthday" with Joan Blondell and "Tonight at 8:30" with Beatrice Straight. She also performed in a WCAU-Radio production of "A Tale of Two Cities" with Mike Nichols. Miss Evans notes she was the first to do an "M&M" candy commercial on CBS' "Candy Carnival".

SALLY HARRIS (Claire) holds a B.A. degree from Nebraska Wesleyan University in theater and speech. She has performed such roles as Veda Louise in "Harvey", Florence in "The Curious Savage", and Norma in "Plaza Suite". She was last seen as Edna in "A Delicate Balance" at Dallas' Theatre Onstage. E. L. DOCTOROW

"Drinks Before Dinner" is the first play by celebrated author E. L. Doctorow whose novel "Ragtime" won the National Book Critics' Circle Award and was named as one of the ten best fiction works of the 1970's.

Born in New York, he was educated at Kenyon College and Columbia University. Doctorow-who previously taught at Sarah Lawrence College, will be on the faculty of Princeton University this fall.

Other Doctorow novels include "Welcome To Hard Times", and "The Book of Daniel", which was nominated for a National Book Award for fiction. He is currently working on a novel entitled "Loon Lake", which is scheduled for publication this fall by Random House.

"Drinks Before Dinner" was first performed at the New York Shakespeare Festival's Public Theater in the fall of 1978. The production was directed by Mike Nichols and starred Christopher Plummer.

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

Amlin Gray received first-hand knowledge of an Asian war, such as the one he writes of, during

the year he served in Vietnam as a medic with the 1st Infantry Division.

Trained as an actor at the American Musical and Dramatic Academy (New York) and the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art (London) he supported himself in that capacity for several years, working with the New York Shakespeare Festival, the National Shakespeare Company, and appearing in many Off-off Broadway productions

Other plays by Gray include "Founding Father" produced at the O'Neill Theater Center and the Cubiculo Theatre in New York, "Pirates" produced at the O'Neill Theatre Center, "Namesake" produced at the Milwaukee Repertory Theatre, "Bo" produced at the Milwaukee Repertory Theatre and the Intiman Theatre in Seattle, and "The Fantod" produced at Milwaukee's Theatre X. "The Fantod" was cited by the American Theater Critics' Association as one of the ten best new American plays produced in regional theatre in the '78-79 season.

"How I Got That Story" premiered in April, 1979 on Milwaukee Repertory Theatre's Second Stage. Gray was awarded a National Endowment for the Arts Grant for the current year for the production.




