


It's the 20th Anniversary Season at Theatre Three. At midseason on March 24th is the actual birthday.

I was around when Theatre Three started. But it was Norma Young who began it: she had the instinct, the knowledge, the energy and the determination. She still has all these and most importantly she still has the highest standards. Long may they dominate this theatre's existence!

It's important to remember that thousands have marched across Theatre Three's stages. And hundreds of thousands, by now, have warmed Theatre Three's seats. All that psychic and physical energy feeds our present performances. We gain from the investment so many have made in Theatre Three.

In the early days we had a grand sense of immediacy but little sense of the future. Like all futures, ours turned out to be better-worse than we could have dreamed. The first seven productions were staged at the Sheraton Dallas hotel. Then we moved into a long-vacant building at 2211 Main Street. It had been a seat cover garage when built in the 30s. In that faintly disreputable locale Dallas playgoers met (for the first time) Albee, Kopit, Pinter, de Ghelderode, Sarayan and others. And audiences saw new plays by Tennessee Williams. William Inge, Carson McCullers, Robert Anderson and William Gibson, Shakespeare, Moliere, Goldoni, Strindberg and other masters contributed respectability. The sheer entertainment values of those (and other plays and musicals) dispelled the cloud of disuse that had pervaded. It had been something of a sweatshop building. We continued to sweat. But the building transmogrified into a center for human joy and exploration. It's that joy and exploration that characterize, we hope, Theatre Three and its contribution to this community. Actors and audiences are always celebrants. On our 20th birthday it's a good thing to remember.

STRIDER: THE STORY OF A HORSE

While accompanying Leo Tolstoy on a walk in the country, fellow writer Ivan Turgenev noticed him stopping to whisper to a mangy old nag. "I could have listened forever,"Turgenev wrote later. "He had gotten inside the very soul of the poor beast and taken me with him. I could not refrain from remarking, 'Isay, Leo Nikolayevich, beyond any doubt, you must have been a horse once vourself!""

Tolstov first drafted his short story "Strider: The Story of a Horse" in 1863, the same year he began "War and Peace." It wasn't until 1885, some twenty years later, that the fable was completed. It seems the life of Tolstoy's fictitious horse was based on that of an actual horse who appeared over and over in his "Fables for Children" and other short stories.

In the spring of 1977, Robert Kalfin, Producing Director of New York's Chelsea Theater Center, was one of seven American

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directors selected to participate in a new U.S.-Soviet Cultural Exchange Program. While traveling in the Soviet Union, he attended a performance of "Strider" at the Gorky Theater in Leningrad. Through earphones he listened to a simultaneous translation and was enchanted with the production. The Russian version had been created by writer/director Mark Rozovsky from a series of improvisations done at the theatre's drama school.

Upon returning to the United States, Mr. Kalfin began working with lyricist Steve Brown and a Russian translator to adapt the work for the American stage. "Strider," which opened at the Chelsea Theater Center in May, 1979, was the first play to be performed under the new U.S.-Soviet Copyright Agreement. Six months after its opening at the Chelsea, the show was moved into Broadway's Helen Hayes Theatre where it enjoyed unanimous praise from critics.
