NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR:

It began last spring when Marcia Durney from the 500 Club Inc. ask what projects at Theatre Three her fine civic group might support. I had a ready answer — underwrite the costs of the holiday musical, and even then I had in mind "The Boy Friend". Marcia and ther club took the matter under advisement, and as the possibility of staging "The Boy Friend" became more plausible, my mind went immediately to Bennye to play Polly. This is the second time I've had the pleasure of directing Bennye, and an industrial show we played showed me she is as fine a singer as she is an excellent actress. My wife, (Norma Young, the theatre's managing director), agreed it would be an excellent vehicle for Bennye though we both gulped hard at the extensive technical demands of the show.

The summer wore on and letters flew back and forth to the play leasing company; Bennye got the script one day and an anticipatory twinkle in her eye the next day. Camilla Carr was also boosting the show, since she had enjoyed playing in it in her college days. Harland Wright, our own blond bear of a set designer, was signed on to create the sets, and our costumer, Patty Greer could hardly wait to become immersed in the fabulous flapper fashions.

Then the big news came -- the 500 Club would indeed underwrite the production costs and from that time on there was no turning back. One of the happiest days for me was the day our excellent choreographer came to the theatre to ask if she might not do some work with us. The alarcity with which I shouted "yes" might have astonished her a bit, but Betty and I were both convinced that the dances would be a strong basis of excitement in the show.

Summer auditions convinced me we would have a good luck show on our hands, since the turnout of talented newcomers included many that were ideally suited to the casting demands, (plus, of course, such stalwarts as Gene Ross and Larry Whitcher).

As I write this a zillion details are finally falling together. Joan Eckles, our lighting designer is only a (sw hundred feet more of cable away from finishing the most elaborate lighting plot of our seven year history; Gene Diskey has scooled in to add additional wattage to our light capabilities; Harland is only eight "s" hooks away from being finished and Patty is happily up to her ears in sequins. Norma has been working with the cast as I began working with our excellent musicians and we're raring to go!

And so, my thanks to the cast, crew, musicians and designers; my gratitude to Norma for adding so many delightful bits of business and straightening out some of the stage traffic; my admiration to Betty for her perceptive task-mastering of the dances and my especial salutation to all the mambers of the 500 Club for enabling us to bring this show to our stage in its full glory!
