#### **ABOUT THE PLAYERS**

DICK HOOSER began his association with Theatre Three with the original production of THE VENETIAN TWINS. Now a staff actor, Mr. Hooser appeared in the Noel Coward songs and sketches last season and in CANTERBURY TALES and SCUBA DUBA of the current season.

STEPHEN TOBOLOWSKY last season created the role of the long-lost son in the American premiere of Jean Anouilh's THE IRREGULAR HEART OF MONSIEUR ORNIFLE. His multiple roles in CANTERBURY TALES included the role of the lusty old man in The Merchant's Tale.

NORMA YOUNG is Theatre Three's founding director. In that position she has directed Dallas premieres of such important authors as Pinter and Albee as well as staging important revivals of works by Genet, Strindberg, Moliere and Beckett. She has starred in HEDDA GABLER, OH DAD, POOR DAD and COLETTE.

MARIANNE HAMMOCK debuted at Theatre Three this season in CANTERBURY TALES. A gifted Shakespearian, Miss Hammock's professional career, following her acting education in England, has centered on such roles as Kate in TAMING OF THE SHREW, Juliet in ROMEO AND JULIET and Miranda in THE TEMPEST.

VIRGINIA CADDELL also debuted this season in CANTERBURY TALES in which her multiple assignments included The Miller's Wife and the goddess Proserpina. She is a recent honors graduate of the North Texas University School of Theatre.

JOAN FOY first appeared for Theatre Three in the 1970 production of THE ADDING MACHINE as Mrs. Zero. A veteran of the famed Arena Stage in Washington D.C., her important place in the company of Theatre Three has been established by her work in such diverse fare as A FUNNY THING HAPPENED ..., COLETTE and last season's TWICE OVER LIGHTLY.

JIM PRICHARD joined Theatre Three's staff as an actor, director and administrator last season. He played the leading role in THE-FRONT PAGE and directed the children's show THE CONTEST. As a former teacher of drama, Mr. Prichard serves as Theatre Three's educators' liaison.

PAT GLASS first appeared for Theatre Three in its initial season in 1961. Since then he has appeared each season in a wide variety of musicals, comedies and dramas. Mr. Pat, as he is known to the company, appeared in the season-opener CANTERBURY TALES as the friar.

CHARLES ESCAMILLA played his first role for Theatre Three in the production of THE ME NOBODY KNOWS during the summer he apprenticed here before college graduation. He has joined the staff as an actor and intern stage manager.

#### **ABOUT OSCAR WILDE**

Wilde was born in Dublin in 1854. He was educated at Trinity College, Dublin and at Oxford. After publishing a book of poems in 1881, he made a year-long lecture tour of the United States. During his next eight years he became prominent as a critic and editor. A storm of controversy surrounded his novel **The Picture of Dorian Gray**, but between 1892 and 1895 his plays dominated the London stage, culminating in the success of THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING EARNEST.

Only weeks after the opening, however, he was arrested and subsequently tried and convicted of sexual indecency and spent two years in prison emerging a shattered man. He died in Paris in 1900.

Theatre Three is a non-profit, Equity-affiliated profissional theatre eligible for and receiving subsidy from individuals, foundations and private-public organizations concerned with the quality of life in America.
