## **Notes From The Director**

A familiar sense of terror seizes actors and directors as they gather around in assorted chairs for the first read-through of an assigned acript. Getting "on our feet" and working through the staging erodes that terror. As rehearsals continue (if the gods are with us) a cautious sense of joy, the pleasure of company and craftsmanship bury terror deep in our collective psyches.

Uncertainties of some sorts are eliminated by the thousands of decisions made in rehearsing. Puzzles of character, a scene or even a word will have some solution proposed before our first audience arrives.

Still, the terror remains and only playgoers can until the knots of it. Any play exists not really on the stage but in the minds and hearts of the spectators. Will our work have life there? That's our constant challenge — the source of our terror.

"Ornifle" is more than worthy of these professional agonies. Conceived by one of the most astonishing playwrights the world has yet to produce, it was (to us as we prepared it) irresistible. Its oddities endeared it to us and its courage and conviction, its wisdom and its civilized sense of play were a great release. To bear the responsibility of presenting it for the first time in America may have been a bit intimidating, but the honor of participating in such an event is a forceful and effective antidote.

In Paris "Ornifle" was presented in five acts. In this staging we're playing the relatively short third, fourth and fifth acts as our third act. We hope you and Monsieur Anouilh will forgive this liberty. That deep into the flow of the play we disliked stemming the action for added intermissions.

For Theatre Three he has directed "And Miss Reardon Drinks a Little," "Colette," and "Hedda Gabler," also starring in such Theatre Three productions as "Pantagleize," "The Philanthropist," "Tartuffe," "The School For Wives," and "Stop the World — I Want To Get Off."

Donna Adams (MIIe. Supo) is the Assistant for the Theatre Three Directors. Miss Adams played the wonderful, silent Liz in last season's "The Philanthropist." She then created the role of Witch Daffy Dark in Theatre Three's children show "Rapunzel and the Witch." Holding her B. A. in Drama from Baylor University, she is currently a student in Larry O'Dwyer's acting classes. She has just completed an assignment as Mrs. Pentrano in "And Miss Reardon Drinks a Little."

Elfriede Russell (Nenette) is a former speech and drama teacher, holding her B. S. in Speech and Drama from the University of Corpus Christi. She has appeared onstage with the University of Corpus Christi, Corpus Christi Little Theater, Midland Community Theatre, the Globe Shakespearean Theatre, and the Dallas Theater Center. Television commercials and plays are also listed among her many credits.

Sharon Bunn (Madame Ornifle) holds her B. A. in English from the University of Texas. She has just recently completed the role of Ceil Adams in "And Miss Reardon Drinks a Little." For Theatre Three she has also appeared in "Nobody Loves an Albatross," "Anything Goes," "A Musical Mania from Transylvania," "The Moon is Blue," and "Company." Miss Bunn has toured the Playboy Club Circuit in the "Who Me" revue and has also appeared in the Bottoms Up Revue.


The Fire Marshall prohibits smoking in the auditorium.
