But, of course, the big thanks goes to the members of the cast. And to the talented orchestra. Their energy and enthusiasm has left me gasping and their perception continues to astound me.

THE HOPELESS TREE



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"THE PHILANTHROPIST"

THE PHILANTHROPIST has become the surprise hit of Theatre Three's season. The production, starring Larry O'Dwyer as Philip, earned high critical acclaim and Dallas audiences have turned out in large numbers to applaud the new British comedy.

Encore performances of THE PHILANTHROPIST have been scheduled for Tuesdays and Wednesdays in July beginning July 11th. (On Thursdays through Sundays THE ME NOBODY KNOWS will continue its run.)

The price of the Encore Performances of THE PHIL-ANTHROPIST have been set at \$2.50 -- less than many movies!

The praise THE PHILANTHRO-PIST has earned in Dallas matches the play's many honors that began with its London premiere. The London Observer gave the play its "Best Comedy of the Season" award and the play won the Tony Award nomination as "Best Broadway Play of 1971" when David Merrick imported it from England.

Theatre Three's director, Jac Alder, has taken pains to warn the Dallas playgoer that THE PHILANTHROPIST contains a series of shocks to the nervous system. There's a shock in scene one (violence), another in the party scene (uninhibited language) and more shocks (devastating philosophy) as the author sums up his action.
