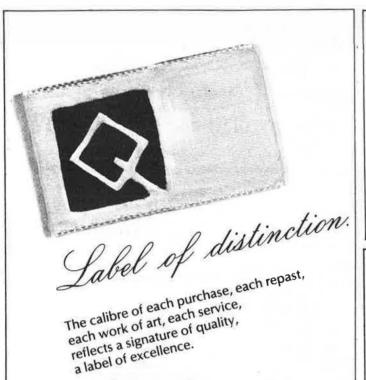

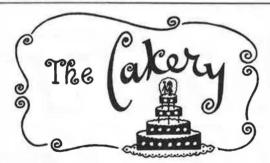

It is theatre Three's feeling that this spirit of cooperation between institutions in the Oak Lawn-Turtle Creek area is what will make our neighborhood great during the coming years. The actors have been known to encourage laughter and applause.



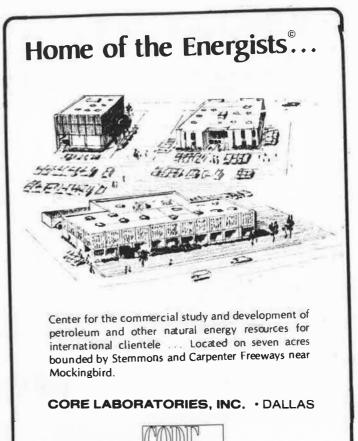
# THEATRE THREE CELEBRATES SPRING WITH A ROLLICKING COUNTRY MUSICAL

Theatre Three brings foot-stompin' fun to Dallas May 2 thru June 3 with the whimsical country musical, "The Robber Bridegroom."

"The Robber Bridegroom's" boy-meets-girl plot had its beginning as a Grimm fairy tale. It was Southern authoress, Eudora Welty, who took the story and flavored it with the rich folk lore of rural Mississippi to create her 1942 countrified version. Composer Robert Waldman and lyricist Alfred Uhry in turn added catchy tunes and light-hearted lyrics for their 1975 musical adaptation which won rave reviews from both New York and Los Angeles critics.

The story takes place in and around the frontier town of Rodney, Mississippi during the late 1700's. Rodney is the home of Jamie Lockhart, part-time gentleman, parttime bandit. Under his gentleman guise, he comes to the rescue of wealthy planter, Clemment Musgrove, cunningly befriending him. The grateful Musgrove offers Jamie his ugly daughter Rosamund as a reward. Marriage to the heiress and her money is tempting, but Jamie has already fallen in love with a blonde beauty he's stolen love from in the woods. Little does he know, the two girls are one and the same. To further complicate matters for the lovers, Rosamund's wicked stepmother Salome is full of shrewd schemes to keep them apart.

Add to this zany plot fifteen other country characters, set it to blue-grass music and you've got "The Robber Bridegroom", lively fun for the entire family.

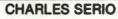
where he performed in numerous shows with the Pickwick Players, an internationally known company that performs original plays for young people.

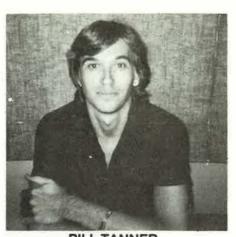

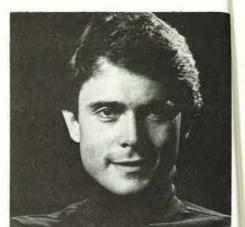

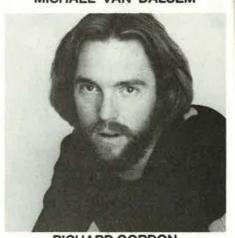

He danced in the Dallas Civic Opera's production of Verdi's "Macbeth" and performed in "A Christmas Carol" produced by the Shakespeare Festival of Dallas.

BILL TANNER (Bucky Lu Pittman) - Although this is Mr. Tanner's first performance at Theatre Three, he was involved in the costume design for Theatre Three's production of "A Midsummer Night's Dream." While attending Tarleton State University, Mr. Tanner acted as Husband in "Rashomon", Uncle Tuffy in "Sleeping Beauty" and Bamboo in "The Imperial Nightingale."

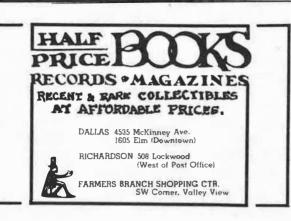


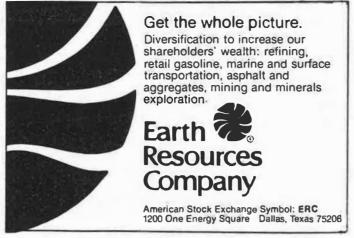

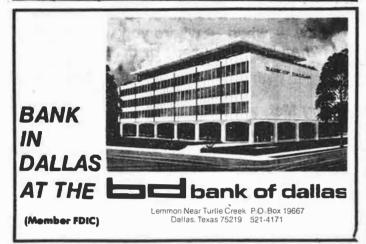

# ARTFEST '79 TO BE HELD **MAY 27 AND 28**

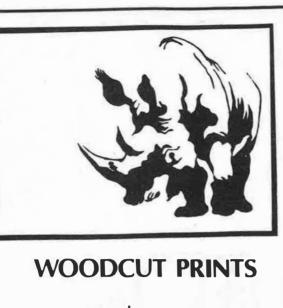

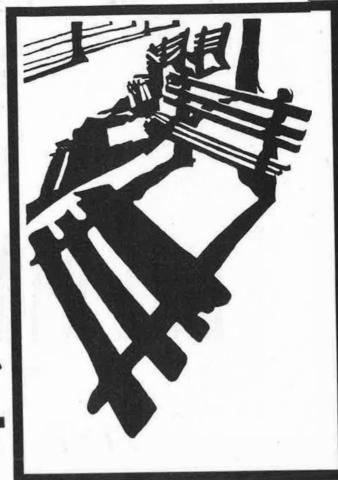
