Notes, from the director

disposable society. The ultimate disposable society in that human beings are beginning to be considered as disposable as any item that might be found in the average household. Are we perhaps crowding each other out of existence?

This has brought about the phenomena of the individual alienated personality who can and often does hold the lives of other human beings in his hands. Sometimes these individuals congregate in small groups (as opposed to the mass scenes of riot and march and Woodstock-type gatherings of the '60's). Witness: The Symbionese Liberation Army, Witness: The Weathermen. Witness: The American Nazi Party. Witness: the small groups of terrorists that are to be found in every nation on this earth that brought about such horrors as the Olympic Games massacre, the Tel Aviv Air Terminal bombings, the famous Stockholm bank robbery with robbers and hostages alike locked in the vault, the recent spate of kidnappings (and sometimes murders) of high-echelon business or government officials. But this play deals with an alienated personality who is truly a loner. TIME Magazine's cover story of October 6, 1975, "Protecting the President", includes an insight into the state of being of the alienated person. Sociologist Stuart Palmer of the University of New Hampshire "believes that the competitive, increasingly computerized and mechanized nature of U.S. society is creating more and more lost and purposeless people. Those conditions exist in most industrialized nations, but in the U.S. they are especially intense and combined with particularly American elements that have almost become clichés: the loosening of many moral

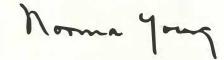
Through nobody's particular fault, ours has become a that so often turns into rootlessness; the U. S. frontier culture of violence and its still lingering love affair with guns - and the litany goes on.

> The ultimately puzzling problem is that there are perhaps untold numbers of alienated Americans who have lost the race for prestige and success, who have had unhappy childhoods, who are up-rooted geographically and morally . . . When does the malcontent turn dangerous? When does the harmless kook become harmful? No one can know for sure. One of the costs of democracy is the fact that the dangerous social oddball can lurk anywhere at any time, waiting to act out his or her delusions."

> In the play, a telling exchange occurs between Teddy and Richard when Richard desperately asks "What the hell's the matter with you, man? What's the matter with all of you?" Teddy replies: "Ah, All of us. You mean us here disaffected youth of the United States of America? . . . We disaffected!" At another point, Teddy laments: "It's no good anymore ... It's too late."

> I think this play will tell us something that is important to attend to. In producing the show, I'd like to thank this very fine company of actors and production staff for their work, and particularly thank Donna Adams for her invaluable work as Associate Director.

> One last comment: This is, as you know, the opening production of our 1975-76 season and our first time to put into operation our new season subscription plan (a plan happily made necessary for us because of our growing audiences!). In addition to the Obje and Outer Critics' Circle awards he has received, Mark Medoff currently holds a Guggenheim Fellowship in playwrighting, RED RYDER is his second play. His first, THE WAGER, had a month's run at the Manhatten Theatre Club and an off Broadway production that premiered in the fall of 1974.

San Francisco and Los Angeles have been productions of his third play, THE KRAMER. He's also written a

children's play, THE ODYSSEY OF JEREMY JACK and published FOUR SHORT PLAYS. As an actor, Mr. Medoff played Teddy in RED RYDER in both Chicago and New York. He has also directed and serves as an associate professor of English at New Mexico State University at Las Cruces.

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About the Actors

JAC ALDER (Richard) is Theatre Three's managing director and one of its co-founders in 1961. He has served the theatre as a director, actor, musical director and arranger and designer for a multitude of shows. He directed ONE FLEW OVER THE CUCKOO'S NEST and TWIGS last season in addition to administrative duties. He is the author of THE VENETIAN TWINS, a musical and verse adaptation that premiered at Theatre Three and has since had productions in Scotland and in England. This semester he's teaching two courses for the theatre department of The University of Texas at Arlington and will narrate the youth concerts of The Dallas Symphony Orchestra and the childrens' performances of The Dallas Civic Opera. In private life he is the husband of Norma Young.

ALICE COLE (Cheryl) has been in both GODSPELL and CANTERBURY TALES, two musical hits at Theatre Three. Her BFA in acting is from The University of Texas. During 1974 and 1975 she toured with the National Childrens' Theatre in LITTLE LAME PRINCE, POCHANTAS and RIP VAN WINKLE. Other stage credits include THE GAMBLER, NELLIE AND THE SAWDUST RING and SPOON RIVER ANTHOLOGY with Austin's Bujuberti Players and DEATH OF A DOG and THE SOUND OF SILENCE with The Dallas Theater Center. She's also performed in national films and commercials.

TRAVIS DEAN (Stephen) is a new staff actor for Theatre Three though audiences saw him last season as a "jobbed" actor in THE MISANTHROPE and the moving Billy Bibbit in ONE FLEW OVER THE CUCKOO'S NEST. A native of Amarillo, he studied theatre at West Texas State University. During his academic career he won Best Actor Awards for playing the title roles in HAMLET and EDWIN BOOTH and for his portrayal of Sir Thomas More in A MAN FOR ALL SEASONS.

DESMOND DHOOGE (Lyle) will be remembered by Theatre Three's friends for his memorable performance as the Coach in last season's THAT CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON. He is a veteran character actor having appeared on the Hollywood legitimate stage as well as innumerable sound stages of movies and television. Two recent films include PAPER MOON and BOOK OF NUMBERS out of the more than a dozen feature films he's made with top stars. Mr. Dhooge was sponsored by the Ford Foundation in his early stage career as an original member of the Dallas Theater Center's professional company. His performance as the Coach in THAT

CECILIA FLORES (Clarisse) joined Theatre Three last season first as the cheerful party girl in ONE FLEW OVER THE CUCKOO'S NEST and (for the last half of the run) proved her versatility by moving into the role of the ruthless Nurse Ratched. For The Celebration of Life Theatre in San Francisco she played Carita in GET-TING TO KNOW THE NATIVES and played Sandy in JACK RUBY — ALL AMERICAN BOY at The Dallas Theater Center. She's also played Gertrude in HAMLET ESP. Her drama teaching career includes classroom work for the Dallas Independent School District and the San Francisco Public Schools as well as appearing on educational television in series on English and literature. In addition to her work for Theatre Three in ONE FLEW OVER THE CUCKOO'S NEST she's also appeared in Theatre Three's touring production of ADVICE TO WOMEN.

DICK HOOSER (Teddy) played Dale Harding in ONE FLEW OVER THE CUCKOO'S NEST. A veteran member of the resident company, he holds a diverse and important list of credits on Theatre Three's arena stage including classics such as THE IMPORTANCE. OF BEING EARNEST, THE MISANTHROPE, TARTUFFE, and SCHOOL FOR WIVES; musicals such as THE VENETIAN TWINS, CANTERBURY TALES and COMPANY; modern comedies like TWIGS and THE RAINMAKER; and avant garde works including Giradoux's ELECTRA, THE PHILANTHROPIST and SCUBA DUBA. His acting degree is from Baylor University.

RAY LE PERE (Clark) is playing his second season for Theatre Three. Last year he played Turkle in ONE FLEW OVER THE CUCKOO'S NEST and Ol' Cap'n Cotchipee in PURLIE. Prior to his Theatre Three work he toured in Neil Simon's LAST OF THE RED HOT LOVERS. His broadcasting work is heard on KRLD, he recently appeared on the cover of "Texas Monthly" and has many local and national television commercials to his credit.

CANDY VICTORY (Angel) demonstrates her flexibility by performing in RED RYDER. More familiar to Theatre Three goers as the box office manager, she has been onstage in several children's shows including THE MONSTER FROM OUT OF TOWN, MAKE BELIEVE and as Aunt Polly in TOM SAWYER. Trained and graduated from the Baylor Theatre Department in Waco, she created numerous roles including Mrs. Antrobus in THE SKIN OF OUR TEETH, Madame Maniefa in THE DIARY OF A SCOUNDREL and Signora Nenni in RIGHT YOU ARE IF YOU THINK YOU ARE. This summer Ms. Victory taught and created special makeup and costumes for "The Power of the Young", a coventure of Theatre Three and The Neighborhood Youth Corps for minority teenagers.
