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notes from the director...

Lots of people helped to make BALL GAMES possible. I want to thank some of them.

All the contributors to A...MY NAME IS ALICE get a really respectful salute. That revue, about modern women, sizzled with zeitgeist. Several years ago it was a huge audience hit here. It'd be dishonest and ungracious not to cite their inspiration.


Terry Dobson and I wondered during ALICE if its invention didn't make another assemblage inevitable; an investigation in revue style of the modern American male. We kept thinking we should somehow create a B...MY NAME IS BOB. Using that as a working title, we solicited the help of dozens of writers (playwrights and songwriters) we know. Using the help of Michael Kerker of ASCAP (American Society of Composers and Publishers in New York) we solicited the help of a wider range of creators. Thanks, Michael.

As I write this I don't know how much our friends with The 500, Inc. will contribute to this project, but I'd bet money that on August 1st I'll be pleased with their announcement of support we've requested for this project.

Frank Young (producer of Theatre Under the Stars in Houston) has been a particular friend to this project. The staff, much of it physically exhausted from the FESTIVAL OF THE UNFAMILIAR, had its work doubled on this original creation. Thanks, gallant allies!

The cast, Terry Dobson (musical director/administrator/ band leader/arranger/all-around-good and able fellow) and J. Hall (Oak Cliff's only Broadway choreographer) as well as Tin Quan Yen (set designer), Vern McKinney (technical director), Larry O'Dwyer (stage manager and theatrical philosopher) have each been terrific. Two distaff designers unflinchingly joined us in this: (Deidre Moser, costumes and Linda Blaze, lights) and certainly deserve my thanks.

Cuts have been made (for length, continuity and to match the right performer to the right material) of some good material. That's been painful but essential. Here's my apology to those creators, all of whom are talented people. Hey, guys -- maybe we should do this again!

He spends his free time (about 10 minutes a day) with his wife, actress Amy Mills, and their two beautiful daughters, Emily and Abigail.

### **MICHAEL JUSTIS\***




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# ARTISTIC STAFF

JAC ALDER (EXECUTIVE PRODUCER-DIRECTOR) Administrator, actor, designer, musician, director and writer, he is co-founder of Theatre Three (along with Norma Young, Robert Dracup and Esther Ragland). Born in Oklahoma City, Mr. Alder earned a degree in Architecture from Oklahoma University, and is the designer of Theatre Three's performing space.

During the past thirty years, Mr. Alder has served as Director of Drama at the University of Texas at Arlington, advisor to DISD's Arts Magnet High School, and as a member of DISD's PACE organization (Partnership of Arts, Culture and Education). He has served as chairman of the Texas Commission on the Arts Theatre Panel and is a current member. He is a founding member of the Dallas Arts Combine and the Dallas Arts Coalition. In 1988 he received the Dallas Theatre Critics Forum Award for outstanding service to Dallas theater. Also, in 1988, with Norma Young, he received the Dallas Historical Society Award for Excellence in Creative Arts. In private life he is the husband of Norma Young.

His directing credits include the world premieres of Safety and A Quarrel of Sparrows and such classics as Othello, School for Wives, Arms and the Man and The Venetian Twins. Mr. Alder's musical credits include A Little Night Music, Anything Goes, Side by Side by Sondheim, The Fantasticks, Weill Women and Ball Games.

TERRY DOBSON (MUSICAL DIRECTOR) has been Theatre Three's Musical Director since 1980, providing direction and accompaniment for over 35 musical productions, including last year's DROOD! and Assassins. He has also directed the music for Dallas Theater Center's A Christmas Carol. As the American musical director of the internationally-cast Peace Child, Mr. Dobson made his second trip to Russia just before the dramatic political changes in 1991. In addition to serving as the Assistant to the Producer in the Executive Offices of Theatre Three, he is well-known in the area for his accompanying skills. Last year he performed in concert with Denise LeBrun, Carole Cook and Dr. Timothy Seelig. In his spare time(!), Mr. Dobson is the Director/Conductor of ENCORE!, the small group ensemble from the renowned Turtle Creek Chorale and last May performed with them in their Camegie Hall debut. As an actor, Mr. Dobson was seen this past year as Luigi in The Lean Theatre production of We Won't Pay! We Won't Pay! and as the Reverend Crisparkle (for three days) in Theatre Three's season finale, DROOD!


J. HALL (CHOREOGRAPHER) Ball Games follows Mr. Hall's Theatre Three work on DROOD! and Assassins. In his 13th year as the Director of Dance at Mountainview College, Mr. Hall is a founding faculty member of the Performing Artists' Musical Theatre Conservatory. Other recent works include director of Closer Than Ever, Into The Woods, The Wizard of Oz and choreography of The Wilsonart Show. Additionally, Mr. Hall is owner/director of Freestyle Productions - a Dallas-based production group which specializes in beauty industrials.

# ARTISTIC STAFF

VERN McKINNEY (TECHNICAL DIRECTOR) is in his third season at Theatre Three. A graduate of Angelo State University and a budding director and designer, Mr. McKinney most recently designed H.M.S. Pinafore for Richardson High School and Vital Signs for Pegasus Theatre. With the help of Mark Hadley and Rebeque Danforth, Mr. McKinney founded The New Artists Theatre Company and directed the inaugural production. David Mamet's The Woods.

LINDA BLASE (LIGHTING DESIGNER) is Dallas' busiest lighting designer. As a staff member at Dallas Theater Center, she lit scores of that theater's productions. Her association with Theatre Three began with Woman In Mind. Subsequent designs at Theatre Three include musicals, dramas, and comedies in every season since that initial assignment. In addition to her skills as a lighting designer, Ms. Blase is an accomplished photographer and documents many of Dallas' dramatic productions.

**DEIDRE MOSER** (COSTUME DESIGNER) is starting her second season with Theatre Three. Ms. Moser's costume designs have been featured in Deep Ellum Opera Theatre's *The Mikado* and in the Shakespeare Festival of Dallas' *Target Town*. Theatre Three productions include *DROOD!*, Assassins, A Small Family Business, Born Yesterday and *The Piano Lesson*. Deidre would like to dedicate her Ball Games costumes to the man in her life, her husband of two years, David.



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
