Written and directed by an unknown dramatist, and originally staged on Off Off Broadway with a bare bones budget of \$15,000 and one set, GROSS INDECNCY: The Three Trials of Oscar Wilde has evolved into a theatrical sensation. Now drawing sell-out audiences in regional houses throughout the United States, the production is the third most produced play in the U.S. during the current '98-'99 theatre season. In addition, GROSS INDECENCY has taken the international theatre scene by storm, with lauded performances in Germany, Austria, Puerto Rico, Scandanavia, Israel, Hungary, and Greece. The story of this spare and highly original play has a familiar moral; persist in what you believe. It is also a tale which reaches far beyond its underpinnings of English intrigue -- written by a playwright whose first language is Spanish, Moises Kaufman, and dealing with one of Great Britain's most elegant epigrammatists, Oscar Wilde.

Using actual court records, a range of newpaper accounts, and Wilde's own creative work, Kaufman -- an intense 33 year old of Romanian and Jewish descent -- vividly relates the precepitous fall of one of the most celebrated playwrights/essayists/novelists/raconteurs in the history of civilization. Educated at a yeshiva in Caracas, Kaufman arrived in the U.S. ten years ago to study theatre. In speaking to his own personal history and the success of his play, Kaufman observes in an interview with *The New York Times*, "Being Jewish in a Catholic country, gay in an Orthodox Jewish School, and coming to the U.S. and becoming a Latino, has given me an outsider's perspective." Wilde, too, had such an "outsider's" perspective. Born in Dublin, in 1854, Oscar Fingal O'Flahertie Wills Wilde was an Irishman in Victorian England -- whose sexual prediliction vaulted him, in 1895, from the upper echelons of London society to being an object of almost universal scorn in a scant three months. Wilde, a college educated scholar, passionate social critic, editor, lecturer, flamboyant personality, acclaimed author, and doting husband and father, was virtually undone by the courtroom proceedings. The ensuing prison sentence resulting from the runaway trials -- articulated in superb detail by Kaufman -- resulted in two years hard labor in the infamous Reading Gaol... which many attribute to Wilde's untimely death in 1900 at the age of 46.

Today, Wilde is remembered for his supreme wit and acclaimed literary works, including the novel, The Picture of Dorian Gray, prose apologia De Profundis, and a collection of remarkable plays: Lady Windermere's Fan, The Duchess of Padua, A Woman of No Importance, An Ideal Husband, The Importance of Being Earnest, and Salomé. And now. too. it appears Wilde will be remembered for the scandal ridden trials which both prosecuted and persecuted the author for -- what clearly should have been --private and personal matters. As Wilde himself once quipped, "As delicious as scandal may be, one should always remember it is only gossip made tedious by morality."

Yet, even in recognizing the innate outrageousness in the public persecution Wilde suffered, Kaufman states, "You can't sanctify him...toward the end of the play, Wilde admits, 'I became the spendthrift of my genius. There's no faulting what I did...there's fault in what I became.' But one can also find fault with the so called 'sensibilities' of Victorian England, and the well documented 'lynch-like' atmosphere in the accounts of the trials." Therein, Wilde is chronicled as a victim of societal and judicial prejudice...the ultimate gross indecency.

ABOUT THE ACTORS



CAMPBELL READ (Narrator 9, the Judge) returns to the Theatre Three stage after a long absence. Theatregoers with a long memory may remember him as Lord Summerhays in *Misalliance* by George Bernard Shaw, as the trader Smithers in Eugene O'Neill's The Emperor Jones and in Twice Over Lightly, an evening of plays and music by Noel Coward. He also sang the role of Nanki-Poo in The Carolina Playmakers production of Gilbert and Sulivan's *The Mikado*.

TERRY VANDIVORT (Oscar Wilde) played last season as Harry in Racing Demon. as Grayson in Dreams from a Summer House. Other memorable roles include the Mysterious Man of Into The Woods, Jimmy in The Gingerbread Lady, Hysterium inForum, Estragon in Waiting for Godot, Polonius in Fortinbras, and Tristam in Taking Steps. He has also appeared in productions for The Lean Theatre. Dallas Shakespeare Festival, Dallas Theater Center, Addison Centre Theatre, Encompass Theatre (in NYC,) and Trinity Theatre (New York). He is the recipient of the Dallas Theatre Critics Forum Award and has twice received Theatre Three's Patron Favorite Award. Mr. Vandivort dedicates this performance to the memory of Matthew Shepard, victim of the grossest indecency.



THOMAS WALKER (Narrator 1, Wood, Shaw, & others) is welcomed back to his second production at Theatre Three. He was previously seen as Richard Noakes in Tom Stoppard's Arcadia. He has also performed at The Dallas Children's Theatre in productions of The Emperor's New Clothes, Young King Arthur, and A Little Princess.

LINUS CRAIG (Narrator 2, Atkins, Wright, & others) just finished playing Bob Crachitt and Jacob Marley in a national tour of *A Christmas Carol*. Theatre Three audiences, depending on their age, may remember him from either the children show Swimming with Polar Bears and in Amphytrion. Other favorite roles include John in Scotland Road (Stage West), Marvin in In Trousers and Sandy Duncan's Assistant stage Manager (Water Tower Theatre). Unfortunately, his recent role in Mike Judge's film Office Space ended up (mercilessly) on the cutting room floor.





MARC HEBERT (Narrator 4, Mavor, Victoria, & others) is making his Theatre Three debut. Mr. Hebert has a B.A. in Advertising Art Directing from the University of Texas at Austin as well as a degree in Acting Performance. Marc is a member of The Lean Theater company and has recently been seen at Theatre Too in their production of Kevin Kling's *Lloyd's Prayer* which opened to rave reviews. Other Lean Theater credits include Lyle Kessler's *Orphan's* and John Patrick Shanley's Danny and the Deep Blue Sea. He has played the parts of Mr. Harker in Dracula,

Bob in Beyond Therapy, and Marc Antony in Julius Caesar. Outside of the stage he has performed on Walker, Texas Ranger as well as many other television productions.

MARK STODDARD (Narrator 6, Clarke) makes his Theatre Three debut with this production. Having most recently appeared in Irving Community Theatre's A Doll House, his extensive list of credits includes Metro Players' The Young Man From Atlanta, and the Pocket Sandwich Theatre's Catch Me If You Can. He also worked for Dallas Children's Theatre in To Kill A Mockingbird, WaterTower Theatre's Camping With Henry & Tom, and Pegasus Theatre. His television and film credits include the PBS childrens series Wishbone, CBS Television's Walker, Texas Ranger,



numerous commercials and industrials, and several motion pictures including Richard Linklater's The Newton Boys.

ABOUT THE ACTORS (continued)

GORDON FOX (Narrator 8, the Marquess, Gill, Lockwood) is pleased to be returning to T3 after a ten year absence. He has appeared here as Henry in different producutions of *The Fantasticks*. Texas credits include: *The Tempest* at Ft. Worth Shakespeare Festival; Inherit the Wind and A Christmas Carol at The Alley Theatre; and Phantom and Carnival at Lyric Stage. Other regional credits include: A Midsummer Night's Dream and Much Ado About Nothing at Kentucky Shakespeare Festival; Abie's Irish Rose and Girl Crazy at Mill Mt. Theatre; and Dancing at Lughnasa, On Golden Pond, and A Christmas Carol at the Old Creamery Theatre.



MARK SHUM (Narrator 3, Harris, Parker, Moises, & others) happily returns to Theatre Three's stage. Audiences may remember Mark from his roles in Our Town and as Valentine in Arcadia. Since then Mark has kept very busy with other local theatres. He has garnered rave reviews for his performances in *Reefer Madness* at Pegasus Theatre and Turn of the Screw at Circle Theatre. Both shows were named among the best of 1998 by *The Dallas Morning News*. Other area favorites include Elomire in La Bete and Etienne in A Fitting Confusion both at Plano Rep. Algernon

in The Importance of Being Earnest, Angelo in Measure for Measure, and Entsheawful in Cinderella. Mark wants to thank his family for their unending support, understanding, and love.

HUGH FEAGIN (Narrator 5, Carson) has had a long association as a leading actor at Theatre Three begining in '63 when he debuted in the role of Reverend Shannon in The Night of the Iguana. Educated at the University of Texas at Austin and the Goodman Theatre in Chicago, Mr. Feagin has made career in his native city of Dallas. While his impressive T3 credits include Our Town, The Price, Tobacco Road, A. Small Family Business, Shadowlands, Waiting for Godot, and Racing Demon, Mr. Feagin also has been on most of the other stages of the city, including. Addison

Center Theatre, Dallas Theater Center, Dallas Shakespeare Festival, and Stage West. He recently completed another assignment for Dallas Children's Theatre playing Farmer Hoggett in Babe the Sheep Pig. He is a volunteer Master Gardener with the Extension Service.



DWIGHT SANDELL(Narrator 7, Douglas, Taylor) recently appeared in Every Secret Thing at the Lakewood, and Joseph & Mary at Lyric Stage. Prior Theatre Three credits include Strider and Sweeney Todd. Dwight has appeared at most of the area's regional theatres, including Dallas Theater Center, Casa Manana, Circle Theatre, Undermain Theatre, and the former New Arts Theatre and Dallas Repertory Theatre. At Stage West, he won a Best Actor award for Alan in Equus and Best Supporting Actor for Calabazas in A House with Two Doors... At Lyric Stage, he won a Leon Rabin Award for Sipos in She Loves Me.

ABOUT THE DIRECTOR, JAC ALDER

Jac Alder co-founded Theatre Three in 1961 with his late wife. Norma Young. He has served the theatre as its Executive Producer-Director since. He takes on a full range of theatrical assignments including directing (as in Gross *Indecency...)*, translating (as in this season's *The Miser*), and acting (as in last season's Old Wicked Songs). Mr. Alder was on the founding boards of the Dallas Arts Coalition, and the Dallas Arts Combine (now called Texas Arts Marketing). He served on the state-wide board of non-profit theatres, Texas Non Profit



Theatres, and currently severs on the board of Texans for the Arts, a statewide Arts advocacy organization. He was recently inducted into the Southwest Theatre Association's Hall of Fame and has also been honored with the Dallas Historical Society Award for Excellence in the Creative Arts.
