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### About The Play ...

It is August in Pitlsburgh, 1911. The sun Ialls out of heaven like a stone. The fires of the steel mill rage with a combined sense a stone. The lires of the steel mill rage with a combined sense of industry and progress. Barges loaded with coal and iron ore trudge up the river to the mill towns that dot the Monongahela and return with fresh, hard, gleaming steel. The city flexes its muscles. Men throw countless bridges across the rivers, lay roads and carve tunnels through the hills sprouting with houses.

From the deep and the near South the sons and daughters of newly freed African slaves wander into the city. Isolated, cut off from memory, having lorgotten the names of the gods and only from memory, having torgotten the names of the gods and only guessing at their faces, they arrive dazed and stunned, their heart kicking in their chest with a song worth singing. They and fresh hope, marked men and women seeking to scrape from the narrow crocked cobbles and the tien, blasts of the coke the narrow, crooked cobbles and the liery blasts of the coke furnace a way of bludgeoning and shaping the malleable parts of themselves into a new identity as free men of definite

Foreigners in a strange land, they carry as part and parcel of their baggage a long line of separation and dispersement which informs their sensibilities and marks their conduct as they search for ways to reconnect, to reassemble, to give clear and luminous meaning to the song which is both a wail and a whelp of joy.

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### **August Wilson**

AUGUST WILSON (*Playwright*) was catapulted to the forefront of young American playwrights with the success of *MA RAINEY'S BLACK BOTTOM*, voted Best Play of the Year 1984-85 by the New York Drama Critics' Circle and a hit at Theatre Three in 1986. His second play, *FENCES*, opened on Broadway in the spring of 1987 to enormous critical acclaim, and won numerous awards for best play of the year, including the New York Drama Critics' Circle Award, the Drama Desk Award, and the Pulitzer Prize. *THE PIANO LESSON*, which co-premiered at Yale Repertory Theatre and Boston's Huntington Theater Company, earned Wilson his second Pulitzer Prize. Wilson is also a published poet. *JOE TURNER'S COME AND GONE* received its first production at Yale Repertory Theatre in spring, 1986.

#### Margie Johnson Reese

MARGIE JOHNSON REESE (Director for JOE TURNER'S COME AND GONE) is currently Executive Director of Cable Access of Dallas, Inc. She is reponsible for the overall management of the non-profit organization that makes available the television medium to Dallas citizens. Programs are produced and cablecast over 13 access channels within the City of Dallas. Margie received her Bachelor of Arts Degree from Washington State University in Pullman, Washington, and her Master of Fine Arts from Trinity University in San Antonio, Texas. She performed in such shows as SPLENDOR IN THE GRASS, TWELFTH NIGHT, and SUMMER TREE in Washington, and as a graduate student at Dallas Theater Center performed in touring productions with Dallas Theater Center performed in touring productions with the Janus Players and appeared as Mavis in Errol John's I MOON ON A RAINBOW SHAWL. She directed the culturally diverse company (Janus Players) in THE PEOPLE SPEAK, A TRIBUTE TO BLACK POETS, and served as assistant director for TO BE YOUNG, GIFTED AND BLACK. Margie was a member of the original faculty at Dallas' Arts Magnet High School where she taught in the theater department in the areas of costume department of costume design and playwriting. As a faculty member, she directed several student productions, including FIRST BREEZE OF SUMMER, MOON ON A RAINBOW SHAWL, and produced a multi-disciplinary show to celebrate the school's 10th Anniversary. Recently, Margie also conceived and produced ART UNDER CONSTRUCTION, a special showcase production that premiered for members of the International Association of Arts Educators. Margie has worked in the area of arts marketing for several Dallas cultural institutions, including Dallas Opera, Dallas Theater Center, Dallas Black Dance Theater, and is a special consultant for Mid America Arts Alliance. For the past three years, she has been a member of the Texas Commission on the Arts Cultural Diversity Committee, and is a charter member and current chair of the Texas Association of American Cultures. Margie is a graduate of the 1988 Dallas Chamber of Commerce Leadership Dallas Class.



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### Performers

KAREN ANDERSON (Martha Loomis) is a graduate of Texas Christian University with a degree in radio and television production and a Fort Worth native who began her career as a member of Teen Network Theater in high school. She directed and acted in many college productions, including THE COAL DIAMOND and GREAT GOODNESS OF LIFE. She has also travelled and performed with the Grease Theater Company. While living in Connecticut in 1989, Karen played the role of Cecily in the Alliance Theater's production of THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING EARNEST.\*\*

ALDO BILLINGSLEA (Jeremy Furlow) is a resident of Fort Worth and a proud graduate of Crowley High School. He received his Bachelor's degree in Communication Arts and his Master's degree in Education from Austin College. This spring, Aldo will receive a Master of Fine Arts degree from Southern Methodist University. Aldo appeared in Dallas Shakespeare Festival's TWO GENTLEMEN OF VERONA and last summer he was in San Diego in the Old Globe Theatre's AS YOU LIKE IT. This fall at SMU he was Benedick in MUCH ADO ABOUT NOTHING. Aldo's camera experience includes a role as an extra in THE TRIP TO BOUNTIFUL and a role as a security guard in the season premiere of THE HOGAN FAMILY. Aldo has also made many appearances at the doors of Theatre Three in the role of "House Manager." \*\*

GROVER COULSON, JR. (Bynum Walker) was last seen at Theatre Three in the hit musical THE MIDDLE OF NOWHERE. At the Dallas Theater Center, he appeared in THE INSPECTOR GENERAL and, earlier, in ONCE IN A LIFETIME, and PROLOGUE TO ALL THE KING'S MEN. Grover has made many appearances at Hip Pocket Theatre, including productions of THE LAKE WORTH MONSTER, WILD MAN OF NAVAHAD, COLOR ME BLACK (solo performance), THE MALTESE FALCON, KING KONG, RIDERS OF THE PURPLE SAGE, and THE WIZARD OF OZ. He has also performed at Caravan of Dreams, Queen Elizabeth Hall in London, Jubilee Theater, Sojourner Truth Players, Scott Theatre, Casa Manana, Stage West, and, with Hip Pocket Theatre, at the 1984 Edinburgh Theatre Festival. Grover was recently seen on television in 13 EAST.

LENIKKA HARDMAN (*Zonia Loomis*) is thirteen years old and attends W.E. Greiner Academy. When she was in the fifth grade, Lenikka won a district oratorical contest and then auditioned for W.E. JONATHAN NORTON (Reuben Scott) is a filteen year old freshman at Dallas' Arts Magnet High School. The son of Willie and Laura Mae Norton, Jonathan enjoys writing, reading, and watching old television shows (late 1950s to early 1970s). Jonathan's goals include writing, directing, and producing plays and television situation comedies. He also wants to establish an African American Children's Theatre.\*\*

MYRA JOYCE NOWLIN (Molly Cunningham) is a native of Abilene, Texas, and a graduate of Abilene Christian University, where she studied Business Management and Human Communications. A graduate of Goodman Memorial Theatre in Chicago, Larry has served as Chairman of the Drama Department at Bennington College and is Theatre Three's Associate Director.\*

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### Norma Young

NORMA YOUNG (Founding/Artistic Director) was born in Dallas, reared in Oak Cliff, and educated at Sul Ross State University in Alpine (which gave her its Distinguished Ex-Student award in 1982). Ms. Young's career took her to Houston and New York before she returned to Dallas to found Theatre Three in 1961. She has served as Theatre Three's Artistic Director continuously since then. In addition to her extensive directing credits, Ms. Young has played many leading roles for Theatre Three, most recently appearing as Rosanna Ainsworth Jackson in the world premiere of James Duff's A QUARREL OF SPARROWS and before that as Mme. St. Pe in THE WALTZ OF THE TOREADORS. Her guest appearances have taken her to San Antonio's Guadalupe Cultural Center in LA CASA DE BERNARDA ALBA and Houston's Alley Theatre in her own one woman show THE LIFE SHE LED. Ms. Young named Theatre Three for authors, actors, and audiences: elements she values equally in her concept of theatre. Dallas Times Herald has named her "Dallas' First Lady of the Theatre" and Ultra Magazine named her one of the five "grande dames" of Texas. In December 1988, with Jac Alder, she received the Dallas Historical Society Award for Excellence in Creative Arts. Last season, Ms. Young directed Theatre Three's productions of NOTHING SACRED and THE ROAD TO MECCA.

#### Jac Alder

JAC ALDER (Executive Producer-Director) has served Theatre Three as an administrator, actor, designer, musician, director, and writer since he (with Norma Young, Robert Dracup, and Ester Ragland) co-founded the organization. Born and educated in Oklahoma, Alder earned his degree in Architecture. During the '70s, Alder was Director of Drama at the University of Texas at Arlington. He serves as advisor to DISD's Arts Magnet High School and as a member of DISD's PACE organization (Partnership of Arts, Culture, and Education). Alder has chaired the Theatre Panel of the Texas Commission on the Arts on which he has served two terms. He was on the founding Boards of the Dallas Arts Combine and the Dallas Arts Coalition. He has served as a grants evaluator for the Western Arts Foundation of Santa Fe and as a panelist for the Cultural Arts Council of Houston and the Arkansas Arts Council and is a member of the Board of Texas Non-Profit Theatres. He is host/narrator for the Dallas Symphony Orchestra performances for its youth concerts and is Artistic Advisor to Dallas' Young Audiences organization, a group that tours professional artists into the schools. For his extensive service to the theatre in Dallas, Alder was cited with a special award by the Dallas Theatre Critics Forum. In December 1988, with Norma Young, he received the Dallas Historical Society Award for Excellence in Creative Arts. In private life, he is the husband of Norma Young.

**Munitions** manufacturer Undershaft has an idealistic daughter who abhors her father's profitable career. Endowing all the characters in this kaleidoscopic comedy with wit and passion, Shaw concocted the theatre's most astonishing argument on war and weapons; economics on and aood citizenship.

### new from New York

SPEED-THE-PLOW by David Mamet...

Described а "serious as comedy", this fireball play is a scathing look at Hollywood sleazebags in relentless pursuit of the deal, the buck and a hot sex life. Mamet, a blazing talent of contemporary film and theatre, knows these people well and unflinchingly exposes their uttlerly corrupt, empty lives. Adult language and situation. #### RUMORS by Neil Simon...

Neil Simon got out of his autobiographical mode to write this entirely madcap farce set at a dinner party that gets way out of hand! What is wrong with the host? Who has the goods on whom? What is the host's lawyer covering up? Where's the hostess? Splendidly funny stuff from the most successful American playwright of our time. "Not only side-spliting, but front and back-splitting" said the critics.

### SHADOWLANDS by William Nicholson...

This new play is a deeply moving story of the author C.S. Lewis, the Oxford don whose writings on Christianity have done much to shape modern religious thought. Lewis found fulfillment late in life in the love of a minor American poet, Joy Davidson. Rich in pathos and offering two superlative acting roles, this play opens doors to new perceptions of life's meanings.

### revivals

### WAITING FOR GODOT by Samuel Beckett...

Theatre Three's very first season had a huge success with both audiences and critics when produced this dazzling it masterpiece by the relentlessly perplexing Irish genius. The play is part parable, part vaudeville, part spiritual odyssey and altogether amazing -- truly the most influential play of the mid twentieth century and a treasure for each generation to discover and previous generations to re-explore.

### TONS OF MONEY by Will Evans and Valentine...

Originally produced in 1922, this comedy has been revised by the British playwright Alan Ayckbourn who polished this neglected jewel to a hard, bright comic shine. Praised as "an unerring theatrical delight" and "inspired" when produced by the National Theatre in London, this hilarious story of a failed inventor pursuing a huge inheritance has every ingredient of a perfect farce.

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
