Mack & Mabel

a Broadway and London musical hit by composer JERRY HERMAN, book by MICHAEL STEWART July 19 – August 19

In the days of silent movies, director Mack Sennett's comic two-reelers made his discovery, Mabel Normand, America's most adored comedienne. Composer Jerry Herman (*Hello, Dolly; Mame; La Cage aux Folles*) celebrates this pioneer film duo in his rollicking and romantic show with his trademark musical panache and show business dazzle.

Popcorn

a Dallas premiere of the taboo-shattering comedy-thriller by BEN ELTON September 6 – October 7

PLACE: Hollywood. TIME: Academy Award Night. CHARACTERS: A vain auteur of voguishly violent films, his ex, his sardonic daughter, his on-the-make date, murderers inspired by his movie, and a voyeuristic TV crew. Elton's award-winning comedy has vulgar vigor and smart-mouthed one-liners, but surprisingly has the moral purpose of a Jacobean revenge drama. (Rated VERY Adult)

Pygmalion

GEORGE BERNARD SHAW's most illustrious and illuminating comedy October 25 – November 25

Here's a 1913 classic stage play that became a classic movie, which in turn became both the classic stage musical and movie musical, *My Fair Lady*. Now the great play returns to Theatre Three's stage in Shaw's original form. Few plays in the English language contain such intellectual and comic inventions – all so Shaw could argue for nothing less than the perfection of civilization.

The Goodbye Girl

book by NEIL SIMON, music by MARVIN HAMLISCH, lyrics by DAVID ZIPPEL December 13 – January 20

First, Simon wrote the movie as a Valentine gift to his actress wife. Then Hamlisch and Zipple worked with him to turn his film script into a smash Broadway hit musical. This gifted trio of contemporary theatre giants created a RARE thing these days, a delightfully funny and romantic musical theatre piece! The single mom, a thirty-something dancer, struggles through New York disappointments, user boyfriends, and then clashes with an upstart intruder who may be just another bad actor – or is he?

Crimes of the Heart

the Pulitzer Prize-winning comedy by former Theatre Three actress, BETH HENLEY February 14 – March 16

In Hazlehurst, Mississippi, the three Magrath sisters face troubles both grave and hilarious but in the end manage to escape the past to seize the future. "Such is Miss Henley's prodigious talent that she can serve us pain as though it were a piece of cake." – NY TIMES; "It has heart, wit and a surprisingly zany passion that carries it all before it." – NY Post.

Whodunnit

a comedy-thriller by the author of Sleuth, ANTHONY SHAFFER April 3 – May 4

Only one author wrote screenplays for both Alfred Hitchcock (*Frenzy*) and for novelist Dame Agatha Christie (*Death* on the Nile, Evil Under the Sun, and Murder on the Orient Express). "So whodunnit?" you ask. It was the brilliantly inventive Anthony Shaffer! In Whodunnit, he gleefully took all he learned from those masters and fashioned his own closed-circle-English-country-house-murder-mystery. And what characters...from horrifying to hilarious.

A Dog's Life

A howlingly funny new musical by SEAN GRENNAN & LEAH OKIMOTO May 22 – June 22

Charlie Chaplin made a film with this same title in the silent film days. Ever since then, Hollywood has paraded talented canines like Rin Tin Tin, Lassie, Asta, and Benji whose exploits have entertained us in every decade. This refreshing new musical, *A Dog's Life*, romps through the same beloved territory and manages to be goofily hilarious and sweetly moving. This piece tells the story of a rescued pooch, the young man who adopts him, and a complicated pack of four footed pals, all puzzled by the strange ways of the humans around them.

The Artistic Staff

Bruce R. Coleman (Director & costume design for Mabel's costumes) Bruce has been associated with Theatre Three since 1985. Among his many directing credits for the theatre he lists Lies and Legends, The Musical Stories of Harry Chapin, The Boyfriend, Once on This Island, It's a Grand Night for Singing, Nice People Dancing To Good Country Music, Wholly Moliere and The Mystery of Edwin Drood as some of his favorites. Mr. Coleman has also costumed many plays and musicals here, including Into the Woods, The Miser, Major Barbara, and The Women. Other favorite directing projects in this theatrical community include The Secret Garden and Into the Woods for ICT Mainstage, Tick, Tick, Boom!, The Who's Tommy, Thrill Me, and The Life for Uptown Players, and Close Ties for the Contemporary Theatre of Dallas. A ten-time winner of the Leon Rabin Award, Mr. Coleman has also been recognized by the Dallas Critics Forum Awards, The Dallas Observer 'Best Of...' issue, and The Column Awards for his contribution to local theatre. A life-long devotee to the study of film history, Bruce is thrilled to spend a little time with Mr. Sennett and especially Miss Normand.

Terry Dobson (Musical Director)

A member of Theatre Three's Artistic Staff since May 1980, Terry currently serves as Theatre Three's Musical Director and Company Manager. Terry directed (and accompanied) the longest running stage production in Dallas theater history: Theatre Three's production of *I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change.* He directed and accompanied many of the critically acclaimed Theatre Too productions: *Myths & Hymns, First Lady Suite, Grateful: The Songs of John Bucchino, Elegies: A Song Cycle, Only Heaven,* and *The Big Bang.* Terry won a Leon Rabin Award (Outstanding Musical Direction) and is the recipient of numerous "Column Awards". His autobiographical play, *My Own Private Diva,* recently won a DFW Theatre Critics Forum Awards for Best New Play.

Jac Alder (Set design)

Some of Jac's recent favorite Theatre Three assignments include being the set designer for *The Odd Couple* and *Talking Pictures*, and serving as designer and director of the Theatre Three season finale, *Caroline*, or *Change* and the season opener, *All About Bette: An Evening with Bette Davis*. Alder serves on the board of the Arts Magnet High School and on the board of Texas Non Profit Theatres. His many awards include the Dallas Historical Society's Award of Excellence which, since he co-founded and has been working for Theatre Three since 1961, makes him unquestionably, some sort of historical figure (as well as an occasional hysterical figure.)

Kelly McCain (Choreographer)

Kelly is excited to work on *Mack and Mabel* (Thanks Bruce and Jac!). She has recently appeared in Garland Summer Musical's *Hello Dolly* and in *Hair* at Uptown Players. Other area credits include *Best Little Whorehouse in Texas* (Contemporary Theatre of Dallas); *Shades of Light and Dark* (Ewert & Company); *The Who's Tommy* (Uptown Players); and choreography for *Once Upon a Mattress* (ICT Mainstage). Upcoming projects include choreographing Fame for Imagination Players and performing in *Carousel* for Lyric Stage. Love to Jay.

Michael Robinson (Costume design)

Michael's previous assignments at Theatre Three include Metamorphoses, The Imaginary Invalid, I'll Leave It to You, Children of Eden, The Mousetrap, The Musical of Musicals (The Musical!), The Full Monty, Vieux Carre, Glorious!, Democracy, Talking Pictures, and The Odd Couple. He has designed many shows for WaterTower Theatre, Uptown Players, CrossRoads Theatre, Plano Repertory Theatre, Garland Civic Theatre, Garland Summer Musicals, Lyric Stage, Contemporary Theatre of Dallas, Kauffman Civic Theatre, and Coppell Community Theatre. He has also designed for many of our local colleges and universities: University of North Texas Opera Theatre, Texas Christian University Opera Studio, University of Texas at Dallas, Brookhaven College, and Richland College. His awards include "Best Costume Shop" (Dallas Observer 2000), "Best Costumes" for Old Settler (Dallas-Fort Worth Critics Forum Award 2003), the Leon Rabin Award for Best Costumes for 42nd Street (2003), and the Column Awards for Best Costume in a Play or Musical (2001, 2002, and 2005 for Theatre Three's Metamorphoses).

Michael Campbell (Lighting design)

Michael is a product of the University of Texas Theater Program. After two years as repertory designer for Austin Shakespeare Festival (ASF) and One World Theater, he has worked with ICT Mainstage, Uptown Players, and now Theater Three. Show credits include Romeo and Juliet, Titus Andronicus, The Winters Tale, Julius Caesar (all ASF), Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat (Austin Theater Co-Op), A Christmas Carol (Austin Playhouse), Weight (UT Theater Department), Die, Mommy, Die (Uptown), and others. He also designed lights for Branford Marcellus, Jerry Jeff Walker, Chicago Ballet, Ballet Austin, John Mayall, Point of Grace, The Matt Wheeler Band, and others. He has been a part of many award winning production teams in Austin and Dallas. All the praise and glory belongs to God; and he gives lots of thanks to his parents (for everything).

Sally Soldo (Equity stage manager)

In the past 24 years, Sally has served Theatre Three in many capacities including as a performer (27 productions), stage manager (11 productions), choreographer (4 productions), publicity director, receptionist and even as a seamstress in the costume shop. She has received a Rabin Award, the Column Award, the *Dallas Times Herald* Theatre Critics Best Actress Award, and has been a 10-year Dallas Diva for Lyric Stage. She has performed and/or choreographed at the Dallas Summer Musicals, Casa Manana, Lyric Stage, WaterTower, Garland Summer Musicals, Dallas Repertory, Burt Reynolds Jupiter Theater, Chanhassen Theaters, Country Dinner Playhouse and Windmill Dinner Theater circuits. Her proudest contribution to Theater Three has been as the "voice in Terry Dobson's head" in *My Own Private Diva*, which will reprise this year in Theatre Too in October. The Cast

J. Brent Alford (Mack Sennett)

Brent is making his third appearance with Theatre Three, having previously appeared as Rudy Sebastian in The Great Sebastians, and as Dr. John Christow in The Hollow. He began his career 30 years ago at Houston's Theatre Under the Stars and spent six years as a company member of the Tony Award winning Alley Theatre, playing a variety of roles in classical and contemporary works. Since moving to the Metroplex in 1995, Brent has worked with the Dallas Theater Center, WaterTower Theatre, Stage West, Ft. Worth Shakespeare in the Park, and over 30 productions with Casa Mañana His acting credits include: John Adams in 1776, Zach in A Chorus Line, and Melvin P. Thorpe in The Best Little Whorehouse in Texus for Casa Mañana at Bass Hall; Benedick in Much Ado About Nothing and Orsino in Twelfth Night with Ft. Worth Shakespeare in the Park; and Lloyd Dallas in Noises Off at Water Tower Theatre. His work here has garnered the DFW Theatre Critics Forum for Best Actor, The Fort Worth Weekly for Best Actor, and The Column Awards for Best Supporting Actor. A former resident of NYC, Brent has worked Off-Broadway and at regional theatres across the country including Atlanta's Alliance Theatre, Pittsburgh CLO, and the Barter Theatre of Virginia. Brent has had the opportunity to work with the likes of Hal Linden, Juliette Prowse, Georgio Tozzi, Ruta Lee, Cathy Rigby, Jane Powell, and Gavin McCleod, to name a few. His is a proud member of Actor's Equity since 1980, and lives in Ft. Worth with his wife Michele and son Joshua. He currently heads the award winning theatre program at Tarrant County College, Northwest Campus, Ft. Worth.

Philip Bentham (Desmond Taylor)

Philip makes his debut with Theatre Three. He received his BS in music education at Texas Tech. His acting credits in Metroplex theaters include: Rocky in *Rocky Horror Show*, Contemporary Theater of Dallas; Peter/Breton Baret in *A Man of No Importance*, Uptown Players; Max/Hermann in *Cabaret*, Water-Tower Theater; Sky Masterson in *Guys and Dolls*, Eismann Theatre; and Wayne Frake in *State Fair*, It's About Time Productions. Philip has performed in other local theatres such as; ICT Mainstage, Flower Mound Performing Arts Theatre, UNT, and Unity Church. His television and film experience include national and regional commercials and the upcoming feature film: *No Country for Old Men.* Philip received a Column Award in 2004 for Best Male Supporting Actor in an Equity Musical. Walter Lee Cunningham, Jr. (Ensemble)

Walter makes his second appearance this year with Theatre Three; he played the role of the "handsome boy – Navy man" in *Caroline, or Change*, ending the 2006-2007 season. Glenn Franklin (Ensemble)



Jerry Herman (Music & lyrics)

The only composer/lyricist in history to have three Broadway musicals run more than 1500 performances: Hello, Dolly!, Mame, and La Cage aux Folles. Jerry first burst upon the Broadway scene with Milk and Honey in 1961. then came Hello, Dolly! (1964), Mame (1966), Dear World (1969), Mack and Mabel (1974), The Grand Tour (1979), and La Cage aux Folles (1983). He contributed songs to A Day in Hollywood, A Night in the Ukraine (1980) and a revue of his life's work, lerry's Girls, played on Broadway and in every major American city. In 1996, he wrote the music and lyrics for the CBS television special Mrs. Santa Claus and is currently anticipating the opening of his newest musical, this one written for Las Vegas, called Miss Spectacular. Mr. Herman is the recipient of numerous awards including Tony Awards, Grammy Awards, Drama Desk, Variety and Theatre Hall of Fame Award, and he has been elected to the Songwriters Hall of Fame. He is most proud of having written songs that can have lives of their own outside of their shows.

Michael Stewart (Book)

Born in 1929 in New York, Michael Stewart won four Tony Awards: two in 1961 for *Bye, Bye Birdie* as Best Author (Musical) and for the book as part of the Best Musical winner; and in 1964 for *Hello, Dolly!*, as Best Author (Musical) and for the book as part of the Best Musical winner. He was also nominated on eight other occasions: in 1962, with Helen Deutsch, as Best Author (Musical) and for the book as part of a Best Musical nomination for *Carnival*; in 1975, as Best Book (Musical) for *Mack and Mabel*; in 1977, as Best Book (Musical) and Best Score (lyrics) with Cy Coleman's music for *I Love My Wife*; in 1980, as Best Score (lyrics) with Cy Coleman's music, for *Barnum*; in 1981, as Best Book (Musical) with Mark Bramble for a revival of 42nd Street; and in 1985, as Best Book (Musical) for *Harrigan 'n' Hart*. He died in 1987. His sister, Francine Pascal, is the founder and artistic director of The Michael Stewart Foundation. The Dallas Morning News and

Mario Diament (Playwright)

Mario Diament was born in Buenos Aires, Argentina. A jour ralist and witer, he is the author of several award-winning plays that have been produced in the U.S., Latin America, Europe and the Middle East. He is a three-time winner of the Argentores Award, presented annually by Argentina's Society of Authors. He won the 2002 Carbonell Award for Smithereens and was a 2000 Carbonell nominee for The Book of Ruth. His play Houseguest received the Los Angeles Weekly Award. Blind Date premiered in 2004 at the New Theater in Coral Gables, Florida, directed by Rafael de Acha. It won the Curtain Up Award and was nominated for the Carbonell award. Upon its opening in Argentina, the show was awarded the country's most important theatrical prize, the Maria Guerrero award. Blind Date is currently playing in Hungary, Peru and Colombia. It is scheduled to open in September in Caracas and Washington DC. Mr. Diament lives in Miami, where he teaches journalism at Florida International University and writes a weekly column for the Argentine daily La Nación.

A Note from the Director, Jac Alder

I am grateful to the playwright for writing this piece and to his representative, Jeff Haller, who brought it to my attention. Its structure -- all two character scenes -- its deliberately outrageous concoctions of co-incidence, and at its core, the notion of parallel truths makes it unique in its storytelling and especially suited to Theatre Too programming.

I wasn't motivated to select it for the politically correct notion of presenting a play of particular interest to Hispanic communities in Dallas: what most strikes me about the urban creatures who inhabit the piece is that they could truly be in the majority of major cities anywhere. The wild success of the play recently in Budapest is more evidence of the commonality of modern city-dwellers not only in the Americas but certainly in Europe as well. I also picked the play as a great excuse to pry one of the finest actors anywhere, Hugh Feagin, out of his semi-retirement. Ever since he played Shannon in The Night of the Iguana for Theatre Three in 1963, Hugh has been willing to spend his talents in service to this theatre and this city: that's something else for which to be grateful. All the cast -- especially the overwhelmingly busy Connie Coit -- has cheerfully joined the task of bringing Mr. Diament's diamond of a play to full sparkle. I'm grateful for their dedication to the tasks of the play and their dedication to the special importance of live theatre for Dallas and its visitors. Thanks to all.

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
