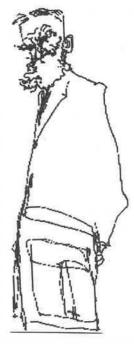

ABOUT THE AUTHOR – a personal perspective...

Because one of his plays was an epiphanous experience one night of my senior-in-highschool year, I can say without exaggeration that George Bernard Shaw was a man who changed my life.

GBS had been dead a couple of years by then -- he died at age 94 in 1950 -- and what I knew of him then was hazy. I thought he was British (he was Irish) and from my glimpses of him in newsreels, I took him to be some sort of important fool. He annually (since he turned 90) delighted in having cameramen film him on his birthday riding about on his bicycle with a kind of teenage glee. Remember how newsreel announcer's voices always brimmed with a patented, enthusiastic brio? "And here's England's most famous, most eccentric intellectual - the playwright George Bernard Shaw celebrating his ninety(something) birthday with a daily bicycle ride around his huge estate. Look at that white beard fly! Happy Birthday, Mr. Shaw!" And at this point Shaw would stop his bike and doff his cap to the camera, his face sporting a decidedly impish grin. They must have done this story three or four years in a row – or so it seems in my memory.



I wasn't thinking of Shaw when I got a ticket to sit in the balcony and see *Don Juan in Hell*, a touring production that actually made it to Oklahoma City where I lived. I wasn't even thinking about the somewhat racy title. My adolescent excitement, fueled by years of seeing every Hollywood film made, was the prospect of seeing MOVIE STARS! And big, famous stars! Charles Laughton played the Devil, Charles Boyer was Don Juan and Agnes Moorehead was Dona Ana. And that fourth guy was a knight, no less – Sir Cedric Hardwick. He must be important too, I thought.

But my epiphany, that sudden manifestation or perception of the essential nature or meaning of something, came not from the sight of movie stars, but from the words of that amazing play: never had I realized the permissible range of the human imagination. Though I understood the metaphysics not at all and was drowned in the swirl of brilliant wit I only barely grasped, I was forever changed by Shaw's intellectual liberation. I didn't get it all, but I understood his unsentimental happiness in the task of confronting the eternal, and his brazen delight in so much of the temporal. Shaw's hand flipped some sort of light switch in my head: he turned me on to my education, both my education from schooling and my education in life.

The experience – and I've talked of it often – didn't turn me on to theatre or drama. It turned me on to thinking. And each time I've worked on a Shaw play (I've performed since in *Don Juan in Hell*, have directed *Arms and the Man, Man and Superman*, and now *Major Barbara*) I am suffused with pleasure at the task. I read *The Doctor's*

Dilemma, Candida, Androcles and the Lion, St Joan, Pygmalian, Mrs. Warren's Profession and all the plays' astonishingly long prefaces each time with that same sense of "Aha!" I felt in the balcony of the Home Theatre all those years ago.

Major Barbara is, at its core, a sturdy domestic comedy. But like his prose, which can contain the most brilliant nuggets of thinking in almost throwaway subsets of phrases, the play's excursions into the nature of power (spiritual, material and political); the desirable evolution of classlessness; the absurdity of what passes for education; the interdependence of progress and violence – he manages to address these all provocatively without condescension or the most minute sacrifice of his role as an entertainer. Little wonder he possessed such an impish grin! GBS, you're a hero!

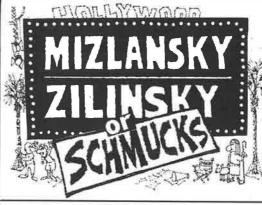

About the Director



Jac Alder co-founded Theatre Three in 1961 with his late wife, Norma Young. He has served the theatre as its Executive Producer-Director since. He takes on a full range of theatrical assignments including directing (as in *Major Barbara* and earlier this season in *Broken Glass...*), translating (as in *The Miser*), and acting (as in *Old Wicked Songs*). A former architect, he designed Theatre Three's unique performing space. Mr. Alder was on the

founding boards of the Dallas Arts Coalition, and The Dallas Arts Combine (now called Texas Arts Marketing). He served on the state-wide board of Non-Profit Theatres, Texas Non-Profit Theatres, and currently serves on the board of Texans for the Arts, a statewide arts advocacy organization. He was recently inducted into the Southwest Theatre Association's Hall of Fame and has also been honored with the Dallas Historical Society Award for Excellence in the Creative Arts. He has also been honored for Lifetime Achievement, Outstanding Direction and Outstanding Set Design—all by the Dallas Critics Circle.

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
