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

# BACKGROUNDS

### **The Actors**

GEORGIA CLINTON (Sarah) was last seen by Dallas audiences in the 1980 New Arts production of LONE STAR/ LAUNDRY AND BOURBON as Hattie. She has appeared in many productions at Theatre Three. Roles include Cynthia in THE NEW YORK IDEA, The Fly in HAPPY END, Agnes in THE SHADOW BOX, Salome in THE ROBBER BRIDE-GROOM, Maggie in AFTER THE FALL, Armande in THE LEARNED LADIES and Jane in FALLEN ANGELS.

HUGH FEAGIN (George) began his association with Theatre Three as the Reverend Shannon in the 1963 staging of NIGHT OF THE IGUANA. Since then, he has appeared in well over thirty plays with the theatre, including such diverse roles as Mansky in THE PLAY'S THE THING, R. P. ### Author of the Play

### The Designers

CHERYL DENSON (Costume Designer) OUTSIDE WACO is Miss Denson's third design assignment with Theatre Three. Last season, she created costumes for A DAY IN HOLLY-WOOD, A NIGHT IN THE UKRAINE. Miss Denson has designed professionally for twelve years, creating set or costume designs for more than thirty theatrical shows, including A MAN FOR ALL SEASONS, NIGHT OF THE IGUANA, CYRANO, BLACK COFFEE, BLOOD MONEY, SHERLOCK HOLMES and CAT ON A HOT TIN ROOF, all for area theatres. Miss Denson also owns Grafica, a total design company with such prestigious clients as Ford, Dr Pepper, Mary Kay Cosmetics, Braniff, InterFirst Banks and Fox & Jacobs. As an actress, she is best known for her stage work but also serves as latent for radio, television and training films.

CHARLES HOWARD (Scenic Designer) is the Associate Producer for Theatre Three. He has been with the theatre since 1976 and has functioned as both director and scenic designer. He has also taught at Mary Washington College and Memphis State University, where he headed the undergraduate performance program.

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


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
