


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

From now through the end of 1996, Theatre Three is conducting its annual fund drive (The Phoenix Campaign) raising support from from individuals. This year the goal for the campaign can only be reached if all of its long-established friends and new friends now unknown to the theatre contribute generously. The goal is \$72,000; an amount which represents \$2,000 a year for every year of Theatre Three's thirty-six year history.

A major reason for the challenging goal is the loss of Texas Commission on the Arts funding at previous levels. The Texas Commission on the Arts has only 20% of the funds it had last year to distribute. (And last year Texas was <u>53rd</u> in the states and territories in its per capita support of the arts!) What the TCA was doing had importance in identifying and supporting quality programming and helping institutions provide wide access for all Texans to their performances and exhibitions. That mission is now substantially vitlated. Certainly funds Theatre Three could usually count on are now gone.

So far corporate support is barely holding even with last year's donations. Our board is made up of loyal and personally generous individuals. They're very eager to maintain their stewardship of the last three years *during which there has been no cash deficit created*. That achievement has had as as much to do with cost-cutting as to moneyraising. It also helps that this year Theatre Three has earned more from single tickets (so far in the season) and from season ticket sales than in any of the past three years! Nevertheless, Theatre Three must count on its friends to join the annual campaign with generous tax-deductible contributions.

If you, dear playgoer, would like to share in the achievement of this Arts institution, the annual campaign provides the perfect opportunity to support that contingent of the theatre in which you are particularly interested. This year gifts are being solicited in five categories:

CAST PROFILES

MARY ANNA AUSTIN (Kate) was last seen at Theatre Three in Tiger Lady. Before that she appeared in A House with Two Doors is Difficult to Guard at Stage West in Fort Worth. Other Theatre Three appearances include Joy Gresham in Shadowlands. Anita in A Small Family Business, and Susan in The Heidi Chronicles. Additional credits include Six Women with Brain Death for Dallas Repertory Theater, and All My Sons for The Dallas Theater Center. She also appeared in Reckless for The Open Stage, Private Lives, Hot L Baltimore, The Wild Duck and A couple of White Chicks Sitting Around Talking for New Arts Theatre and Power Lines at The Odyssey Theater in Los Angeles. After majoring in theatre at Trinity University, she was awarded a scholarship to the American Conservatory Theatre in San Francisco. While studying there, she appeared in The Cuban Thing, directed by two-time Tony nominee Anna Deveare Smith and with Tennessee Williams in An Evening with Tennessee Williams. Ms. Austin is the recipient of the 1991Dallas Theatre Critics Forum Award for Outstanding Actress for her portrayal of Rachel in Reckless at The Open Stage.

TED DAVEY (Tom, Phyllis, Leslie) is pleased to make his Theatre Three debut with *Sylvia*. In the past ten months, Mr. Davey has been seen as Bottom the Weaver in *A Midsummer Night's Dream* and Roderigo in *Othello* for the Shakespeare Festival of Dallas; Billie in *The Little Mahagonny* and the Ghost of Christmas Past in *A Christmas Carol* (both at The Dallas Theater Center); as Don Quixote and Lord Byron in *Camino Real* (both for Undermain Theater). In the coming months Ted will be Bob Cratchit in *A Christmas Carol* (DTC); directing *A Comedy of Errors* (Undermain) and Lavach in *Alls Well That Ends Well* (DTC). Some of his favorite roles have been in *21-A, Venus & Adonis*; *A Grand Night for Singing, She Loves Me, Goose and TomTom, Nightcoil, Room Service, As You Like It, The Three Cuckolds, Vinegar Tom, Love Trouble, and <i>The Possibilities*. He has a Critics Forum Award for Outstanding Performance and has been nominated this year for a Leon Rabin Award. He is a seven year member of the Undermain Artistle Ensemble. "Love and thanks to Liz."

TERRY DOBSON (Greg) has served Theatre Three as an actor, musician and administrator since he migrated to Texas at the end of his university studies at Auburn. His musical career (as a choral director and accompanist) has seen him on the stage at Carnegie Hall with The Turtle Creek Chorale, in Russia with the international Peace Child company and most frequently performing as the musical director of Theatre Three's musicals including the just-closed hit production of *into the Woods*. Early in his acting assignments in Dallas he played in Beth Henley's play *The Wake* and the performance earned him a critic's award for Best Actor. He has appeared in classics (*The Imaginary Cuckhold, School for Husbands*); modern comedies (*Fortinbras, For Whom the Southern Belle Tolls*) as well as musicals (*The Fantasticks* as Mortimer and *Always, Patsy Cline, All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten*, and *Pump Boys and Dinettes* as the lead musician.) In addition to his many artistic duties, Mr. Dobson serves as the Assistant to the Producer co-ordinating theatre schedules, tracking union contracts and literary agent licenses as well as assisting Mr. Alder in fund-raising. After his heavy schedule at the theatre he shares time with his own dog, Annie.


LANELL PENA (Sylvia) was last seen as Ellie May, the hair-lipped daughter in Theatre Three's **Tobacco Road**. Other Theatre Three roles include Emily in **Our Town**, the virtuous lawyer's wife in **Mandragola** and the tragic daughter in **A Small Family Business**. Ms. Pena has also worked at other Dallas theatres including the Undermain Theatre. Teatro Dallas, Actor's Stock Company as well as at Stage West in Fort Worth. Like many Dallas actors she does television work including industrial shows, series, commercial and mini-series work. She hopes her work in the P. B. S. series, **Wishbone** has helped her prepare for the role of Sylvia. Ms. Pena (along with her husband director-actor Mark Hadley) has a starring role in the independant film, **Vocessilas** which is currently being edited in hopes of being accepted into the Sundance Film Festival. This production of **Sylvia** is very special to her as it will be her last here in Dallas for a while. At the end of the run of **Sylvia** she will rejoin her husband and their four cats (all of whom she misses "a whole bunch") at their new home in Costa Mesa, California where Mark has joined the staff of the South Coast Repertory Theatre.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

A. R. GURNEY enjoyed some of the best reviews of his longtime playwrighting career with Sylvia The NEW YORK DAILY NEWS commented "I can only call it one of the most involving, beautiful, funny, touching and prfound plays I have ever seen..." and the NEW YORK TIMES hailed it as "delicious and dizzy". His most popular play(with hundreds of performances still taking place across the country each season) is Love Letters. A show that theatre folks call a two-hander, Love Letters has been performed in Dallas by numerous celebrities including Charlton Heston and his wife. Other plays include Sweet Sue (which starred Mary Tyler Moore on Broadway), the more recent Later Life and the first big commercial success, Dining Room. A former academic (he taught theatre and writing) Mr. Gurney has become one of theatre's most prolific authors finding rich and fertile comic material in the family and societal mores of the upper middle class. His characters, like himself, are usually white anglo saxon protestants and usually live in the East. By writing specifically for those characters with insight, he seeks to reveal the universallity of the human experience.

ABOUT THE DIRECTOR

THURMAN MOSS directed *For Whom the Southern Belle Tolls*, (half of the double bill *Disgraceful Acts*) earlier this season. In last year's ALL AMERICAN SEASON, Mr. Moss was prominently on stage as an actor in *The Price* and *Our Town* as well as serving as the director of *Tobacco Road*. He began his acting career with Theatre Three in the '70s and now serves the theatre as a full-time staffer as its Chief of Operations. His facility management responsibilities including booking over 40 outside organizations into the Theatre Too space in Theatre Three's basement. He is a founder of The Lean Theatre.
