



### DOING THE RIVIERA

It's like buttah... or perhaps even manna...definitely it's a dose of luscious escapism: Sandy Wilson's tribute to tancy flappers and dashing sheiks. The Boy Friend captures the glamour, sophistication and comparative innocence of the 1920's French Riviera. The musical harkens back to a time when romance was set to the rhythm of Charleston, and lyrics such as whack a do and boop a doop tripped off the tongues of youngsters. Originally produced by Feuer and Martin, The Boy Friend premiered on Broadway September 24, 1954, to run for a total of 458 performances. The runaway success garnered Wilson his first professional credit in New York as a librettist/composer/lyricist. In addition, the show featured the talents of such Broadway notables as Paulette Girard

and Ruth Altman, and a certain gifted young performer, Julie Andrews, made her New York stage debut in the production.

Sandy Wilson, born Alexander Galbraith Wilson on May 19, 1924, spent his earliest years in Sale, a small town outside of Cheshire, England. He later studied at Harrow and Oxford University, where he wrote and appeared in many productions. He began to make his mark in London's West End by contributing songs to revues such as *Slings and Arrors* (1948) and *Oranges and Lemons* (1949). His big break came in 1953 when Wilson wrote the book, music and lyrics for *The Boy Friend*. After its first incarnation as an hour-long entertainment at the tiny Player's Theatre in London, the show eventually made its way to Wyndhams Theatre in the West End on January 14, 1954, and, later that same year, opened on Broadway. *The Boy Friend* has been subsequently produced in many countries throughout the world, has enjoyed Broadway and West End revivals, and a 1971 film version, directed by Ken Russell, starring Texas' Tommy Tune and London's Twiggy.

Wilson has also acted as composer and/or author and lyricist of many other delightful musical comedies originally produced in the West End: *The Buccaneer* (1955), *Valmouth* (1958), *Pieces of Eight* (1959), *Call It Love* (1960), *Divorce Me, Darling!* (1965, *Sandy Wilson Thanks the Ladies* (in which he also appeared, 1971), *As Dorothy Parker Once Said* (1966), *His Monkey Wife* (1971), *The Clapham Wonder* (1978), and *Aladdin* (1979). Yet, it was the success of *The Boy Friend* that, to this day, ultimately defines Wilson's greatest contribution to both American and British stages.

Just two seasons ago at the Chichester Theatre outside London, a revival of *Divorce Me, Darling!* (sequel to *The Boy Friend*) was staged. This '90's salute to Wilson was noted as "...pure nostalgia, magical and brilliant..." by the *International Herald Tribune*. Much of the popularity was linked to audience appreciation for a return to when social glitterati and romantic bewitchment were coupled with the heady bliss of simpler times. Perhaps "doing the Riviera" is, indeed, the restorative contemporary audiences need to ease premillenium weariness.
