Tom Troupe, with his collaborator, Don Eitner, first performed DIARY OF A MADMAN in Los Angeles 25 years ago. They toured the play for several years after that and in 1969 the film version (SOFI) was made. The picture won the Best Film award and Tom Troupe won Best Actor at the Atlanta Film Festival. Three years ago, the play was revived at Mr. Eitner's American Theatre Arts Theatre in Los Angeles and ran for six months thereafter.

Mr. Troupe made his Broadway debut in THE DIARY OF ANNE FRANK and was last seen there in Bernard Slade's ROMANTIC COMEDY opposite Mia Farrow. For 21 months, he co-starred with Barbara Rush in the national tour of Mr. Slade's SAME TIME NEXT YEAR and recently completed a tour of Richard Baer's comedy EMBRACEABLE YOU opposite Betsy Palmer.

He has had reoccurring television roles in "MARY HARTMAN, MARY HARTMAN", "WHO'S THE BOSS", in which he played Tony Danza's Irish priest and was Scott Baio's father in "BABY TALK." His feature films include "THE BIG FISHERMAN", "THE DEVIL'S BRIGADE", "KELLY'S HE-ROES", "MAKING IT", "SUMMER SCHOOL" and was last seen as Jack Favor in Gus Van Sant's "MY OWN PRIVATE IDAHO".

Nikolai Gogol is 19th-century Russia's greatest writer; he was born in Little Russia as it was then called, on March 20, 1809. His chief passions were poetry and theatre. In December 1828, he moved to Petersburg, capital of the Russian Empire and the most cosmopolitan of its cities, where he immediately sought the acquaintance of Russia's premier poet, Aleksandr Pushkin, ten years his senior and then at the height of his fame. Within a year of his arrival in Petersburg, Gogol received the first of a series of appointments as a minor civil servant.

Gogol resisted decisive involvement with anything other than his art. There is no record of amorous attachments, or of formative pressure from economical or political or social necessities. DIARY OF A MADMAN presents Petersburg life as seen through the eyes of one of the innumerable petty civil servants who staffed the vast, mechanical bureaucracy of the capital.

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

Don Eitner began teaching and directing in 1964 at the Melrose Theatre in Hollywood. His first assignment was the very successful production of DIARY OF A MADMAN starring Tom Troupe. For the next ten years, Eitner directed over 22 productions for the Melrose, two of which were made into films: DIARY OF A MADMAN (SOFI) into the Atlanta Film Festival best film winner and THE THREE OF HIM for CBS Repertory Workshop. The success of these productions opened the door for Don to produce, direct and edit commercials for Robert Carlisle Productions for two years. After Carlisle Productions, Eitner formed his own production company. Bonne Terre Productions for the purpose of producing documentaries and commercials.

His reputation as a director was growing, and the Dallas Theatre Center invited his production of DIARY OF A MADMAN. The play was so well received that Don was contracted to direct THE LION IN WINTER for DTC's next season opener. In 1974, Don left The Melrose to found The American Arts Conservatory Theatre in Hollywood.

American Theatre Arts has produced the world premiere of the Pulitzer Prize winning play, THE GIN GAME, as well as the critically acclaimed DEVOUR THE SNOW which also went on to Broadway. American Arts Theatre produced more than 50 other plays and trained several hundred aspiring professional actors and actresses.


